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FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR BARBARA CARUANA

Since we are now in the summer season when things tend to slow down in the church and Sunday church attendance and giving generally declines, I thought I would do something a little different for Zion's newsletter. Instead of focusing on why attendance and giving is down in the summer months (which we know happens every summer), I thought I would focus on a single verse of the Bible and provide a devotional based on that verse. Martin Luther called this "the gospel in miniature." Enjoy!

COME ON IN, THE WATER'S FINE

Finally, he took me to the inside court of the Temple of God.
-Ezekiel 8:16 (The Message)

Have you noticed that most people, when they come to worship, don't sit up front? The back of the church tends to fill up first, almost as predictably as the bottom of a glass will be the first to be filled with water. Why is that? If we were attending a concert or a lecture, we would more than likely charge down front where the "good seats" are. But why not when we come to worship?

I've heard several theories for this phenomenon. For example: People want to be able to see who else is there, which is easier to do from the back. And it's easier to slip out quickly after worship if you sit in the back.

Those explanations may be part of the reason for sitting in the back, but I have another theory. I think folks don't immediately go to the front because that would feel like a definitive declaration of faith. Sitting in the back, you can still feel as if you have one foot in and one (Cont'd on page 2)

foot out. To stride down the aisle and sit in the front feels like skipping right to the "your whole self in" part of the hokey pokey, and folks may not be ready for that. Our own experience of faith often is more qualified, more tentative than that.

If doubt or uncertainty disqualified us from worship, we would have many empty churches. Some of us live lives of doubt, modified by faith. Others live a life of faith modified by doubt. But the good news is that in the church, there is room for both. Even (or should I say especially) in the front of the church!


In the Temple in Jerusalem, there was an inner court, reserved for the righteous, and an outer court for everyone else. I'm grateful that, in the congregations I have served, there were no outer courts, just inner courts, and all were always invited in – no matter who they were. So come on in, the water's fine.

Let us pray: Thank you, God, that your invitation to us is not based on righteousness, but instead flows from your graciousness. Amen.

JAMES DUNLAP RE-ELECTED BISHOP OF THE LOWER SUSQUEHANNA SYNOD

CHICAGO – The Rev. James S. Dunlop was elected June 8 to serve a second six-year term as bishop of the Lower Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The election took place during the synod assembly, held June 6-8 at Messiah College in Grantham, Pa.

Dunlop was elected on the fourth ballot, with 319 votes. The Rev. Stephen R. Herr, pastor of Christ Evangelical Lutheran Church in Gettysburg, Pa., received 141.



Prior to becoming bishop, Dunlop served as pastor of St. John's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Littlestown, Pa., from 2005 to 2013.

The bishop received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Gettysburg College in 1978 and a Master of Divinity degree from Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg (now United Lutheran Seminary) in 2005. Gettysburg College is one of 26 ELCA colleges and universities. United Lutheran Seminary is one of seven ELCA seminaries.

The homeschool group meetings held in our church will no longer be held here because of a change in direction on their end. The group leader thanked our church for allowing them to use our facility.







GETTYSBURG BUS TRIP...IN CASE YOU COULDN'T GO...

Twelve of us from Zion set off by van on Saturday morning, June 8th, for a day of touring at the Gettysburg National Battlefield. **Steve Haun** graciously agreed to drive the van and got us to and from Gettysburg safely...and with some time to spare in our schedule. Great job, Steve!

Our first stop was the original Lutheran Seminary whose iconic cupola served as an observation post on the first day of the battle, July 1,1863. The Adams County Historical Society has transformed this building into the Seminary Ridge Museum, housing exhibits of artifacts connected to the battle around the seminary. There were videos depicting scenes of the battle, along with photos and quotes of seminary residents present during the battle. As a makeshift hospital during and after the battle, displays illustrating treatment of the wounded showed the difficult plight they faced. It is important to note that many, if not most, of the casualties resulting from the battle came from infection and disease. There was also biographic information on some of the seminary residents and leaders, along with a presentation of the major issue of the day: the abolition of slavery. The museum lived up to its billing, "the second-best museum in Gettysburg." (Cont'd on pg.8)





Growing Spiritually

5 Things You Should Do This Summer to Grow Spiritually (Make the most out of the time)

With summer in full swing, it's easy to get into the rhythm of letting the days slip by without much intentionality. The sun shines longer, we play harder and many of us take extra days off from work. But while we may want to let go of some stressors during the summer, one thing we don't want to let go of is our spiritual growth.

Here are five ways to keep growing spiritually during the summer months:

1.) GET OUTSIDE!

With nicer weather comes great opportunity to experience God's beauty in creation and let it shape our prayers and our worship. Take a prayer walk around your neighborhood, asking God to give you His heart for your community and the people there—and let the sights and sounds of where you live inspire your prayers. Or go on a hike and take your Bible with you and read Psalm 19 or Psalm 8 out loud, thanking God for how he's created the earth and given you life. Swim in the ocean (or the pool!) and break to read John 7:37-39, considering the living water that Christ gives to us that sustains our very spirit.

With a little creativity, our time outdoors in the summer can be a wonderful way to attend to God's presence in the world and to thank him for his goodness and love!

2.) MAKE THE EFFORT TO GET TO CHURCH.

I know, I know. With summer travel, vacations and holidays, it's easy to blow off church on the weekends. But even if you're traveling, find a church you can attend on Sunday. It's a wonderful way to continue growing in relationship with God, to get to know other believers and to experience church in a new way.



God's people are worshipping all over the world—go ahead and join them, wherever you are!

3.) MIX UP YOUR BIBLE-READING ROU-TINE.

Instead of getting stuck in a rut this summer or doing the same old thing in your personal devotional life, consider trying something new. Join the Tuesday morning Bible study, or join an online community participating in a Bible study together (for example, shereadstruth.com and hereadstruth.com are great places to start).

If you're already in a group study, consider a new way of engaging the Bible personally through the practice of *Lectio Divina* or a similar spiritual discipline.

4.) SERVE IN A NEW WAY.

Summer can become a self-focused time if we let it; we think about our bucket lists and how we want to spend our days. But growing in Christ means continuing to serve those around us, and with school out, churches and communities have a lot of opportunities to serve kids, families and seniors in new ways.

You might volunteer to help with a summer church programs or use the extra hours of daylight to stop by a nursing home and visit with some elderly neighbors. Take a weekend and serve at a food pantry, or volunteer to help a family in your church by offering free childcare on a weeknight.

5.) STAY IN CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY.

While our schedules ebb and flow in the summer, one of the best ways to continue to grow in our relationship with the Lord is to get consistent time with others who know and love him, too. As the Scripture reminds us: "... let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another ..." (Hebrews 10:24-25).
