point on why I made them. I made the people of God because I love and honor them so much. Can't they see I make only beautiful pieces of humanity? Each individual that I create is unique and sacred. Why can't they see this?

POZ: I never gave that a thought, God. I don't always get it. I feel that you are out there in the chaos of the universe. I can't imagine that you, the Divine Mystery, dwell in me! Maybe that *is* what I will focus on this year, our journey together.

God: That's right, my child, our journey together! All I ever ask is that you open your heart to me. Allow me in so I can show you how beautiful you are. I gave you Jesus to help you see that I realize humanity is difficult. There are so many distractions that surround you each day: your cell phones and technology consumes you, music and noise, pettiness and anger, sickness and death, guilty feelings, hurts, shameful acts, wounds of unfaithfulness, the lack of forgiveness, fears of everyday life and facing the challenges each day. This is all stuff. Push it aside and simply let me in.

POZ: You sure are asking an awful lot of me!

God: No, I am not! I'm simply asking you to take these days of Lent, clear the clutter and simply be with me, with Jesus. Walk with my son these next few weeks; see what he did for you. See how he reached out to the poor. Watch how compassionate he was with the sick. Watch how he touched those who were untouchable. Watch how he forgave those who hurt him so much. Jesus showed you the way. Simply follow his footsteps. Allow the grace to pour over you. Allow peace to enter your pores and you will feel a freedom that only you can retrieve from within your own heart.

POZ: God, you are asking a lot. It was simpler "giving something up". But I'll give it a try.

God: Good, my child. I only ask you to try! I have asked nothing more from you than I have asked from Jesus himself. Just know that I am always with you. In everything you do or say I am there. Try to trust these words.

POZ: That's a lot to ask God. You know it's not that easy to trust. But I will try it your way this time.

God: I am glad to hear this, my child! Know I am with you on this journey of 40 days. All I ask is that you try each day. I look forward to being on this journey with you and Jesus.

WHAT IS RESURRECTION?

An Easter Reflection



Why are eggs associated with Easter? Why are they such a powerful symbol of resurrection? The word needs some care. It is not resuscitation, as if Jesus were simply brought back to life, like Lazarus or the widow's son at Nam. Resurrection is transformation. The symbols of resurrection are many.

So then, why eggs and Easter? An egg is totally changed. What is yellow and white liquid becomes alive with feathers and a chirp. If you look at the liquid of eggs alone, you would never tell what they would become. A liquid goo becomes a chicken – a sea gull, crow or magpie. Another Easter symbol is the seed, or acorn. You can look at a seed and never imagine what color it may turn out to have. Similarly, with a caterpillar and butterfly. These are resurrection symbols because they become something else, totally unforeseen and beautiful. And yet there is continuity: the egg becomes a chicken; an acorn becomes an oak-tree; a caterpillar becomes a butterfly.

There are also human resurrection symbols: persons recovering from drug addiction or alcoholism become what they have despaired of happening. They are the same persons, but now transformed; they have new life, new hopes, and new possibilities. Another resurrection symbol might be a teenager becoming an adult: he or she is the same, but different with the new beauties of maturity.

The resurrection is an invitation to look around to see transformation, to see what is evil being changed, what is immature becoming adult; what appears inert like an egg or seed sprouting life.

But for the Christian the resurrection has a still richer meaning. St. Paul, clearly repeating a catechetical formula that he had learned, says to the Corinthians:

I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day according to the scriptures.

We can unravel this text by looking at accounts of the resurrection. They are quite subtle. The first thing we can see is that Jesus “was raised on the third day.” Who raised him? The Father by the power of the Holy Spirit. When we look at the resurrection appearances, we notice that Jesus is not at first recognized by those who loved him and who were his close associates or disciples. The exception seems to be the Beloved Disciple who had special insight. The others come to faith; indeed, faith was necessary to identify Jesus. The Risen Jesus is then the same but different. This can be put in another way by saying that Jesus is not resuscitated but is resurrected.

Christ is risen and has promised to take us with him. This life is not the end; we too will be transformed in endless life and beauty. Human life is good, but it will end. The resurrection gives hope and meaning to our existence here. In our weakness we will after death be raised in glory. Again, there is continuity: it is I (not just my body) that I hope will be raised. As Paul writes:

So, it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor; it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness; it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body; it is raised a spiritual body.

† The victory has been won for you! Alleluia!

In February, the Council retreat was held in the Zone. Much time was spent exploring the concept of church identity and from where our focus should be. It was very productive, and now committees will take that all to the next step. Additionally, we worked on another goal of Council: *To Become More Visible within the Community*. Many suggestions were made and action was discussed. We thank all those who gave up their Saturday for the good of the congregation.

Stone Soup Old Tale = Stewardship Lesson for Today

Intrigued, the villagers watch him as he begins to stir his “soup.” Eventually, one brings a couple of potatoes to add to the mix; another has a few carrots. One person adds an onion, another a handful of barley. A farmer donates some milk. Eventually, the “stone soup” becomes a tasty chowder.



The story above appeared in the “Our Daily Bread” devotional booklet for January 16, 2020. As I started to read this story, I immediately thought that this is how stewardship is meant to work. We all have been given different and unique talents so when we work with others, our combined effort is far more greater than our talents taken separately. God did not give anyone all the talents and money they would ever need to live and succeed in this life. We all rely on many other people with special abilities to do various tasks we cannot do or at least not do well.
