◆ Council Update Submitted by Adele King

We have been quite busy over the past few months! Our most noteworthy event was the hiring of Pastor Barbara Caruana as our interim pastor. This took place after communications with the synod and interviews with possible candidates. We also hosted the community meal on October 18th. On November 4th, we held an informational session with the congregation. We discussed, at the meeting, the candidates for next years term. Specifically, Joel Janisewski, Brenda Stover and Riley Klepper would remain on the council, while Dave Dumeyer would be our new council nominee. Scott and Mary Hetrick agreed to be our representatives to the synod event in June. Since that time, all were approved by the congregation. Also discussed was the budget and how we would be impacted by renovations to our bathrooms and roof, as well as hiring nursery attendants. This is something we feel is holding us back from attracting young families.

John Hay gave an overview of our budget and our endowments. He noted that the Betty Lou Hoffman endowment should provide us with about \$60,000 each year. It is still imperative that we increase our giving along with attempting to attract new members. Mark Coons spoke about our facility needs and an ADA bathroom improvement campaign was discussed. Then, we held our annual congregational meeting on November 18th. Attendance at this meeting was 68, and the budget passed, as did all representatives to synod and members to council.

We, then, met again on November 19th. A job description for nursery attendants is being written by the personnel team. Discussions were held on IT, safe church committee, and youth involvement in the services. As a part of our strategic planning, we had further discussion on how to improve the welcoming appearance of Zion. Many suggestions were made and it was decided that we might find a task force to oversee some of the upcoming projects. Since then, Jeff really made some positive changes in the narthex and hallway. We heartily thank him for his efforts! We also discussed ways to engage the congregation and how to encourage their involvement in the life of the church.

At the December meeting, It was decided to look, once again, at a spiritual gifts type of survey and identify a way to match people with an opportunity to serve. New officers were elected at the meeting: I will continue as president, and vice-president will be Mark Coons. All of the non-voting members were given a vote of confidence, and Secretary, Brenda Stover was voted in at the congregational meeting. The personnel team submitted a nursery attendant position description. That was accepted and a search to fill the positions will begin. A recommendation was made by them, also, to make an amendment to our constitution. The congregation will receive an email stating this, and it will be voted on by the congregation on December 30th. Appointments of the personnel team were made for 2019 and 2020. Team liaisons were assigned for the year. (Cont'd on pg. 4)

The IT team gave us a handout to peruse regarding very specific policies, regarding best practices. Guidelines will be established. The "safe church" team will meet this

month regarding safe church policies, and will come back with a set of guidelines to be followed. I went over a list of items that I felt had been forgotten throughout the year, and most were resolved. Team members were asked to think about a recommendation for strategic planning: meeting people "where they are", options for worship and focusing on our mission.

Our thanks to Dave Dumeyer for agreeing to join the council this year. Also, thanks to Jeff and Anne for sprucing up Cooper House. Special thanks to Scott Hetrick for serving on council and serving as vice-president. Thanks to the Financial Team for their work on the budget and the council



for their leadership during some tough times here at Zion. Pastor Caruana has been a Godsend and the amount of things she has

accomplished in less than a month is incredible. We are all looking forward to a renewed spirit and refreshed energy as we ring in the New Year!!


At Zion, we share many friendships and connections. These relationships are evident when we Share the Peace in the worship service. When we serve together in church activities, our connections grow even stronger.








KIDS' CLUB WEDNESDAY!

Assistant Organist of the Day

dwindling number of organists among us. Countless hours have been spent locally, regionally, and nationally trying to address the issue. The American Guild of Organists, for example, includes a Committee on the New Organist, whose purpose

is to create the materials and means for engaging and developing new organists, as well as to develop and promote programs and age-appropriate materials to introduce them to the organ and enable their development as organists. The committee oversees the presentation of POEs [pipe organ encounters] and POE+s in addition to PipeWorks programs. The committee develops educational opportunities and presentations to introduce non-organists of all ages to the organ.1

I have wrestled with this question and presented numerous workshops for children to introduce them to the pipe organ. The congregation I serve is fortunate to have a pipe organ that is easily accessible for workshops with children. Students have a chance to sit at the console, play notes, push pistons, view the inside of the pipe chamber, learn about the parts of a pipe, and take home a custom-made coloring book. Children enjoy touching things. They even get the chance to hold sample pipes. At the organ workshop during Vacation Bible School last summer, 70 children (and a handful of adults) learned a little bit about this majestic instrument in the sanctuary.

