From the Pastor's Keyboard:

The Lutheran Hymnal:

A Treasure Trove for Personal and Corporate Worship

Although most Lutheran congregations do little to commemorate specific Christians of the past or saints, Lutherans, like Roman Catholics, have a calendar of commemorative days specific to saints and significant Christians throughout history. It's interesting to look at this calendar and see who is being remembered on a particular day. For instance, Sunday July 3rd is the commemoration of Thomas, the apostle, and Saturday, July 23rd is the commemoration of Birgitte of Sweden, renewer of the Church.

At the June Congregation Council meeting, Joel Janisewski led the evening devotions. He introduced his devotional by telling us that he found his inspiration by picking up one of the *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* (ELW) hymnals from the pew rack. When he looked at the "Lesser Festivals and Commemorations" calendar included the front of the ELW hymnal, he noticed that June 21 is the commemoration of Onesimos Nesib, an Ethiopian translator of scripture and evangelist, who died in 1931. Onesimos, born about 1855, was a slave who was bought by Swedish missionaries. These good Lutherans freed him, educated him and converted him to Christianity. He spent much of his life ministering with the Oromo people of Ethiopia, his native tribe and the largest linguistic group in Ethiopia. A major accomplishment was his translation of the scriptures into the Oromo language.

During the summer months, we are taking a journey through the history and development of Lutheran liturgy. As we strive to answer the question, "Why do we worship the way we do?", a helpful resource is a copy of a Lutheran hymnal. If you pick up one of the cranberry-colored ELW hymnals from the pew rack, you will find a treasure trove of resources, not only for corporate worship but also for personal devotion. There are numerous hymns for singing (893), multiple settings for Sunday worship in diverse (Cont'd on pg. 2)



styles (10), psalms for use in worship or personal contemplation (150), and a plethora of prayers for use in weekly worship, for special occasions and about topics of daily life and living (pgs. 18-87). You may have noticed that some hymns included in the worship bulletin have an ELW hymn number referenced. It's a great opportunity for you to pick up a hymnal and find that hymn in the book.

As you look through a copy of the hymnal, you will find that worship is to be part of daily life and not just a Sunday occurrence. There are brief services for daily prayer and suggested scripture readings for personal devotion. Do you desire to begin a discipline of daily scripture readings and prayers? There's a Daily Lectionary listing in the back of the hymnal under "Additional Resources." Do you need help with writing a prayer for the opening invocation of your civic club meeting? Check out the topical prayers in a hymnal. Do you need a brief devotion for the beginning of a church meeting? Go to the hymnal for inspiration like Joel did. Are you wondering just what Martin Luther wrote about the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer and the Sacraments of Holy Baptism and Holy Communion? Guess what? The Small Catechism of Martin Luther is included in the back of the ELW hymnal!

Take a few moments the next time you come to church and discover the treasure trove of faith resources that are contained in the *ELW* hymnal. If you want to borrow a hymnal, there are copies of the *Lutheran Book of Worship* (LBW) and the *Service Book and Hymnal* (SBH) in the Parlor on the library shelves. These older hymnals of our church are also filled with many resources for your spiritual life.

Join us on Sundays during July and August to learn more about why we worship the way we do. The more you learn about Lutheran worship, the more you will be able to appreciate what happens when we gather together to give honor and praise to our Lord Jesus Christ and to receive his gifts of life, forgiveness and salvation through the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Jesus is the reason we worship the way we do!



Bible Study & Breakfast at Miss Calee's Eats and Treats (B&B@MC) Join us at 9 a.m. on Tuesday mornings for fellowship, good food, and interactive bible study. During July, we'll be focusing on 2nd Timothy after we complete 1st Timothy. In August, we'll be spending some time with the book of Hebrews with primary focus on the scripture passages that will be read each Sunday during the month. If you don't want to eat breakfast, just come in for a cup of coffee or tea and join the conversation. Don't forget to bring your bible!

ZSPC Update: The Zion Strategic Planning Committee met on May 26th with Pastors Jorgensen & Blezzard from the Synod who provided information and strategies on the procedures for pursuing a cooperative ministry alternative with another church (or churches) and for upgrading our existing building.

Zion submitted our Church Building Consultant Application which is the first step a congregation must take in order to receive services in the areas of building/renovation, facility upgrades, use of the building, and property evaluation. Pastor Jorgensen informed us it could possibly be August until we can meet with a Church Building Consultant from the ELCA.

