




<u>From the Pastor's Keyboard</u>: Changing the Advent Season to Fit the Culture?

Advent is upon us, and the period of anticipation and growing excitement before the Christmas celebration has begun. As Lutherans, keeping Advent as a special time has become almost impossible. Christmas decorations are already up in stores before the Halloween items are removed. Christmas carols are playing and Santa is waiting in his "house" at the shopping mall for your visit before the Thanksgiving leftovers are all eaten. With Black Friday, the Christmas Season has begun in earnest, but in the church we are just lighting the first Advent Wreath candle. Whereas, everywhere we go, Christmas carols and songs are playing, we typically don't start singing these lovely hymns in church until just before December 25th. There never seems to be enough time to sing all the beautiful Christmas hymns we love at church.

Some church leaders are suggesting that Christians re-claim Advent by starting the season earlier. There's a movement across denominations to rearrange the Church Calendar in order to begin the Advent season, its music and its message two weeks earlier. Therefore, on the Sunday that we would typically be lighting the third Advent wreath candle, Christmas hymns would be introduced. This extends our singing of Christmas music for two extra Sundays before the celebration of Jesus' birth in addition to the Sundays up until the celebration of the Epiphany on January 6th. As I often remind you, there are actually 12 days of Christmas! With this new Advent Season proposal, we'd be singing Christmas carols for four weeks instead of merely two! (Cont'd on pg. 2)

Have you been serving in one or more of these Sunday Servant positions for some time, but feel you need a refresher course due to changes in your responsibilities? • Church Council Update Submitted by Jon Wright

We are fast approaching the end of what has been a trying year for the Council. Visible accomplishments have been few. One highlight though - in October the Council approved the Child Protection Policy developed over the last 11 months through the Samaritan Safe Church Program. I want to thank Pat Landis, Kim Paternoster, Pat Brady, Chris Reinford, and Pastor JMe for their help in getting this policy together. We are slowly implementing some facets of the policy, but the actual effective date is Jan. 01, 2016. The policy will be posted on the Zion website and there will be at least one hard copy available in the church building as well. On November 14th there were about 20 members and staff members that attended a training session at Highland Presbyterian Church. I'll be blunt and offer my opinion; this is not enough volunteers to move forward with our children and youth programs. On a positive side there are more members that have received their clearances but haven't yet completed the necessary paperwork in order to be an Approved Adult. Additional training sessions will be scheduled, but at this time we don't know the date or time.

It is the responsibility of all members to (1) be aware of a potentially unsafe situation and bring it to the attention of a staff or Council member, and (2) to not place your children in a potentially unsafe situation. I'll give you a real life example. My sister-in-law attended a church in Virginia where everyone felt safe and knew each other. One Sunday morning a little girl went to the restroom on her own. When she didn't return the parents, ushers and others went looking for her. It turned out that a man had entered the church and hid until the service started. The little girl was abducted by the man, out of sight of anyone else in the congregation.

The large part of our Council meetings are spent discussing two topics; finances and property. We've mentioned our financial situation several times this year. We expect to finish 2015 with a cash balance of approximately \$4000. For the last 5 years our beginning cash balance has been as follows:

- 2011 \$26.837
- 2012 \$41,584
- 2013 \$70,303
- 2014 \$49,716
- 2015 \$33,326

Since 2013 we have trended down. This year we needed \$20,000 from the interest in the endowment fund to meet expenses and have approximately \$34,000 of interest remaining. At the current rate that we are going we will need to begin drawing down the principal in the next year or so. A congregational vote is required in order for the Council to do so.

The Cash Flow Summary that Finance provides each month is an eye-opener. There are three accounts that are tracked by our Finance Team; Thrivent, Friends in Need, and ZYM Project. The Thrivent Fund reflects the dollars given to Zion from Thrivent. In reality, all of the funds for these projects reside in the same bank account which is our General Fund. The summary from the end of October shows that there should be a total of \$49142.69 available in these three accounts. In reality, the cash balance in the General Fund is \$917.73. This means that if requests were received for all of the money from the three accounts we would need to pull \$48, 224.96 from the Endowment Fund. Since we only have \$34K in interest available the remainder would need to come from principal. In other words, our expenses have exceeded our offerings for quite some time.


