A Message From Chris Reinford

Zion,

There are so many positives right now at Zion that should be celebrated. Kids' Club is going well. We have averaged 12-15 kids each Wednesday evening that we have held the program, with a total of 45 kids being involved. Zion is filled with families who know how to raise their children. Zion has a solid group of youth who love to get together and learn more about God. They have so much knowledge about their faith. They are very inspiring. Zion has an abundance of God-seeking adults who strive to support the ministries that God has led you to create and build. Zion supports the Food Pantry, the community meal, and many other ministries that support and nurture the people around Zion. God is looking out for Zion and I believe that God has some very special missions in store for the church in this community. You are all here today for a reason. It's not by chance that you are worshipping with us. God wants you here because he has a purpose for you. Get involved and work towards the mission God has given you.

God speaks to us all in different ways. Growing up, one of the hardest things for me was hearing God speak. I was always taught that if you listened you could hear God speak. Easier said than done. I had the opportunity to learn from someone in Jr. High Sunday school, who could hear the voice of God when he prayed. His whole adult life was filled with moments where God led him to the right situation at the right time where he would fill a need that had been prayed for and there was no way it could be just a coincidence.

For me, God speaks through other people. He seems to place other people in my life to lead me to the right decisions and the right place at the right time. Sometimes God pushes me in ways I might not want to go. And if that has happened to you then you share the feeling that sometimes you follow Him kicking and screaming. Sometimes God opens doors that will just stand there staring at you for years waiting for you to walk through them. God has a plan for you and me because he knows what is best for us. Will we walk through the door?

God placed my old Sunday School teacher in front of me for the first time in 8 years last year. I had been seeking some direction with what God wanted me to do with the rest of my life, a common thing for a twenty-six year old and probably anyone else. God answered that prayer, and through it I realized I have been kicking and screaming. I realized that God was trying to show me a door that was open through other people for a long time. People I grew up with, worked with, and many of you here at Zion were all people that added to this direction. It was a door I didn't want. You see, I never saw myself as pastor material. I didn't think I was as strong in my faith as I needed to be to lead an entire congregation. But God has ways of making a believer believe. I know that he wants me to be a pastor. I know that he has given me the skills to do so. Now I need to walk through that door. Sometimes God's timing stinks. But God's time does not work for our will but His will. He knows what is best and the best he has for us sometimes has to be pushed in our path so we can see it.

You all have given me so much the last two years. You have become a second family. Most of my very best friends are at Zion. I don't want to walk through this door. I have enjoyed working with the children at Kids club and their parents who are devoted to bringing their children to as many church events as they can. I love the kids here. I love hearing them shout Mr. Chris. I don't want to walk through this door. The adults here have always supported me through everything. Some of you are like my grandparents, my parents, my friends. You have taught me so much. I don't want to walk through this door. Zion has a great group of teens who have become my best friends. If you haven't had a chance to spend time with them yet, you are missing out. They are amazing. I have been many places and they are the best. I have looked forward to everyday I get to spend with them. Teaching them, traveling with them, learning with them, playing, serving, crying, singing, laughing....

I have to walk through this door. God has shown me through other people that I need to follow Him. I am announcing today that my last full day at Zion will be Sunday, April 3. I have been called to fill an Associate Pastor position at Akron Church of the Brethren. There I will pursue my master's degree to become an ordained pastor. Something God has placed on my heart in the last few months. However I will be helping with the transition to find that person that will take my place. Someone God has out there for Zion is waiting to be called to this position. I have prayed about it and God will answer that prayer. I will be helping finish this season of Kids' Club, VBS, and some various youth events that are coming up in the next few months.

I understand that there will be disappointment, resentment, confusion, and sadness. I assure you, this is a God thing. If you feel any of those emotions, I would ask you to pray and ask God for guidance and support. You all have given me everything. I am who I am today because of you all. Thank you for serving with me. Now it's your time to get involved and make these ministries your own. This community is your mission field and this church is your tool. Take pride in what God has given you in your life and take pride in what God has given Zion. Opportunities here are infinite. Don't be afraid to walk through new doors that God opens for you.

Sunday School students in our Kindergarten through Fifth grade classes completed "The Circle of Grace" program designed to "educate and empower children and young people to actively participate in a safe environment for themselves and others." Through this program, the children were taught the following objectives.

- We are all created by God and live in the circle of His love along with His son Jesus and the Holy Spirit.
- God's Circle of Grace helps all of us identify and maintain appropriate physical, emotional, spiritual, and sexual boundaries.
- We will be able to identify different types of boundary violations through use of The Stoplight: Feelings, Touch and Secrets Safety Plan
- We will demonstrate how to take action if a boundary is violated.

Our teachers will continue to incorporate this information into our Sunday School lessons for the remainder of the year. In addition, children should be encouraged to talk about and use this valuable information at home with their parents and other trusted adults, so they will understand the importance of using it in the many environments they encounter throughout their days ahead.

500TH Anniversary Of The Reformation- Trip To Germany

Pastor JMe is considering the organization of a tour of Germany in early May, 2017. The 10-day itinerary includes visits to major cities and sites related to the time of Martin Luther and the Reformation of the Church. We will travel to Berlin, Wittenberg, Eiselben, Leipzig, Eisenach, Mainz, Worms, Heidelberg, and Frankfurt. The cost is \$ 3,649 per person with 30 paying participants. The total tour package includes air and ground transportation, accommodations in first-class hotels, at least one meal each day (breakfast daily, one lunch and five dinners), a multilingual European Tour Manager, sightseeing and admission fees; and tips and taxes. Food Pantry Submitted by Diane L. Gerlach

Hempfield Area Food Pantry, Inc.

