

From the Pastor's Keyboard: "From Crucifixion Cross to Tree of Life"

During the season of Lent, we have pondered the meaning of Jesus' Crucifixion Cross as "The Tree of Life." The very idea of calling an instrument of torture and death a "tree that gives life to the world" is ludicrous for many. As Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians, "For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God."(1Co 1:18 NRS) Through faith, Christians gaze upon the horror of Jesus' death on the cross and see beyond the cross and the grave to see the Resurrection and new life that are promised.

We believe that Jesus' death on the cross destroyed the hold that sin has upon humankind, freed us from the sentence of death that we deserve, and opened the way to life in the promised Kingdom. Glimpses of this Kingdom are evident to those who are faithful to the way of Jesus during our earthly lives; however, when Christ returns the Kingdom will be revealed in its fullness and glory. Therefore, we do not need to fear death, for death is the way to new life in Christ.

Our Lenten journey began with the Genesis account of the Garden of Eden and the trees that God planted for the first humans. The Tree of Life was available from the very beginning as a source of nourishment and eternal relationship with God. Sadly, humans chose their own way to godly power and control instead of God's way to freedom and peace. The Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil becomes a symbol of the power of sin revealed through the law. "For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Rom 6:23 NRS)

Martin Luther wrote:

In particular, the Scriptures see into the heart, to the root and main source of all sin: unbelief in the depth of the heart. Thus, even as faith alone makes just and brings the Spirit and the desire to do good external works, so it is only unbelief which sins and exalts the flesh and brings desire to do evil external works. That's what happened to Adam and Eve in Paradise (cf. Genesis 3)." (Preface to the Letter of St. Paul to the Romans by Martin Luther, 1483-1546, Translated by Bro. Andrew Thornton, OSB)

Tree of Life images are found in many cultures and religions. As the Holy Scriptures were written, the authors borrowed these and other images from the ancient cultures of the world around them as means to describe the creative and redeeming works of the God of Abraham and Moses. Thus, the Tree of Wisdom became the symbol of God's Spirit of guidance for life and living. God's kingdom was described as a tree yielding abundant fruit, fed by the water flowing from heaven. The mystery of the Kingdom of God was symbolized by the tiny seed or shoot that grows into the glorious, overarching tree that provides shelter for birds and brings healing to the world. A tree of death, the crucifixion cross, becomes symbolic of the way of sin that humans chose in the creation garden. Through his crucifixion, the Son of God willingly suffered and died on our behalf in order to destroy the power of sin and death that permanently separate us from God. Through his Resurrection, that same tree of death is transformed into the Tree of Life that restores the forgiveness, life and salvation that were God's original gifts in the Paradise Garden. "[T]hanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ!" (1Cor. 15:57 NRS)

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

• Church Council Update Submitted by Jon Wright

Greetings from the Congregational Council,

It's been said that there are two things you don't discuss among friends, money, and politics. I'm going to break the rule and talk about money. In the past, we have had stewardship campaigns during the fall and maybe it was my imagination, but it seemed that church attendance declined during that period. We don't talk about the financial state of the church – no one wants to be a part of the conversation. *That needs to change.*

We are at a critical time for Zion. It has been some time since we've needed to borrow from the Endowment Fund. That time has come again. We finished the month of February with a cash balance of \$9,802, which is \$10,000 less than we had at the end of January, and approximately \$24,000 less than we had at the start of the year. Yes, weather had some effect on our attendance and offerings in February; attendance in January 2015 was higher than January 2014, but offerings this year were lower. The projection from our dedicated Finance Team is that we will need to begin using interest from the Endowment Fund within the next month or two.

The Council has approved the formation of some task forces to look at some of the Discernment pillars and our financial situation. We are going to have one task force look at the structure of our ministry teams to see if we can simplify and free up some volunteers for other ministries. Another task force will look into what we can do with the building, with the plan to informally approach East Hempfield Township to see what they will, and will not, let us do. Based on those conversations and how much we will be constrained, the Council may need to regroup and re-access the building plan pillar. The third task force will look at our financial situation.

I am concerned on several fronts. A finding of the Discernment cottage meetings and something that we heard time and again is that our facility is holding us back. There are some grand ideas that have been presented, many of which count on our ability to build or do a very large renovation to the facility. If we don't have the funds to cover our operating expenses how will we be able to raise funds for a building project? I ask that you prayerfully consider your giving and if you are giving back to God to the best of your ability.







FOOD PANTRY UPDATE Submitted by Diane Gerlach

In February, the pantry served 173 families which included 211 children, 353 adults, and 96 seniors for a total of 640 people served. **We registered 4 new families**.



During February, Zion members donated 79 pounds of food to the pantry. Thank you Zion members for your continued financial contributions.

During the month of February....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,434 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; **Target in Lititz** donated 1,021 pounds of fresh produce and bakery items; **Weis Markets in Columbia** donated 831 pounds of bread and

bakery items. Weis Stony Battery Road donated 237 pounds of bread and bakery items.

We continue to be blessed with many volunteers from the Hempfield area and our Hempfield community churches who give their time to the pantry each Monday and Wednesday as well as additional time as needed. Sixty one volunteers gave 603 hours for the month of February.