Some of us have been approached about the lack of progress with the information gathered in the Discernment Process, specifically around some type of building project. Back in the late Spring/early Summer Doug Rhoads, the Council Vice-President, and I met with a group of past Presidents of the Congregation. The discussion centered on our building and what if anything can be done to modernize and expand the functionality, as well as major renovations including knocking down the Social Hall area and refactoring the space. There was good conversation, we heard some interesting ideas, but as often happens life got in the way. Doug's and my schedule did not allow for us to concentrate on moving this forward, and maybe part of it was an uncertainty on our part that this was best for the congregation. Doug has put a team together and will be meeting with them in December to formulate a plan. One of the roadblocks that we consistently encounter is the amount of maintenance required to our facility. The Property Team, and I can't thank them enough for all their work, has been dealing with a water issue in the basement that just doesn't want to be resolved. We had the basement tested for mold and the test results were positive for mold and we needed to eradicate it. Complete Restorations took care of this for us but then a problem with a boiler valve caused the basement to flood. Insurance covered the cleanup and removal of the floor tiles, but we still have a basement area that cannot be used. Water continues to seep in from the walls, and until this is taken care of we cannot refurbish the basement so that it can be used by groups from our church or by outside organizations. This issue must be resolved, for safety as well as structural reasons.


We must move forward and continue with the ministries that are so vital to our community. The Food Pantry is located in our facility and such an important resource for those in need. Our Community Meal remains strong and engages so many organizations from our community. May 2016 will mark the end of the Zion Nursery School and we will celebrate the many years that this ministry has served not only children in our congregation, but those in the surrounding area. But as one ministry fades away another rises. The Kids' Club that Chris Reinford has started with the help of several of our members is growing and reaching into the community.

Some members have asked if the Council has considered a merger, and what the Synod's stance is regarding mergers. I think that Bishop Dunlop made it clear in his closing remarks at the Synod Assembly that fully supports the unification of congregations. There has been some discussion in the Council meetings about this, but is was high level and not something that we've focused on. If the financial situation doesn't improve, and it is shown that renovation or continued maintenance is not sustainable then it may be a path the next Council needs to investigate.

As I mentioned at the beginning of this newsletter article, it has been a trying year, but I am humbled my fellow Council Representatives have elected me to serve as your President for the last two years. I need to thank all of the Council for their hard work. There are four very capable individuals that will be joining the Council next year; Scott Hetrick, Joel Janisewski, Brenda Stover, and Anna Benedict. Birgitte Chapman, Delaney Klepper, Joe Auchey, and I will be leaving the Council on December 31st and I must thank them for their service. Doug Rhoads, you have been invaluable as Vice-President for these two years and I thank you. Pastor JMe, thank you for helping us to hold it all together. And Anne, thank you for all the email reminders, for all of the tasks that you do without complaining, and for putting together those monthly Council Packets!


On December 29, the class will begin a new video series, All the Places To Go, by Pastor John Ortberg. A description of the book upon which the video is based reads:



7 Prayers of Release

Letting go of negative emotions can be a reality through prayer.

1. To release anger, resentment and bitterness

God, hear me and answer me. You know I am troubled by thoughts and feelings of anger, resentment and bitterness. You also know why. And You know how deep the hurt goes and how long I have lived with it. But I don't want to live with it any longer. I don't want to be an angry, resentful and bitter person. With Your help, I release my anger into Your hands. I surrender my resentment. I let go of my bitterness. Help me to keep letting go and release these toxic emotions as often as they try to return.

2. To release a loved one

Lord God, I release ______ into your care. You know all my love and concern for (him/her). I know that You share that love and concern, so I release (him/her) into Your hands. Help me to find healthy and helpful ways to love and care and pray for (him/her), even as I learn to trust You to see all I cannot see and do what I cannot do.

