

The insurance company promises that its clients will be able to live with protection, confidence, peace of mind, and freedom to dream and believe. That's nice to know. However, I have it on the best authority that no human organization- even one as well known and powerful as BlueCross Blue Shield- can fulfill the promise of truly fearless living on earth or in the future. Safe Church Presentation #2 at Zion

Sunday, Sept. 27, 6-7 PM

How Sexual Offenders "Groom" Children: What Every Adult Needs to Know

<u>Description:</u> This session is intended for all adults in the congregation who want to protect children and teens in the church, family and community from sexual harm. It includes an overview of the 5-step grooming process offenders often use to engage children in a trusting relationship prior to sexually exploiting the child. We will also view the compelling video "It's not Just Jenna", based on a true story of a teen sexually abused by a family friend. Her story illustrates how insidious the grooming process is, and helps viewers to better recognize the "red flags" that Jenna's parents missed. Their courage, good counseling, and faith in God allowed Jenna's family to heal from this tragedy, and now they want to share their wisdom with others.

<u>Audience:</u> Adults in the congregation, with a particular emphasis on parents, and also staff & volunteers working with children. Teens age 13 and older are encouraged to attend, and to discuss with parents or church staff the story of "Jenna" in the video. Not suitable for younger children.

MAKING ZION, LANDISVILLE A SAFE CHURCH FOR CHILDREN, YOUTH AND THEIR FAMILIES

Many times when the subject of child abuse within a church community comes up, the typical response of faithful church members is: "That would never happen in our church. We have known all our members for a long time, and no one would ever hurt a child." Unfortunately, both my experience as a pastor and news reports about child abuse by pastors and church leaders in various denominations prove that we can no longer be in denial about the possibility of abuse happening in our church. Zion's leadership is committed to insuring that our congregation is a safe place for children and youth where they can know and experience the true love of Jesus Christ. For several years, the Congregation Council and Personnel Team have been working to update a Child Protection Policy that was originally approved in 2008. (Cont'd on pg. 4)

In 2014, new Pennsylvania laws regarding mandated reporting of child abuse and clearances required for all volunteers working with children in both public and private organizations were passed. As a result, Zion became a participant in the Safe Church program provided by Samaritan Counseling Center. The program provides guidance for developing a Child Protection Policy for the congregation that meets all the state and federal requirements. It, also, provides presentations and training for members of the participating congregations to help them put their policies into action.

Our Safe Church Team is comprised of Pat Landis, Kim Paternoster, Chris Reinford, Pat Brady, Jon Wright and your pastor. We have been attending intensive training sessions during the year as we've been working on our draft of a Child Protection Policy. The Safe Church process includes two presentations for members of Zion to help us all understand the importance of being proactive in protecting the safety of our children. The first presentation, held in May, was attended by a pretty good number of our parishioners. The second will be held on September 27th at 6 p.m.(see notice above). Although attendance of these presentations is not mandatory for all of our members, you are encouraged to come and learn about how you, both as a member of Zion and as a citizen of our community, can be more aware of potentially abusive situations and relationships. These presentations are particularly important for members of Zion who volunteer in any of our ministries with children (Sunday Nursery/Child Care; Sunday School, ZYM, Kids' Club, Vacation Bible School, etc.).

According to the current laws, all those who regularly volunteer in activities involving children (listed above) are required to become "Approved Adults" by completing the steps listed below. Only until these have been completed may the volunteer begin or continue his/her ministries with children or youth in the congregation.

- 1). Each volunteer must secure the necessary State and/or Federal criminal clearances. This may be accomplished online through the PA Department of Welfare or by obtaining and submitting a paper application. A document outlining the process of attaining these clearances is available through the church office;
- 2) The original documents or copies (if the original documents are held by another institution) of these individuals' clearances must be brought to Anne in the Church Office no later than September 11.
- 3) The volunteer is encouraged to attend two Safe Church presentations provided at Zion and a mandatory training session to be held for all volunteers in November.

It is a sad state of affairs that Christian communities and their members must now approve child protection policies and take these actions. Unfortunately, this is a reality for our ministry in the world of today. If we can prevent even one child from experiencing abuse within our church building or while participating in church activities, all this is worth the effort. Remember that Jesus said about the children he blessed, "Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." (Mar 10:14-15 NRS) Let's strive to make Zion a little piece of kingdom for all our children and their families.

