

#### From the Pastor's Keyboard:

#### Why Do We Worship the Way We Do? -Ancient Roots of Lutheran Worship

During the summer months, we will be exploring together the development of Lutheran worship and experiencing ways that our forefathers and foremothers offered worship and praise to the Lord Jesus Christ and received his gifts through the Holy Sacraments. The following is an introduction to our worship journey. Join us each week to worship and learn why we do what we do on Sunday mornings.

"42 They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. (Act 2:42 NRS) "46 Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, <sup>47</sup> praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved." — Acts 2:42, 46-47 (NRSV)

Corporate worship has been central to the Christian faith since the very first followers of the Way gathered at the time of the Pentecost. Also, from the very beginning, sharing the meal we know as Holy Communion was a regular part of their gatherings.

Around 56 A.D. Paul wrote to the Christian community in Corinth to express his concern about inappropriate behavior during worship and the sharing of the Lord's Supper. He stressed the importance of the meal and its place in the worship of the church by repeating Jesus' words at the Last Supper with the disciples before his crucifixion- words that are still used today.

<sup>23</sup> For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, <sup>24</sup> and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." <sup>25</sup> In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." <sup>26</sup> For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes. — 1 Corinthians 11:23-26 (Cont'd on pg. 2)

# • From the Pastor (Cont'd from pg. 1)

During most of the First Century, Christians gathered with their Jewish brothers and sisters for Sabbath services of scripture readings, interpretation, and prayers. Early on, they were considered a sect of Judaism; however, they differentiated themselves as a group through their additional "Lord's Day" (Sunday) gatherings in members' homes to share the Lords Supper instituted by Jesus. As Christianity spread into the lands outside Israel, more and more Gentile believers joined the growing communities. This growth together with growing persecution from both the Roman government and Jewish leaders led to the establishment of the Christian church as an entity unto itself. By the end of the Second Century, church leadership hierarchy, worship service content and structure, and church buildings had been established throughout the known world. By the end of the Fourth Century, Sunday- "The Lord's Day"- had become the primary day of worship in the week.

Below are excerpts about worship practices from writings of early church leaders. Take note of how the content and structure of our worship has changed very little since the first centuries of the church: confession, psalms/hymns, prayers, scripture readings, sermon, offering, Holy Communion.

"But every Lord's day gather yourselves together, and break bread, and give thanksgiving after having confessed your transgressions, that your sacrifice may be pure. But let no one who is at odds with his fellow come together with you, until they be reconciled, that your sacrifice may not be profaned. For this is that which was spoken by the Lord: "In every place and time offer to me a pure sacrifice; for I am a great King, says the Lord, and my name is wonderful among the nations.

(The Didache, 50-120 A.D.)

"When you instruct the people, O bishop, command and exhort them to come constantly to church morning and evening every day, and by no means to forsake it on any account, but to assemble together continually; neither to diminish the Church by withdrawing themselves, and causing the body of Christ to be without its member... but assemble yourselves together every day, morning and evening, singing psalms and praying in the Lord's house: in the morning saying the sixty-second Psalm, and in the evening the hundred and fortieth, but principally on the Sabbath day. And on the day of our Lord's resurrection, which is the Lord's day, meet more diligently, sending praise to God that made the universe by Jesus, and sent Him to us, and condescended to let Him suffer, and raised Him from the dead. Otherwise what apology will he make to God who does not assemble on that day to hear the saving word concerning the resurrection, on which we pray thrice standing in memory of Him who arose in three days, in which is performed the reading of the prophets, the preaching of the Gospel, the oblation of the sacrifice, the gift of the holy food?" (Apostolic Constitutions ca. 1st-4th cent. Bk. 2. 59)

# Summer Worship Project

Throughout the summer we will be worshipping at one service, beginning at 10 AM. During seven of these services we are going to take a journey through the history of Christian Worship, from shortly after the Crucifixion to the present day. From the Reformation on, the focus will be entirely on Lutheran Worship.

We hope to foster an understanding and feeling for the development of our worship and how we got to where we are today.

The Sundays devoted to these teachings are as follows:

June 26 Ancient Christian Worship (How early Christians worshiped; the foundations of worship)

July 10 Roots of Catholic Worship (teaching sermon-focus on structure of worship. No special liturgy).

July 17 Reformation Worship (Liturgy in the style of Martin Luther's German Mass).

July 31 18th Century Worship (As Lutherans worshiped in the 1700s in Pa.

Aug 14 Early 20th Century Worship (Liturgy in the style used when Zion began).

Aug 21 Later 20th Century Worship (Liturgical renewal from the 1960s-1970s).

Sep 18 Back to 2 services. As we are today.

