

From the Pastor's Keyboard: Election Year Challenges

Are you still glued to the news about who is winning in the presidential primaries, or are you tired of the whole process? Do you still watch the debates, or have you been flipping to another channel whenever the latest debate is covered? Have you decided which candidate you would vote for if he/she is nominated to run, or are you still wondering what you will do when the Pennsylvania Primaries are held on April 26th?

For some, including yours truly, this has been an upsetting and challenging campaign season. The mud-slinging and bad-mouthing engaged in by most of the candidates has been worse than ever. When policy is discussed, broad statements and promises have been made that no president has or will be able to keep. This is nothing new, actually, but one gets weary of being lied to every election season. Candidates claim to be speaking "for the American people" as a whole, but their political views consistently are biased towards one particular group of Americans, typically the wealthy, and ignore those who aren't members of that group, Americans who are in the expanding middle economic income range, those barely eking by, the poor, ethnic minorities and other vulnerable Americans.

Being a follower of Jesus can make being an American voter difficult. Being a wealthy (yes, I consider myself wealthy in more ways than merely money) American who is also a Christian makes the important choice of the next President of the United States, the leader of our country, a huge challenge.

What are the personal attributes and moral standards that make for a President who will lead our country toward a greater sense of unity and justice for all and toward a strong international leadership role in work for world peace and elimination of the scourge of terrorism? Do any of the current candidates stand out in his/her concern for the people Jesus most loved: the poor, outcast and vulnerable? Maybe it would be easier if someone like Jesus was running for office? Then again, that one would most likely be assassinated before he/she could take office.

No one like Jesus is running---only a group of human, imperfect, sinful, sometimes ornery and manipulative individuals. In other words, they are like us. Yet, our faith in Jesus Christ gives us redemption from this sinful nature, makes us new in the love and forgiveness of God, and calls us to live out this transformation in everything we do- even in the decisions we make during this election year. How might we, American citizens who are followers of Jesus, make election choices that reflect the faith we claim in the midst of the fractious society we live in today? What can we do to protect ourselves from getting caught up in the negative rhetoric of the campaign that is aimed at belittling others and instigating fear?

The ELCA and Lower Susquehanna Synod have resources to assist voters as we make decisions this year. A list of links is included, below. Of course, one of our greatest resources is prayer. Before you make your decisions, take time to pray for guidance. Read the information provided in newspapers, journals, or online about the platform of each candidate and ask God to help you make an informed decision that takes into account not merely your desires for the future of our country but, more important, God's will. Most important of all, after your study, contemplation and prayer, go out and vote in the Primary Election on April 26th.

Watch, listen, and pray without ceasing.


Xamine your motives on a regular basis.


Yield to the Holy Spirit when He prompts you.



Summer Worship Project

As most of you know by now, beginning Sunday May 22, through Labor Day, September 11, we will be worshipping at one service, beginning at 10 AM. During seven of these services we are going to take a journey through the history of Christian Worship, from shortly after the Crucifixion to the present day. From the Reformation on, the focus will be entirely on Lutheran Worship. We hope to foster an understanding and feeling for the development of our worship and how we got to where we are today.

The Sundays devoted to these teachings are as follows:

- June 26 Ancient Christian Worship (How early Christians worshiped; the foundations of worship)
- July 10 Roots of Catholic Worship (teaching sermon-focus on structure of worship. No special liturgy).
- July 17 Reformation Worship (Liturgy in the style of Martin Luther's German Mass).
- July 31 18th Century Worship (As Lutheran's worshiped in the 1700s in Pa.
- Aug 14 Early 20th Century Worship (Liturgy in the style used when Zion began).
- Aug 21 Later 20th Century Worship (Liturgical renewal from the 1960s-1970s).
- Sep 18 Back to 2 services. As we are today.
- Our services on these Sundays will be in the style of the worship described. This is a rather ambitious project and will require much research. If any member of this congregation has any knowledge regarding the worship we will be doing, please contact either myself or Pastor JMe. Your help will be greatly appreciated.

Prayer Team, Community Meal

What Should be Included in Prayer? by K. J. Kehler (thoughts-about-god.com)

Although communion with God is all about our heart's attitude, the following are four aspects of prayer that make for a healthy conversation with God.

Adoration

To show adoration to God is to worship, praise, honor and exalt Him. In other words, respect Him, and say wonderful things about Him. Psalm 103 and 145 are good examples of adoring the Lord.

Confession

When we begin to acknowledge how great, perfect and awesome our God is, we can't help but recognize our weaknesses and sins. Admitting and confessing our sins and knowing he has forgiven our past, present and future sins is vital to our prayer life. God is a holy God, so we need to come to Him with a clean heart.

Thanksgiving

Giving thanks expresses our faith, and it is faith that pleases God. In Hebrews 11:6 we read, "And without faith it is impossible to please God." 1 Thessalonians 5:18 states, "In all things give thanks for this is the will of God in Christ concerning you." We don't necessarily give thanks for the difficult circumstances, but give thanks for His total provision during good - and painful ones.

Supplication

Asking seems to come naturally to children. As God's children, we can freely talk to Him and ask Him for anything. And like any caring parent, He will say, "Yes" to some of our requests, "No" some of the time and at times, He will say, "Wait".

You can remember this outline for prayer through the acronym ACTS - Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving and Supplication. Each component is necessary for an effective prayer life.

In March, the pantry served 179 families which included 230 children, 372 adults, and 92 seniors for a total of 694 people served. We continue to register new families each month.....in March we registered 9 new families.



During the month of March Zion members donated 196 pounds of food. Thank you for your weekly food donations and your continued financial contributions to the pantry. Your financial contributions are used to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank and "on sale" items at various grocery stores in the area.

During the month of March....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,279 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; **Target in Lititz** donated 1,390 pounds of fresh produce and 130 pounds of bakery items; **Weis Markets in Columbia** donated 1,006 pounds of bread and bakery items; **Weis Market Stony Battery Road** donated 168 pounds of bread and bakery items. **S. Clyde Weaver** donated 312 pounds of bread and bakery



items; Forry's 210 pounds of produce; Giant of Kissel Hill, Lititz contributed 488 pounds of bakery items; Giant of Mount Joy donated 342 pounds of bakery items. The pantry purchased1,286 pounds of food items through local grocery stores; 3,385 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank; and received 2,800 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program in Lancaster.

We continue to be blessed with many volunteers from the Hempfield area and our Hempfield community churches who give their time to the pantry each Monday and Wednesday as well as additional time as needed. Sixty four volunteers gave 701 hours during the month of March. Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give to serving them with a true servant's heart and a smile! We could not provide this important community service without our volunteers! The pantry continues to operate with a full non-paid staff.

YOU are welcome to visit the community pantry located here at Zion on our "open" days (Monday and Wednesday from 9:00 AM to 1:00 P) to witness God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action!

The "main" items needed (requested) for the pantry currently through April/May are cereal and 14 -16 ounce cans of tomatoes. Cereal is ALWAYS a requested food item. Thank you!


January 24, 2016