Basement Moisture Problem: The Zion Property Team has been working diligently on this complex issue and at their June meeting, held the 3rd of three interviews with contractors with this specialty. It has been determined that the problem is caused by hydrostatic water pressure. This means that the water originates from sub-ground level and not from above ground, provided, of course, that spouts and drain lines are kept clear at all times. (Cont'd on pg. 4)

The information and costs will be presented to Council and a course of action will be discussed as to whether we correct the water invasion problem immediately, or determine how it might relate to our future renovation/remodeling of the building.

The Property Team is working on a solution for providing WIFI throughout certain areas of the church building. The team has also accepted a quote from our lawncare specialists to include the area around Cooper House which previously was not included in the service contract. Trimming of trees has been completed by Goeke Tree Service.

Synod Assembly: Our thanks to Dolly and Deb Overly who, along with Pastor JMe, represented Zion at the Lower Susquehanna Synod Assembly at Messiah College on June 3 & 4.

<u>Personnel Team</u>: The Personnel Team has identified several viable candidates for the Children, Youth, & Family Ministry Director position and has begun holding initial interviews by phone, email, and skype. Initial and follow-up interviews will continue throughout the summer and the expectation and hope is that we will have a candidate in place by September. Additional information will follow to keep everyone apprised of the progress.





Summer Worship Project

During the services this summer, we are taking a journey through the history of Christian Worship, from shortly after the Crucifixion to the present day. From the Reformation on, the focus will be entirely on Lutheran Worship. We hope to foster an understanding and feeling for the development of our worship and how we got to where we are today.

The Sundays devoted to these teachings are as follows:

July 10 Roots of Catholic Worship (teaching sermon-focus on structure of worship. No special liturgy).

July 17 Reformation Worship (Liturgy in the style of Martin Luther's German Mass).

July 31 18th Century Worship (As Lutherans worshiped in the 1700s in Pa.

Aug 14 Early 20th Century Worship (Liturgy in the style used when Zion began).

Aug 21 Later 20th Century Worship (Liturgical renewal from the 1960s-1970s).

Sep 18 Back to 2 services. As we are today.

Our services on these Sundays will be in the style of the worship described. This is a rather ambitious project and will require much research. For about 10 years, Zion has hosted a weekly meal on Thursday evenings. Folks of all ages from the community around us as well as church members have enjoyed the good food and fellowship provided. The number of weekly guests typically ranges from 50 to 75. Meals are provided by local church groups, civic and student organizations, Girl and Boy Scout groups, as well as ministry teams, small groups and families of our congregation.

Since the Community Meal began, Joanne Grim has been the primary organizer and hostess for this weekly ministry. Many meals, she has prepared herself because there was no other group scheduled. For some time, she has asked to be relieved of some of her responsibilities so that she can free up her time to care for her great grand-children when this is needed. We give thanks to God for providing Joanne with the energy and commitment to lead this ministry throughout the years. We so greatly appreciate all that you have done, Joanne, for this outreach of Zion and for the guests who come on Thursdays for a good meal.

During June, a Community Meal Leadership
Team was formed, and several individuals agreed
to take on major tasks related to the Community
Meal and all the fellowship events during which
the kitchen is used. Joanne will continue to coordinate and develop the schedule of churches and
other groups who provide the meals. Randy Miller
will be scheduling weekly "Hosts" who will be
present. Jim Bear and Tom Williams will be working on kitchen inventory and purchasing of
supplies as well as reviewing the financial support

Family continues to oversee the weekly set-up of the Social Room for the meals. We are still in need of a person to be "Serve Safe" certified in order for our kitchen and food service to be in compliance with State regulations.

Many members of Zion have volunteered to be hosts or to provide meals throughout the years. For this, we thank you! After the summer break, the Community Meal will resume on September 1st. Please contact Joanne or Randy if you would like to participate by providing a meal or by serving as a Thursday Host. Training will be provided to prepare you for your service. The Community Meal will continue only if our church community continues to support it through donations to the "Friends in Need" Fund and through volunteering to help as hosts or meal providers.

THE GIFT OF PRAYER

Do you know that prayer is one of the most awesome gifts that God has given us? Prayer gives us the opportunity to have a relationship with God on a very personal and intimate level. "Finding The Way" Submitted by Burnell Hostetter

The Story about Former Wember, John Warren Long, Jr. John was the only member of Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church in Landisville who died in World War II.

John is referred to as "Johnny" in the book "Finding the Way" written by his step-son Andrew H. Farmer.