As a follow-up to the VBS workshop, I invited children to sit with me one or two at a time at the console during worship. Thus commenced our "Assistant Organist of the Day" experiment. It has been very successful. How am I measuring success? Here are three indicators:

- An announcement was made at the end of August and a sign-up sheet posted on a bulletin board. Students began signing up immediately. From the first Sunday in September through Dec. 20, an assistant organist or two has been sitting on the bench
- The sign-up sheet has had to be replaced twice because it was full.
- Adults are beginning to sign up, too.

The enthusiasm is spreading through the Sunday school classrooms, into the sanctuary, and into students' homes. These assistant organists share about their experiences:

"I wasn't nervous since
I wasn't playing. I liked
pushing the stops, the notes,
and the chimes. It was fun. I
would definitely do it again"
(Bradley, age nine).

- "I liked watching how fast Mr. Ryan's hands and feet were moving on the organ. I usually get nervous when I am in front of a whole group of people. It was hard to sit up straight without a back rest for such a long time" (Jonah, age seven).
- "[This is a] great way to inspire the next generation of church musicians. And my son looks forward to going to church!" (Karen, parent).

Perhaps the greatest measure of success came one Sunday about 6 weeks into the experiment. I was playing the postlude when out of the corner of my eye I noticed five children nearly running across the sanctuary to stand behind me and watch. Some of them made themselves quite at home and slid right onto the bench. (An endearing comment: after about 30 seconds, one of the young ladies looked up at me and asked, "When are you going to be done playing?") Adults have also enjoyed being an assistant.

Assistants actually do not need any preparation, and I try to tailor the experience to the person. Generally, however, they do the following:

- turn the organ on and off;
- prepare the next hymn, and stay a step ahead of the worshipping congregation;
- push pistons, especially the "general cancel" at the end of each piece;



- select individual stops;
- activate the zimbelstern;
- turn pages, if confident; and
- give pitches to the pastor for intonation.

This is also an opportunity to help younger children follow the liturgy. Advent Lutheran Church has plenty of service music, which keeps us busy. During the Scripture readings the assistant and I follow along, and I encourage them to say the responses. At the sermon we always take a break from the organ bench and sit down away from the console. Assistants are thoroughly engaged during the entire worship, more so than when sitting in the pew. To date, we have had zero

issues with lack of attention or misbehaving.

At the conclusion of worship each student is seated for a picture on the bench, and they receive an official "Assistant Organist" certificate. The picture is posted in a very visible place in the church and, more importantly, a copy is mailed to the assistant with a thank you note within one day. Children especially enjoy receiving mail specifically addressed to them.

There is much support and cooperation from our pastor and the congregation for this project. We are blessed to enjoy an environment of grace (and a certain degree of tolerance), which

goes a long way toward fostering learning and excitement not only among the assistants but also in the congregation at large.

Part of this experiment includes being quite vulnerable to "accidents." Practically speaking, you never know what might happen at the console, especially with younger students. Consider, for example, what if the assistant slipped off the bench onto the pedals? Or an overly enthusiastic youngster just wants to play?

At the end of the day, success is measured in the form of engaged members of the worship assembly and a "thank you." In the long term, maybe one of these students will begin taking lessons. Or maybe, if they are not a musician, they will become a supporter of music. At the very least they will continue to develop a love of music that will last a lifetime.


Wired Word Class: Every Sunday at 9:15 AM in the Social Room

Well, the donations that you make are sold at the Community Aid store on Columbia for a fraction of the price that new clothing costs. It helps people in need have nice clothing to wear. And as for Zion, for each pound donated in the box, Zion gets a small donation.

OK - cool! But what aboutPark City Diner??We certainly know how it benefits us - a great meal at a reasonable price. But how does it benefit Zion and the community? As for the community - do you know how many people Park City Diner employs??!!Ok, that's a stretch, but I'm sure the staff appreciates your business and tips.

