

From the Congregational Council Submitted by Jon Wright

Greetings from the Congregational Council,

The year 2014 was a busy one for your Council, and 2015 is shaping up to be even busier. As we move into 2015 I would like to bring you up to date on our plans over the next few months:

Discernment Process:

We completed the Cottage Meetings in late November, but with the holidays we did not have the opportunity to sit down and digest the information that was gathered. Doug Rhoads met with most of the Cottage Meeting Leaders in early January. The yearly Council retreat will be held on February 7, and a large part of that time will be spent on discussing the findings from the meetings and beginning the formation of a plan for Zion.

Child Protection Program:

The regulations surrounding reporting of child abuse, as well as policies to protect children and youth continue to change. As a result, we have joined the Samaritan Safe Church program. There is a team of individuals who have committed to attending training and informational sessions over the next 10 months to allow Zion to create a solid and enforceable policy to protect the children and youth are use our facility or participate in our groups. In addition, training sessions will be held at Zion for all individuals that work with children and youth.

Our team will be joining teams from other churches for the first meeting on February 7. We would like to add one or two more members to the team. If you are interested please contact Jon Wright or Pastor JMe for more information.

2014 Financial Year in Review:

As a congregation we finished 2014 on a strong financial note, and ended the year with a cash balance of approximately \$33K. Though this is

\$16K less than the cash balance on Jan. 01, 2014, it is 13K more than we had at the end of November. Average attendance for 2014 was exactly the same as for the year 2013. The Finance Team mentioned that this is the first time in recent memory that our attendance figures did not drop, and where we exceeded our income from the previous year. The Council thanks you for your Stewardship and hopes that we are beginning to reverse the trend of declining attendance and budgeted offerings.

Council Elections:

Elections for the office of Council President and Vice-President were held at the monthly meeting on January 19th. Elected to the office of President was Jon Wright, and Doug Rhoads was elected as Vice-President. We welcome Ed Blough, Scott Crum, and Delaney Klepper to the Council.

Council meetings are held the third Monday of each month, and everyone is welcome. If you wish to attend the meeting and bring a specific item to the attention of the Council, please understand that agendas are formed several weeks in advance of the meeting. Depending on the length of the agenda there is no guarantee that we will be able to fit you into the agenda. It is suggested that you contact the Council officers at least two weeks in advance of the meeting if you wish to discuss an issue.

FOOD PANTRY UPDATE Submitted by Diane Gerlach

In December, the pantry served 206 families which included 274 children, 407 adults, and 94 seniors for a total of 775 people served. We registered 10 new families and re-registered 6 previous families.

During December, Zion members donated 251 pounds of food to the pantry. Thank you to the members who continue to contribute financially to the pantry.



During the month of December....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 2,516 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated 2,113 pounds of fresh produce and bakery items; Weis Markets in Columbia donated 1,495 pounds of bread and bakery items. Weis Stony Battery Road donated 484 pounds of bread and bakery items.

We continue to be blessed with many volunteers from community churches who give their time to the pantry each Monday and Wednesday as well as additional time as needed. Sixty nine volunteers gave 782 hours for the month of December.

THANK YOU to all who remembered those less fortunate during this past holiday season. More details and information has been reported in the annual report.





About 70 hardy souls, mostly men, braved the cold temperatures, icy parking lots and sidewalks to enjoy a warm meal at Christ Lutheran Church on Thursday, January 8. 70 is approximately half of the number of guests who are usually served so we had an abundance of food available, and the majority of guests there appreciated the opportunity to enjoy two meals instead of one! The opportunity to talk to quite a few of the people was had as they traveled to the serving window for their meals.

Also observed were many different acts of kindness shown to others in the crowd. One woman was helping two elderly guests with some physical challenges to find places to sit, and she assisted them with carrying their plates to their table. Another gentleman invited two other men to get in line in front of him because they arrived late and had not had their first meal while others were already working on their second one. In general, people were using good manners and being considerate of others which were heartening events to experience.

This is a ministry for all ages to volunteers. Our youngest volunteer, 18 months old, helped to push the coolers into kitchen at Zion. He also assisted with putting supplies into our plastic storage tubs. Some of our youth and a college student

helped with baking cakes. Many members volunteered by baking a cake or serving Thursday evening, and a crew cooked, delivered, setup, served, and cleaned-up. There were 5 volunteers from Zion present on Thursday night along with the 6 volunteers from Bright Side Baptist. Much appreciation is expressed to all!

COMMUNITY MEAL

In May 2006 a group (LaDonna T., Joan O. Barb Wildasin, and I) did a study and planned to have a community meal at Zion. We started meals in October after contacting several churches and organizations to help with providing meals. We went one year with serving twice a month and then decided that we would offer it every week. I have been organizing it entirely. Because the original idea of forming a committee never materialized.

Landisville Mennonite serves 10
meals a year, Hempfield Brethren in
Christ serves 6 meals, Rotary and
Wayside serve 4 meals, Hempfield
High School does six meals, and the
girls scouts, women's club, some
groups from Zion, and other community organizations do some. In
addition, some of the Zion members
who are homebound send very generous monetary contributions in for
supplies to support this meal.

