From The Director of Youth & Family Ministries:

What Lent Means To A Post-Modern World

I have served as a youth worker, leader, mentor and minister as a volunteer for over 17 years. prior to working as a full time staff person since 2002. I am in my 35th year of 'working' with the younger generation. I am frequently asked by many 'older' Christians: What is the younger generation all about? Who are they? What are they searching for? What are their needs, wants, and desires as young Christians? These young people grow and mature into young adults, adulthood and middle aged adults. I have lived long enough to witness first hand former youth who are now celebrating the marriage of their children! Life does go on!

As I enter the autumn of my career I know that the world around me is changing, but the need for Authentic, Affirming and Available adults is actually growing. Our world is hurting. Our young people are searching for hope in a world filled with war, hate and division among its leaders (politically and socially). We are all busy. Even our young people are busier today than those who grew up in the 80s and 90s. The need for mentoring young people is at a critical level. By spending an hour a week or a month getting to know a young person can and will make a difference in today's ever hectic and violent world. I did not grow up with a fear that someone could or would enter school property with guns with the intent to harm others. Regardless of the violent and divided culture we now live in, today's teens and young children are searching for answers, for love, for acceptance, for a path so that they can have the opportunity to make a difference. Without these "AAA adults," the faith we share, and the hope and grace that we live in as Christians, is dimmed. We are to be lights in a dark world. After 27 years in prison and the defeat of apartheid in South Africa, in 1994 President Nelson Mandela faced the daunting task of uniting the black majority and the powerful white minority. How to do it? The movie *Invictus* demonstrates that forgiveness can heal a nation—and use sports to do it. (The movie title comes from the enonymous poem written by William Ernest Hen

title comes from the eponymous poem written by William Ernest Henley in 1875.) Released in 2009, the film was directed by Clint Eastwood and stars Morgan Freeman and Matt Damon. Based on actual events, the film runs 133 minutes and is rated PG-13 for some brief strong language. Show time begins at <u>6:50PM</u> in the Zone (*Please note the time change*).

"Alleluias" During Lent?

Why don't we use alleluias during Lent?

Background

Based on the Hebrew word, *hallelu yah*, meaning "Praise the Lord," alleluia has been a word of great praise to God in the life of the church and was prominent in early Christian liturgies. Because of the penitential character of the season of Lent in the Western church, singing or saying the word "alleluia" has historically been suspended during Lent's forty days. This period of individual and congregational reflection on the quality of our baptismal faith and life suggests that the joyful nature of alleluia is more appropriately reserved for our Easter celebrations when it is given full and jubilant voice. An alternate gospel acclamation for Lent that omits the alleluia is provided for in Settings One through Ten of Holy Communion in *Evangelical Lutheran Worship*. Additional settings can be found in the Service Music portion (ELW #176-77) and in additional resources.

The omission of alleluia during Lent goes back at least to the fifth century in the western church. The custom of actually bidding it farewell, however, developed in the Middle Ages. The hymn "Alleluia, song of gladness" (*Evangelical Lutheran Worship* #318) contains a translation of an 11th century Latin text that compares an alleluialess Lent to the exile of the Israelites in Babylon. The text then anticipates the joy of Easter when glad alleluias will return in all their heavenly splendor.

Along with a sung farewell to alleluia, some congregations have embraced the practice of physically "burying" the alleluia. A banner or other visual presentation of the alleluia is crafted and then "buried" (see below). This ritual practice is can be especially delightful and meaningful for children.

<u>Practice</u>

When do we bury the alleluia? Alleluia is appropriately bid farewell on the Sunday preceding Ash Wednesday (the Transfiguration of Our Lord, also called the last Sunday after the Epiphany in the Lutheran liturgical calendar). This is the last Sunday when alleluia will be used until the Vigil of Easter, or Easter Sunday for those congregations not holding a Vigil. The burial of the alleluia could otherwise be the culminating activity at a congregational Carnival (also known as Mardi Gras or Shrove Tuesday) celebration just before Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent.

Tuesday Morning Lenten Bible Study

Lectio Divina: Listening to God Through the Epistles Beginning February 13th

A VERY ANCIENT art, practiced at one time by all Christians, is the technique known as *lectio divina* - a slow, contemplative praying of the Scriptures which enables the Bible, the Word of God, to become a means of union with God. This ancient practice has been kept alive in the Christian monastic tradition, and is one of the precious treasures of Benedictine monastics and oblates. Together with the Liturgy and daily manual labor, time set aside in a special way for *lectio divina* enables us to discover in our daily life an underlying spiritual rhythm. Within this rhythm we discover an increasing ability to offer more of ourselves and our relationships to the Father, and to accept the embrace that God is continuously extending to us in the person of his Son Jesus Christ.


During Lent, we will be using the Lectio Divina method to encounter and listen to God through the second lessons (Epistles) appointed for each Lenten Sunday, including Passion (Palm) Sunday.

Join us on Tuesday mornings, 9:30 -11 a.m., beginning February 13th for this opportunity to pray the scriptures during Lent.

As we read the scripture lessons, we will be:

- Listening for the Gentle Touch of Christ the Word
- Identifying How Christ the Word speaks to you, and
- Discovering what Christ the Word Invites you to DO

Sunday Lenten Study

SUNDAY SCHOLARS LENTEN STUDY: "HE CHOSE THE NAILS: What God Did to Win Your Heart"

Beginning Sunday, February 18, the "Parlor Class", also known as the "Sunday Scholars," will be using Max Lucado's program, "He Chose the Nails" as their Sunday morning study.