3. To release fear

Father, I give my fear to You. I have been crippled and poisoned by fear for too long. I reject it. I release it. I choose faith instead of fear, believing in Your good plans for me. I choose love instead of fear, trusting that Your "perfect love" will cast out all fear (1 John 4:18). I choose Your light and truth instead of fear, accepting Your Word, which says I "need not fear terror that stalks in the night, the arrow that flies in the day, plague that strikes in the darkness, or calamity that destroys at noon," because you are with me (Psalm 91:5-6, ISV).

4. To release the illusion of control

Mighty God, for too long I have wanted to be in control, tried to be in control and cherished the illusion that I am in control. I release myself and my illusions into Your hands. By Your grace, I surrender my need to feel in control, and embrace the truth that You are in control and that I can control only my inner life and not my outward circumstances—and certainly not other people. Grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot control, courage to change the few things I can (my thoughts and actions) and wisdom to know the difference.

5. To release an attitude of victimhood

Lord, with Your help, I release all the negative thoughts, feelings and impressions that lead to an attitude of victimhood in my life. I turn from it. I refuse to be a victim any longer. I choose to rely and live on the truth of Your Word that says I am more than a conqueror (Romans 8:37) rather than a victim, through the One who loves me and gave Himself for me. Let me live a victorious life from this moment on instead of entertaining any thoughts of victimhood.

6. To release dependency

Father, I repent and renounce and release the dependency by which I've lived until now. Whatever the roots—self-doubt, self-hatred, self-loathing, etc.—I release the sense that I need anything or anyone but You and Your truth to get me through the day and through this life. Remind me, moment by moment, that my God will meet all my needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus (Philippians 4:19).

7. To release shame

God, Your Word says there is "no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, because through Christ Jesus the law of the Spirit who gives life has set [me] free" (Romans 8:1, NIV). I agree with Your Word and so release all the shame I have felt because of the lies I've believed about myself. I choose to believe what You say about me and not what others say—not even what I have said about I accept that I am Your "work of art," myself. Christ Jesus to do "created in works" (Ephesians 2:10, NIV) and trust You to help me, moment by moment, to live in that reality. 10

"WHAT IS YOUR OPINION?!?"

A Move Away from a "Food Court" Model of Worship

There is a move of God across churches around our nation that is causing a shift from a "food court" model of worship to a unified style of worship. In the past, many of our churches, for well-thought-through pragmatic reasons, decided to offer two or more styles of worship, seeking to attract people who like a particular kind of music. This model is based on personal preferences.

The overall concern was that we could not draw young people with traditional styles of worship, and our older people would leave if we transition our services to a more contemporary model. The result has often been ageism, segregation and division of the body. In many cases, its implementation has severely divided the church rather than uniting it in what should be one of the most unifying practices of the church —corporate worship. In fact, biblical teaching points to us keeping the generations together in worship (1 Timothy 5:1-3, 1 Timothy 4:12, Psalm 145:4, John 17).

Many churches that have gone down this divisive road are now crying out for unity. A prevailing thought that millennials want a high production, edgy worship service has been proven wrong by current research and gives every church a more hopeful future.

Here's what I have found. It's important to help people understand a biblical, cultural and missional understanding of worship with people sitting around tables in discussion groups. Explore with them the difference in essentials and nonessentials in worship. Present the concept of unified, multi-generational, multi-ethnic worship to them. As people see what should be in worship and lay that beside the reality of worship in their own church, the Holy Spirit begins to work in lives to bring alignment. I have seen this occur in many churches.

I'm not condemning churches that offer several choices, but I do want all to truly examine why they are doing this and determine if it is God's choice for them. For some, I truly believe this is the only way they can remain missional within their circumstances.

Our meals will be served on the second Thursday of each of these months at 5:30 PM. We will be following a similar format to the one used for serving our meals at Christ Lutheran by serving the same meal on each of those five occasions. This helps us to keep our plans streamlined and consistent and straight forward while we do our best to serve a nutritious and delicious meal to our friends in our surrounding communities.

After meeting with Joanne Grim, and Connie Alsedek to make a few tweaks to our overall plan, we now offer you many opportunities to say, "Yes, I will gladly serve for you, Lord!"