While all these groups are extremely helpful and it is amazing to have so many who are so dedicated to this mission, I need more people to step up from Zion, especially, to provide meals. When you see Zion listed, it is me doing the meal. I receive a check whenever I ask from Kraft Funeral Home for \$1000 to help with cost for paper goods and drinks. This past year, I also received over \$900 in funds from a person who passed away and had his memorial go to the meal. Some people who attend give a check every month to help with cost, or bring food for the food bank as a way to "pay" or give back. The Social Outreach team at Zion, which is the team that the community meal falls under, does not have any money budgeted for the meal. A meal can be very simple - baked potato with chili, soup, or a casserole. It is not hard to have several people do a casserole and to spend an hour and a half serving. I am begging for

Only One Instrument Sings

By no means is God against musical instruments. He loves the sounds of praise that come from a string or horn or drum. Many of the Psalms — the songs of the saints — were written, after all, to be accompanied "with stringed instruments" (Psalms 4, 6, 54, 61, 67, 76). And God explicitly calls for praise to be played on the tambourine, harp, lyre, and trumpet (Psalm 33:2; 71:22; 81:2; 144:9; 150:3).

But only one instrument sings. Only the voice brings words of praise — explicit expressions of God's power, goodness, mercy, and wonder. Only a human voice declares the truth. A guitar, an organ, and a banjo all communicate something of the glory of God, but even the most beautiful note can't save anyone. We are desperate for a voice, a word, a lyric that announces good news, that reminds us of the truth we all need.

About Faith:

(from Praying God's Will for Your Life - by Stormie Omartian)

Faith is a spiritual muscle that needs to be exercised in order to prevent atrophy, which makes our entire spiritual being weak. Faith is first a decision, then an exercise in obedience, then a gift from God as it is multiplied. Our first step of faith is taken when we decide we will receive Jesus. After that, every time we decide to trust the Lord for anything, we build that faith. And whenever we decide *not* to trust Him, we tear it down. Faith is our daily decision to trust God. Faith is a gift from God because He enables us to believe, but we have to obey by building on that faith. To bolster your own faith, read through the fifteen characteristics of faith listed below:

- 1. Faith is a choice.
- 2. Faith is a step of obedience.
- 3. Faith is a spiritual exercise.
- 4. Faith is taking God at His word.
- 5. Faith is saying yes to God.
- 6. Faith is looking to Jesus for everything.
- 7. Faith is knowing we are never without hope.
- 8. Faith is what lifts us out of our circumstances.


- 9. Faith is not holding anything back from God.
- 10. Faith is being obedient even if we don't feel like it.
- 11. Faith is a gift from God as we read His Word.
- 12. Faith is knowing that everything will work out.
- 13. Faith is a way out of our limitations.
- 14. Faith is the mother of hope.
- 15. Faith is the road to peace.

Season of Lent Begins February 18th

On Ash Wednesday, February 18th, the Season of Lent begins. *The Lutheran Handbook* (Augsburg Fortress, 2005) describes Lent as: "The season when we turn toward God and think about how our lives need to change." (p. 76)

During Lent, we remember the meaning of baptism and the forgiveness, life and salvation promised through Jesus. Martin Luther taught that, each night, we are to ask for and receive forgiveness from God for our sins- the ways we have turned against God and others. This will allow us to rest in peace, to sleep well. When we awaken to the new day, we are born again- renewed to live in the freedom and blessing of God's love. This is the daily gift of life as a baptized child of God. Each day, we are reborn to a new chance to praise and serve our Lord.

Worship Around the Tree of Life: Wednesdays in Lent

During the season of Lent, our mid-week activities and worship will focus on the Tree of Life as a meaningful symbol of the Christian faith. *Many world religions use the image of the tree of life when depicting their central beliefs and values. For Christians, that tree of life is the cross.*

To the right, is a thirteenth-century mosaic of the cross of Christ as the tree of life. As in the Gospel of John,

the Virgin Mary and John stand near the cross on which Christ is crucified, but, like the tree of life, the cross fills the earth with its life-filled leaves and gives nesting places for the birds of the air.

Each week, members of Zion will provide their personal testimonies about how they have experienced the cross of Jesus Christ as the tree of life in their lives of faith.

For many years Zion has sponsored Cub Scout Pack 37. Members of Zion have both led and participated in the pack throughout the years. Many of the boys who have been pack members continued as Boy Scouts. Evidence of the Eagle Scout projects of some of these young Zion members can be seen around the grounds of the church. Another one of these projects was the "beach" volleyball

court at A. Herr Park. This relationship is just another of the many ways that our congregation supports the children and youth of the Hempfield community.

Currently, Zion members Chris and Tracie Andrew are among the leaders of Pack 37, and their sons, Brent and Devin, are Cub Scouts. The Andrews have been working with Pastor JMe to provide the "God and Me" (Grades 1-3) curriculum of the P.R.A.Y. Program for boys in the group in early 2015. The goals of the "God and Me" curriculum are: 1) To provide an opportunity for young people and families to explore their faith together; 2) To help children realize that God is active in every part of their lives; 3) To help children know that Jesus is their best friend; and 4) To memorize the Lord's Prayer.

Sunday, February 9—Boy Scout Sunday—will be the kick-off for "God and Me" registration. At the completion of the program, each participant will receive a special "God and Me" badge.