This program includes DVD presentations by Max Lucado and discussions of both the presentation and the scriptures cited.

Based on Mr. Lucado's popular book with the same title, this study gives participants the opportunity to delve into more deeply and appreciate more fully what Jesus Christ did for us when he chose the nails and the cross.

A Poem by Max Lucado

Long ago, even before he made the world, God loved us and chose us in Christ to be holy and without fault in his eyes.

His unchanging plan has always been to adopt us into his own family by bringing us to himself through Jesus Christ.

And this gave him great pleasure.

we praise God for the wonderful kindne

So we praise God for the wonderful kindness he has poured

out on us because we belong to his dearly loved Son.

He is so rich in kindness that he purchased our freedom

through the blood of his Son, and our sins are forgiven.... God's secret plan has now been revealed to us:

it is a plan centered on Christ, designed long ago according to his good pleasure.

And this is his plan:

At the right time he will bring everything together

under the authority of Christ—everything in heaven and on earth. Furthermore, because of Christ,

we have received an inheritance from God, for he chose us from the beginning, and all things happen just as he decided long ago.



Lenten Midweek Program & Theme

CROSS+WALK

"During the Middle Ages the practice of going on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem and, while there, following the path of Jesus' journey to the cross became a very popular devotion. To this day people still travel to Jerusalem in order to follow the footsteps of Jesus on the Via Dolorosa, the Way of Sorrows.

"Medieval pilgrims upon their return to Europe told others about their deeply moving experiences. Some of them even wrote books travelogues of sorts, describing the experience. Many more people than were able desired to make the journey. Thus, the practice developed of making a simulated journey.

"Some went so far as to construct scale models of the Way of Sorrows in order to simulate the journey in their own back-yards. Out of this grew the devotion of the Stations of the Cross.

"There are fourteen stations [in Roman Catholic tradition... each representing some event which, in tradition, took place as Jesus made his ascent to Calvary and the Cross." Although some Protestant churches follow the Roman Catholic stations, During the devotion of walking the stations, the worshipper is led through a series of prayers and scripture readings, one set for each station. By means of this

guided devotion the worshipper vicariously accompanies Jesus on that final journey. It is, in other words, a walk with Jesus."

There are also Protestant versions that have a different order and number. Protestant versions tend to focus on actual scriptural passages that describe the events that took place as Jesus made his ascent to Calvary and the Cross.

At Zion this year, we will focus on five significant "stations" of Jesus' journey to the cross through Cross+Walk, a program developed by Pastor JMe. An introduction to this Lenten theme will be provided during worship on Ash Wednesday, February 14, 12:00 & 7:00 PM. On Wednesdays during the Lenten season, beginning February 21, our Cross+Walk journey will begin. Each Wednesday of the season we will gather for a cross-generational event beginning with a soup supper followed by activities and worship for all ages.

First Holy Communion Instruction

Holy Communion Minister Training Saturday, February 17, 10:30-11:30 AM

"A celebration of Holy Communion in the home, at the bedside of an ill or homebound person, or in a clinical setting such as a nursing home, hospital or hospice, is one way for congregations to provide for communion of the ill, homebound, imprisoned, and others. This church provides two ways for this ministry to be carried out. The first is a service of Holy Communion led by an ordained pastor; the second is a distribution of the bread and wine that has been sent from the Sunday assembly's worship.



In the second option, the communion elements received by the ill, homebound, or imprisoned have been broken and shared at the assembly's worship and then brought to them as an extension of the worship that Sunday. This ministry offers these people (those unable to attend worship) a means of participating in the worship of the whole assembly, and it helps those who have gathered publicly to recognize their oneness with sisters and brothers who are absent. During 2017, the meeting of team leaders faced some obstacles with scheduling and lack of participation. Therefore, we are "re-forming" this "team of team leaders" in 2018. Our first meeting will be on Tuesday, February 27th, at 7 p.m. The Council Liaisons for the teams are invited to attend this meeting.

Three Lancaster Clergymen Who Made a Difference

Tuesday, January 30 | 7:00 - 8:30 pm Parish Resource Center FREE to PRC Member Churches

Led by Robert A. Frick, Ed.D., educator and member of *Lampeter Church of the Brethren*

Join us for a lively & entertaining workshop on the history of three Lancaster City clergymen! This workshop will discuss Reverend Thomas Barton, 1730-1780, Anglican Priest at Saint James; Gotthilf Henry Ernestus Muhlenberg, 1753-1815, Lutheran Pastor at Holy Trinity Lutheran; and Clifford Gray Twombly, 1869-1942, Episcopal Minister at Saint James—and the impact that they each had on the Lancaster community. Each was a dominant force in the community during the time of their service to their respective flocks in Lancaster.

Robert Frick is a graduate of Millersville University receiving a Bachelor of Science in education and a Master of Science in education, and earning a doctorate in educational administration from Temple University. Dr. Frick worked 45 years in the Lampeter-Strasburg School District and served as a teacher, administrative assistant, Director of Elementary Education, Assistant Superintendent, and Superintendent. Since retiring in 2011, he has researched and shared more than 175 historical presentations on persons of local, national, and international importance.