This class meets in the Social Hall and focuses on the Wired Word. The Wired Word connects contemporary issues with what the Bible would have to say about the issue. This is a fun class that thrives on great discussion and fun conversation.

The Sunday Scholars

The Sunday Scholars is an adult Bible study class using videos and lively discussion on the topics that include spiritual formation, discipleship, Judaeo-Christian history and traditions, and dealing with the world as a Christian. We kick off the new Sunday School year on Sunday, September 6th in the parlor with a series by John Ortberg titled "When the Game is Over, It All Goes Back in the Box." That series will last for six weeks from

September 6th through October 25th. We will not hold class on September 13th in order to celebrate Rally Day, and on September 20th, John Metzger from the Seed of Abraham, a Liititz-based messianic Jewish congregation, will be in our class to discuss the unique ministry of Christian Jews in present-day American society. More about John's program will appear shortly.

Beginning November 1st and running through November 22nd, the class will take up discussion about Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a Lutheran martyr who gave his life living out his ministry to Christ during the Holocaust and Nazi Germany's rise and fall in the Second World War. This video series will feature discussions led by Eric Metaxas, author of the the award-winning Bonhoeffer: Pastor, Martyr, Prophet, Spy. Members of the congregation are welcome to attend any of the sessions.




MEN OF ZION

Meal Ministries

Former Christ Lutheran Meal Ministry Proposal

After speaking with several Christ Lutheran volunteer team members about the topic, it is being proposed that we merge with Zion's own Community Meal Ministry held on Thursday evenings in our Social Room. The merger would mean that we, as a congregation, accept the opportunities to prepare and serve a community meal at Zion on six different occasions throughout the year. We would use the same format that was used at Christ Lutheran:

- 1. Groceries would be ordered and paid for out of Zion's budget. Volunteers would pick them up and deliver them to Zion on the Wednesday before the meal is to be served.
- 2. Volunteers would prepare, bake, and cook the food at Zion on Thursday morning and afternoon of the meal with the exception of desserts.
- 3. Volunteers would sign up to provide desserts.
- 4. Volunteers would serve the meal and complete dining room and kitchen clean up.

Since these meal opportunities will occur at Zion, we believe it may be somewhat simpler to involve more congregational members because it involves no transporting of food and supplies to another location, not as much clean-up, and not as much time traveling back and forth. Please think and pray about how you and/or your family could be a vital part of this ministry at our own church for people in our own surrounding community.

Zion's community meal scheduling for the upcoming year occurs in October. One community church in particular usually volunteers to serve on one Thursday out of every other month of the year. This is the perfect opportunity for Zion members to serve on one Thursday of the month on the opposite months of the year. When someone contacts you to assist, please say "yes" or, better yet, call or email Linda Bear or Connie Alsedek with your commitment to serve.

• Food Pantry Submitted by Diane Gerlach

In June, the pantry served 213 families which included 278 children, 426 adults, and 99 seniors for a total of 803 people served. We registered 19 new families.



In July, the pantry served 201 families which included 271 children, 413 adults, and 100 seniors for a total of 784 people served. We registered 11 new families.

During the month of June, Zion members donated 197 pounds of food. In July, Zion donated 183 pounds of food. Special "thanks" to our Zion members for the contribution of fresh produce from your gardens!

The pantry "welcomed" **Church of the Apostles in Rohrerstown** as a new contributor with their donations of fresh produce from their gardens. We also received 539 pounds of fresh food items form the **Penn State Extension**.

During the month of June....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,939 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry



and in 1,416 pounds of produce; Target in Lititz donated 1,989 pounds of fresh produce and bakery items in June and 2,230 pounds in July; Weis Markets in Columbia donated 900 pounds of bread and bakery items in June and 859 pounds in July. Other food donated through stores, food drives, individual churches, and private donations totaled 8,363 pounds of food in June and 9,941 in July. In addition, the pantry purchased 1,074 pounds of food items in June and 345 pounds in July. June monthly total of foods donated and purchased was 14, 265 pounds and in July 14,790 pounds of food to maintain the supplies on our shelves. Your financial

contributions are used to purchase food items on sale at various grocery stores and the Central Penn Food Bank.

During the summer months of "vacation time," the pantry gave extra food items to families with children since many of these children are on free and reduced lunch during the school year.

We continue to be blessed with many volunteers from the Hempfield area and our Hempfield community churches who give their time to the pantry each Monday and Wednesday as well as additional time as needed. Seventy one volunteers gave 730 hours for the month of June and 78 volunteers gave 901 hours in July.