Our services on these Sundays will be in the style of the worship described. This is a rather ambitious project and will require much research. If any member of this congregation has any knowledge regarding the worship we will be doing, please contact either Dennis or Pastor JMe. Your help will be greatly appreciated.

The Zion Strategic Planning Committee (ZSPC) meets the second Thursday of each month at 7:30 PM and is currently gathering information for a feasibility study on two fronts — possible structural modifications to our current facility and information on a cooperative ministry program. The goal of the committee is to assemble as much information as possible and then present the findings to the congregation in the fall. 


The need for an Evangelism Team Leader is a pretty crucial one. Although all of us are responsible to be active in the area of evangelism, we need someone to lead an active group that will monitor this area of our ministry. There is no need for special "training" except merely to make certain that when there are visitors who are interested in our church that we acknowledge their presence and interest, and make sure we invite them to return. Or, if you know someone who is interested in coming, be sure to extend that invitation that they are hoping for. It's that simple, but that necessary.

Are you aware that you can make your contributions to our church electronically? Well, you can! It's a program called Simply Giving and it's easy to use! Simply Giving is the program endorsed by the Thrivent Federal Credit Union that provides for automated giving to the church from your checking or savings account. Weather, holiday weekends, and sporadic attendance can create unpredictable giving patterns that make it difficult for the church to plan strategically. When the income comes in through online channels, it creates a consistency that is less dependent on these variables that make it hard, or even impossible, for you to be in church. With the upcoming summer vacation season, you could keep your offerings up-to-date even though you might not be able to attend church each Sunday. Do you use automated payments for any of your household bills? Why not add your church offering to that list! A number of our members are already enrolled in Simply Giving and are all very pleased with the program. It's easy to sign up! 




#### **COMMUNITY MEAL**


It's like Vacation Bible School all summer long





#### FABRIC KITS FOR LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF

# Food Pantry Submitted by Diane Gerlach

In April, the pantry served 173 families which included 230 children, 371 adults, and 92 seniors for a total of 693 people served. We continue to register new families each month....in April we registered11 new families.



During the month of April Zion members donated 196 pounds of food. Thank you for your weekly food donations and your continued financial contributions to the pantry. Your financial contributions are used to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank and "on sale" items at various grocery stores in the area.

During the month of April....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,495 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated 3,663 pounds of fresh produce and 111 pounds of bakery items; Weis Markets in Columbia donated 1,071 pounds of bread and bakery items; Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 181 pounds of bread and bakery items. S. Clyde Weaver donated 241 pounds of bread and bakery items; Forry's 187 pounds of produce; Giant of Kissel Hill, Lititz contributed 417 pounds of bakery items; Giant of Mount Joy donated 493 pounds of bakery items. The pantry purchased 1,395 pounds of food items through local grocery stores; 5,830 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank; and received 2,733 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program in Lancaster.

On April 16, Hempfield/Lancaster Rotary Club again sponsored our Hempfield Pantry in their "Shop for a Cause" fund raiser at Park City. The results gave \$2,054 and 3,071 pounds of food to the pantry. A huge "thank you" to the Rotary Club for selecting and sponsoring our pantry at this event.

Thank you to the Wheatland Federal Credit Union. They presented a check for \$2,050 to the pantry on May 4, which was a result of a fund raiser involving several credit unions. Wheatland "won" the challenge and selected Hempfield Food Pantry to receive the results of the contest. Their representatives were given a tour of the pantry.

On May 11, a representative from the Central Penn Food Bank conducted an audit of our pantry. This involved a review of our records and reports which must be prepared weekly as they relate to client statistics, volunteers, and other data. It included a "walk through" of the pantry. The report was rated "excellent." This is due mainly to the volunteers



who serve in the office and maintain the records. It also reflects the work done by all the volunteers as they receive, weigh and sort the food donations, and finally assist our clients in the selection of food. We continue to be blessed with many volunteers from the Hempfield area and our Hempfield community churches who give their time to the pantry each Monday and Wednesday as well as additional time as needed. Sixty eight volunteers gave 606 hours during the month of April. Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give to serving them with a true servant's heart and a smile! We could not provide this important community

service without our volunteers! The pantry continues to operate with a full non-paid staff.

Zion can be very proud to provide the space for this outreach mission to our families in the Hempfield School District who need help in providing food for their families. YOU are welcome to visit the community pantry located here at Zion on our "open" days (Monday and Wednesday from 9:00 AM to 1:00 P) to witness God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action!

The "main" items needed (requested) for the pantry currently through May are cereal and 14-16 ounce cans of fruit. Cereal is ALWAYS a requested food item. Thank you!