In February, the pantry served 180 families, which included 229 children, 383 adults, and 96 seniors for a total of 708 people served. We continue to register new families each month...in February we registered 10 new families.

During the month of February Zion members donated 241 pounds of food. Thank you for your weekly food donations and your continued financial contributions to the pantry. Your financial contributions are used to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank and "on sale" items at various grocery stores in the area.

During the month of February....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,888 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated 1,631 pounds of fresh produce and 130 pounds of bakery items; Weis Markets in Columbia donated 1,253 pounds of bread and bakery items; Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 445 pounds of bread and bakery items. S. Clyde Weaver donated 223 pounds of bread and bakery items; Forry's 78 pounds of produce; Giant of Kissel Hill, Lititz contributed 367 pounds of bakery items; Giant of Mount Joy donated 181 pounds of bakery items. The pantry purchased 882 pounds of food items through local grocery stores; 5,404 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank; and received 2,631 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program in Lancaster.

We continue to be blessed with many volunteers from the Hempfield area and our Hempfield community churches that give their time to the pantry each Monday and Wednesday as well as additional time as needed. Sixty-seven volunteers gave 741 hours during the month of February. Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give to serving them with a true servant's heart and a smile! We could not provide this important community service without our volunteers! The pantry continues to operate with a full non-paid staff.

YOU are welcome to visit the community pantry located here at Zion on our "open" days (Monday and Wednesday from 9:00 AM to 1:00 P) to witness God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action!

The "main" items needed (requested) for the pantry currently through March are cereal and 12 -18 ounce containers of jelly. Thank you!

Together we will feed the hungry!

Other Pantry News...

The food pantry received a grant of \$3,000 from the Abigail L. Longenecker Memorial Foundation in March. The foundation provides funds to local nonprofit organizations for specific projects that benefit children. These funds to the pantry help to buy "extra" food items to be distributed to pantry client families with children during the summer months when the children are home and do not receive the free and reduced breakfast and lunches at school.


Abby Longenecker developed a vision far beyond her age. She saw need and she wanted to help. In 1997, just weeks before her death, she was visiting Deb's House, a facility for children and families in crisis. Abby did not have the opportunity to volunteer at Deb's House however, her spirit continues to help children who face challenges through the foundation set up in her name. A unique aspect of the Foundation is the fact that supported projects are chosen by a committee made up primarily of young people from the ages of 10 and up, some of them Abby's friends. This ensures that Abby's vision, seeing a child's need from the eyes of a child, is continued. Abby, in her short life, learned that life's greatest joys come from giving.


Since 1998, the Foundation has contributed to over 20 local on profit organizations. The pantry is thankful that our grant request was selected to receive the \$3,000 to purchase extra food items for our families with children during the summer months. **Thanks to Jim Bear who wrote and submitted the grant on behalf of our pantry**. Jim and Dave Bleil (President of HAFP Board) received the check at the presentation ceremony on March 6. Our community pantry is blessed with financial gifts and food donations all the time that support local families who continue to experience difficulty providing food for their families.

WE DID IT!! We raised awareness, and we reached the ELCA Malaria Campaign goal of \$15 Million by September, 2015. God be praised! Many lives have been saved due to these efforts.

Our synod's Malaria Task Force is pleased to report that 157 Lower Susquehanna congregations (66%) responded to this challenge and helped our synod raise \$390,833 toward the effort. This represents \$4.07/baptized member and 78% of our synod goal of \$50,000. Thank you to the congregations who helped us reach this level.

This story is not over. Although death rates from malaria are 60% lower than they were in 2000, our work is not finished. We will continue to raise awareness and funds (through ELCA World Hunger and <u>ABMN</u>) towards fulfilling our commitment and towards our ultimate goal of MAKING MALARIA HISTORY. THANK YOU on behalf of our synod's Malaria Task Force for helping our Church MAKE A DIFFERENCE.

Pennsylvania Lutheran Seminaries Declare Intent to Form "New School of Theology"

(January 13, 2016) In simultaneous meetings held on their respective campuses January 12-13, the boards of Gettysburg and Philadelphia Lutheran seminaries adopted identical resolutions calling for "the creation of a new school of theology and leadership formation." Both boards' resolutions stated their actions were taken "in the conviction that God and the church are calling us into a new venture of theological education, with a mission of preparing faithful Christian leaders for the church and the world." The boards' unanimous actions authorized the two schools' presidents and other officers to take all necessary steps required prior to their April 2016 board meetings that would launch the process of creating a unified Lutheran seminary.

Founded in 1826, Gettysburg Seminary is the oldest Lutheran seminary in the Americas. Widely renowned for its role in the great Civil War battle of Gettysburg, the school on Seminary Ridge opened an award-winning Seminary Ridge Museum in 2013. Since its founding in 1864, Philadelphia likewise has played a pivotal role in American and Lutheran history. Beginning more than 40 years ago, Philadelphia's outreach to ecumenical partners, particularly historic African American churches, has created one of the most diverse learning environments that exists in 21st century theological education.

"From the moment we both felt the Spirit leading in this bold new direction," declared Presidents David Lose and Michael Cooper-White (of Philadelphia and Gettysburg respectively), "it became clear that our proposal would not envision simply blending together two fine traditions and excellent institutions. Rather, we believe God is calling us to do a new thing. Mergers are created out of past realities; our vision is to embrace what God is beckoning from the future."
