No matter how in the world you say them, the words, "Merry Christmas," bring a smile to one's face. Of course the smile may accompany a sarcastic tone of voice if one is saying this greeting in September, when the first Christmas decorations were up in a few stores.

What season is it, anyway? "Christmas is coming" has been the announcement of store advertisements and decorations for at least two months. These reminders have been side by side with Halloween and Thanksgiving paraphernalia. In the real world, it seems that the holiday "seasons" are all rolled into one. This is not a new phenomenon. All the way back in 1994, the movies brought Halloween and Christmas together in a film called, "Nightmare Before Christmas."

Years ago, the rhythm of the seasons in the U.S. was in sync with the calendar of the Christian Church Year. With the mobility provided by international air travel, the secularization of our society and the globalization of both our real and virtual lives, the traditional church calendar is now out of sync with everyday life. Celebrating church seasons such as Epiphany, Lent, Pentecost and Advent seems outdated and perhaps even unnecessary. There are many Protestant denominations that only celebrate Christmas and Easter with the Festival of Pentecost as the culmination of the Easter Season. Why do (cont'd on pg. 2)

Lutherans still hold to the tradition of following a liturgical calendar when it doesn't seem to relate to the "real world"?

The best explanation I've found comes not from a Lutheran theologian or liturgist but from an Evangelical website entitled, "The Voice." According to the Home Page, "THE VOICE is the Internet web site of CRI/Voice, Institute, a global and ecumenical ministry dedicated to providing biblical and theological resources for growing Christians." Apparently, some Evangelical churches are discovering how meaningful the themes of the Church Year can be to worship.

In his article entitled, "The Seasons of the Church Year," David Bratcher writes: "The changing seasons of the year...provide us with recurring opportunities to celebrate the Christian Faith in worship. The Christian church, following earlier Jewish tradition, has long used the seasons of the year as an opportunity for festivals and holidays, sacred time set aside to worship God as the Lord of life.

"While Jewish celebration revolves around the Exodus from Egypt, the Christian Church year focuses on the life and ministry of Jesus. The sequence of festivals from Advent to Resurrection Sunday becomes an annual spiritual journey for worshippers as they kneel at the manger, listen on a hillside, walk the streets of Jerusalem, hear the roar of the mob, stand beneath the cross, and witness the resurrection! The rest of the church year provides opportunity to reflect on the meaning of the coming of Jesus and his commission to his people to be a light to the world."

As we enter the season of Advent, I invite you to approach this period as the beginning of an "annual spiritual journey" for your life of worship and a means to continue your growth and maturity as a Christian. May you and yours have a blessed Advent season and a very Merry Christmas!

#### Pastor JMe Will Travel to Greece and Turkey in January

Pastor JMe and her spouse, Pastor Bob Lowden, will be traveling to Greece and Turkey for professional continuing education in January. They will be overseas from January 3rd until January 25th. This trip, approved by the Zion Congregation Council, will focus on ancient sites related to the history of the Christian faith and church such as: places visited by St. Paul during his evangelistic travels, locations of some of the First Century Christian communities mentioned in the Book of Revelation, sites related to the Great Schism of the Church into Western (Roman Catholic) and Eastern (Orthodox) Communions and the impact of the rise of Islam on Christianity.

While in Turkey, Pastors JMe and Bob will be traveling with a group of pastors and seminary students led by Professor Marty Stevens of the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Gettysburg, PA. This tour is a January term class for educational credit provided by the seminary. Participants are expected to provide introductory presentations for sites being visited and to lead a daily devotional service. During the trip, Pastor JMe will provide a presentation for the group on the discovery of the ruins of the ancient city of Troy- a place she has desired to visit and a topic she has been interested in since studying Greek mythology during High School. For preparation of a future study at Zion, she will also focus on the history of the Council of Nicaea and the development of the Nicene Creed. At Pergamum, she will lead a "Service of Prayer for Healing" for the tour group. Pergamum was an ancient site for healing and is mentioned in Revelation 1:11 as one of the early Christian communities.

#### Pastoral Supply for Worship and Care

The Rev. Dione Klepetke, the Chaplain for St. John's Herr Estates in Columbia, will be the Pastoral Supply during January while Pastor JMe is away. She will preach and lead worship on three Sundays, January 4, 11, and 18. Pastor JMe will be present for worship on Sunday, January 25th, the first ZYM-led worship services of the New Year. Chris and the youth will be providing worship leadership and the message for both services on that Sunday.

#### PROPERTY submitted by Jere Grube

As the weather turns colder the property team has been actively preparing for the winter ahead. We are continuing to investigate the source of the water that has been entering the old church basement. We had the underground drain lines flushed and scoped to make sure they are open. We also discovered a blocked drain opening and a clogged downspout, both of which may have contributed to water pooling in the area between the old church and the old Sunday school wing. These issues have been resolved and we are investigating whether or not the rain gutters in that area are adequate.

A contract for snow removal has been signed with Shull's Tree service. Shull's did a good job removing trees for us at a reasonable price and they expressed interest in doing snow removal for us. They are a local company and insured us that we will be a priority for them on the days of church services, food pantry and nursery school. Shull's will also allow the sextons and any volunteers to help out with snow removal as they are able. Hopefully this winter will be easier to deal with than the last one, but we are prepared for whatever nature brings us.

Some other projects under way or on the agenda include: repair of several exterior doors, evaluation and upgrade of exit signs and emergency lighting, and evaluation of the phone system especially regarding the nursery school.

#### Hello all Thrivent Members!





## Hempfield Area Food Pantry

In October, the pantry served 205 families which included 273 children, 410 adults, and 94 seniors for a total of 777 people served. We registered 19 new families in October.

During October, Zion members donated 158 pounds of food to the pantry. Thank you to the members who contributed financially to the pantry. The pantry purchased chickens and turkeys to give to our clients for their Thanksgiving holiday dinner.



During the month of October....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,912 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated 1,303 pounds of fresh produce and bakery items; Weis Markets in Columbia donated 921 pounds of bread and bakery items. Weis Stony Battery Road donated 471 pounds of bread and bakery items. Weis Markets Inc. from their Sunbury office presented our pantry with gift cards totaling \$181.85. These gift cards will be used to purchase items at the Weis Markets in our area.

We continue to be blessed with many volunteers who give their time to the pantry each Monday and Wednesday as well as additional time as needed. Seventy seven volunteers gave 706 hours for the month of October.

This time of year, the pantry receives many **special food drive donations** of food. To date, these collections have included....Boy Scout Troop, Pack 37 Landisville; Boy Scout troop pack 138 of Rohrerstown; Eastern Mennonite Mission Office Salunga. Hinkle's Pharmacy donated a large assortment of candy....special treats for our pantry children!!!! The Hempfield School District is collecting food district wide for a delivery in early December. Several other drives are in the process. THANK YOU to all who remember those less fortunate during this holiday season.