Please read and carefully consider the job opportunities for this ministry, and contact Connie Alsedek by phone (717-492-4045) or email (conia@comcast.net) to let her know in which opportunities you may be interested. In particular, we need to get our February crew signed up and ready to serve.

Zion's Community Meal Volunteer Job Descriptions

(Meals will be served on the second Thursday of February, April, June, October and December of 2016)

Food Pick Up and Delivery - Two volunteers are needed to pick up potatoes, sour cream, butter, green beans, fruit cocktail and dinner rolls at Darrenkamps Market in Mount Joy, PA and the ham loaf at Wengers in Elizabethtown, PA, and then deliver them to the Zion's kitchen the second Wednesday of each of the months listed above. All the food is

preordered. No shopping involved. This is approximately a 1 1/2 hour commitment.

Food Prep/Baking/Cooking - Four to six volunteers are needed to wash and wrap the potatoes, put the ham loaf in the baking pans, and put the green beans into an electric roaster along with the putting the ham and potatoes into the oven. This is approximately an hour commitment between 1:00 -2:00 PM on the day of the meal.

Set Up/Prep - Two volunteers are needed to dish out the fruit cocktail, sour cream, and butter and check on the ham, potatoes, and green beans. This is approximately a thirty minute commitment between 4:30-5:00 PM on the day of the meal.

Cake Bakers - Six volunteers are needed to each bake one cake to serve for dessert on the day of meal. This is approximately a one hour commitment. Completed cakes can be delivered to the church kitchen the Wednesday night before the meal or the day of the meal. The church is usually open between 7-9:00 PM (no guarantees) and during the day. Cakes can be delivered to the church office during the day also.

Serving/Clean Up - Eight volunteers are needed to serve and clean up the kitchen on the day of meal. Two volunteers are needed to plate the meals, and six volunteers are needed to serve the meals to guests. (Three volunteers to carry the trays and three volunteers to serve the plates of food.) All these volunteers are needed to clean and sanitize the tables, do the dishes, and generally clean up the kitchen area. This is approximately a 1 1/2 hour time commitment from 5:00-6:30 PM.

Please consider volunteering for one or more of these positions. This is a wonderful ministry for volunteers of all ages!

- 2. As Lutherans, we celebrate the centrality of God's love and mercy.
- 3. As **church together**, we are never alone, but always part of something stronger and greater.
- 4. As **church for the sake of the world**, all we are, and all we do, express love of God and love of neighbor as ourselves.

♣ Food Pantry Submitted by Diane Gerlach

In October, the pantry served 173 families which included 254 children, 356 adults, and 82 seniors for a total of 692 people served. We continue to register new families each month....in October we registered 11 new families. Currently, the pantry has registered over 250 families who are eligible to receive food once a week.



During the month of October Zion members donated 150 pounds of food. Thank you for your food donations and your continued financial contributions to the pantry. Your financial contributions are used to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank and "on sale" items at various grocery stores in the area.

During the month of October....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,917 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated 1,596 pounds of fresh produce and bakery items; Weis Markets in Columbia donated 1,324 pounds of bread and bakery items in August; Weis Market

Stony Battery Road donated 683 pounds of bread and bakery items. Penn State Extension donated 242 pounds of fresh produce. Other food donated through stores, food drives, individual churches, and private donations totaled 5,330 pounds of food in October. The pantry purchased 957 pounds of food.

We continue to be blessed with many volunteers from the Hempfield area and our Hempfield community churches who give their time to the pantry each Monday and Wednesday as well as additional time as needed. Seventy three volunteers gave 594 hours during the month of October. Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give to serving them with a true servant's heart and a smile! We could not provide this important community service without our volunteers! The pantry has no paid staff.

On November 4, the Board of Directors sponsored an **appreciation luncheon** for our volunteers. Thanks to Marie Adams, Donna Dumeyer, Millie Gundel, Nancy Myers, and Joan Oberrender for serving the luncheon.

YOU are welcome to visit the community pantry located here at Zion on our "open" days (Monday and Wednesday from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM) to witness God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action!

Cereal, 15 oz. canned fruit, and canned soups continue to be some of the "main" items the pantry can always use!!!