John's parents were J. Warren Long Sr. and Fanny Elizabeth Mann Long, who met while they attended Millersville State Normal School, now Millersville University. Mr. Long, after teaching one year in public school, decided to move with his bride back to the family farm in East Hempfield Township. They placed a high value on education; five of their six children -- Johnny, Charles, Ruth, Anne and Janet -- were able to attend college. A sixth child, Margaret, died at the age of five months, in 1915.

Johnny, born on August 17, 1919, was the next to youngest of the Long children. Johnny excelled in all of his classes in East Hempfield Township schools. While attending high school, Johnny was motivated scholastically by Mary Elizabeth Baker, later married to Samuel Dum. It was Johnny's goal to get a higher grade than Beth.

Johnny graduated from high school in 1937. He enrolled in Dickinson College and graduated in 1941 with a Bachelor of Philosophy degree, with majors in history, psychology, and German. In late 1939, he met his future wife, Mary Louise Hollinger. Mary Lou was the oldest of four siblings.

Johnny was drafted into the army in July 1941 and passed exams that qualified him to transfer to the Army Air Corps. He began his military career as a Private, but later took and passed exams to qualify for the aviation cadet program.

Johnny eventually achieved the rank of Captain and was a navigator in a B-25 on August 9, 1945 when his crew crashed and died while attacking one of the last Japanese air craft carriers, Kaiyo, in the Beppu Bay, Japan.

The American Army Air Corp dropped atom bombs on Hiroshima on August 6, 1945, and the second on August 9 on Nagasaki. The news media covered the bombings and the Japanese surrender on September 2, 1945 with practically no coverage on Johnny and his crew dying the same day as the bomb was dropped on

Nagasaki.

A memorial service at Zion was held for Johnny on September 9, 1945 led by Pastor Harold Dietz. Johnny was eventually returned to this country in 1949 and is buried in the Landisville Mennonite Cemetery.

Andrew Farmer has donated several copies of *Finding the Way* to Zion as an opportunity for us to learn more about our former member, John Long, and his service and sacrifice to our country.

Please contact me to borrow a copy of *Finding the Way*, as I will keep a record of who borrows a copy and who has returned it. Return copies can be placed in the Hostetter mail slot in the narthex. There are only a limited number of copies so please read and return them promptly so other members can enjoy the story about John Long.

Food Pantry Submitted by Diane Gerlach

In May, the pantry served 180 families which included 224 children, 376 adults, and 85 seniors for a total of 685 people served. We continue to register new families each month....in May we registered 11 new families.



During the month of May Zion members donated 225 pounds of food. Thank you for your weekly food donations and your continued financial contributions to the pantry. Your financial contributions are used to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank and "on sale" items at various grocery stores in the area.

During the month of May....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,863 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated 1,668 pounds of fresh produce and 169 pounds of bakery items; Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 173 pounds of bread and bakery items. S. Clyde Weaver donated 157 pounds of bread and bakery items; Forry's 64 pounds of produce; Giant of Kissel Hill, Lititz contributed 242 pounds of bakery items; Giant of Mount Joy donated 227 pounds of bakery items. The pantry purchased 775 pounds of food items through local grocery stores; 4,957 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank; and received 1,305 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program in Lancaster.

A "thank you" luncheon was held on May24 for pantry volunteers in appreciation for the hours they contribute to the pantry. (Thank you to Marie Adams, Donna Dumeyer, Nancy Myers and Joan Oberrender for serving the luncheon.) We continue to be blessed with many volunteers from the Hempfield area and our Hempfield community churches who give their time to the pantry.


Sixty four volunteers gave 580 hours during the month of May. Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give to serving them with a true servant's heart and a smile! We could not provide this important community service without our volunteers! The pantry continues to operate with a full non-paid staff.

Zion can be very proud to provide the space for this outreach mission to our families in the Hempfield School District who need help in providing food for their families. YOU are welcome to visit the community pantry located here at Zion on our "open" days (Monday and Wednesday from 9:00 AM to 1:00 P) to witness God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action!

During the summer months, when children are not in school, the need for extra food items escalates as many of the children of clients receive free and reduced lunches at school. The pantry acknowledges this and provides "extra" food items for the children's breakfast and lunch times. The "main" items needed (requested) for the pantry currently through June are cereal, jelly and 14 -16 ounce cans of fruit.

Cereal is ALWAYS a requested food item. Thank you!