So, how much do these organizations bring in? Well, I cannot itemize it, but I am told that during 2018, we received \$204 from the organizations combined. Not a large sum of money, but every little bit helps. Some of that money was designated to your Outreach Team, and all of that was used to support local charities.

♦ Food Pantry Submitted by Diane Gerlach

In November, the pantry served 163 families of which 209 were children; 374 adults; 94 seniors for a total of 677 persons served. Clients may visit the pantry once a week, either Monday or Wednesday...an average of 75-100 families visit the pantry each week.

"Thank you" to our Zion members who contributed 135 pounds of food items to the pantry. "Thank you" to the Zion members who continue to contribute financially to the pantry. Monetary contributions help the pantry to purchase food items not regularly donated as meats, eggs in addition to the purchase of "high demand" items as cereal, rice, peanut butter, jelly, canned vegetables, soups, and fruits. Financial contributions also allow the pantry to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank once a month at greatly reduced prices and at local stores when needed items are on sale.

Due to the closing of Darrenkamps, Mount Joy..... fresh produce is now being purchased through your financial contributions.

Currently, requested food items are: cereal, oatmeal, pancake mix, syrup, canned corn. canned fruit, boxed pasta, elbow macaroni, egg noodles, chunky peanut butter, jelly, canned spinach, canned mixed vegetables, canned corn, canned kidney beans, canned carrots, canned tomatoes, canned

pineapple, canned peaches, canned fruit cocktail, canned chicken noodle soup, canned/jar spaghetti sauce,...NO GREEN BEANS, please!!! We are overstocked with green beans!!!!!

During the month of November.... Giant Mount Joy donated 479 pounds of bread and bakery items and 332 pounds of food items; Weis Market in Columbia donated 726 pounds of bread and bakery items: Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 827 bakerv items and 53 pounds meat products; S. Clyde Weaver donated 132 pounds of bakery item; Stauffers of Rohrerstown donated 22 pounds of food items. The pantry purchased 6,006 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank and 3.216 pounds from local grocery stores. The pantry received 974 pounds of free food items from Community **Action Program**. In addition to the above donations and purchases, 10,292 pounds came from the community which includes donations from the churches, schools, businesses, social and civic organizations and private individuals. The pantry also received \$2,278. in grocery store gift cards.

Welcome to Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church, East Petersburg... they have joined the list of churches contributing food items to the pantry!

Sixty-four volunteers gave 575 hours during the month of No**vember.** The pantry is a complete volunteer effort, operating with a full non-paid staff. Many volunteers "work behind the scenes" on days other than "open" days of Monday and Wednesday. There are "pick-ups" of staples, fresh produce, and bakery items made throughout the week at the various businesses. In addition. there is an office staff documenting the donations received, clients served and completing other required reports for the Central Penn Food Bank. We could not provide this important community service without our volunteers! Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give with a true servant's heart and a smile!

AND, the pantry would not be able to provide this program to the Hempfield residents without the outreach mission of Zion with the use of Zion's property. This mission is a witness of God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action! In appreciation, the pantry contributed \$500. to Zion in December for utility use.

• Faith Statement Submitted by Dave Dumeyer

"A.L.S." I doubt there are fewer dreaded combinations of letters than these three. This diagnosis of ALS—amyotrophic lateral sclerosis, or Lou Gehrig's disease—is a death sentence. There is no cure, no treatment as yet to send it into remission. The average patient with ALS survives for two to five years. There is a progressive loss of neuro-muscular functions that lead to stiffness of limbs, lack of feeling in the extremities. A halting gait, slurred speech, the inability to talk eventually begins. Later, there is lack of ability to move, compromised breathing and swallowing. Dementia might occur in some cases. Ultimately so much stops functioning that death occurs. It is a horrible, devastating disease that impacts families. And no one knows what triggers it; it just happens.

So it is with our younger daughter Jennifer who, at age 46, became a patient with ALS. A warm person with a beautiful smile, a beloved pre-K teacher, mother of three and devoted wife. And a follower of Jesus Christ. (That last is vitally important.)

Jen had always been physically active. At age 45 she was running two to three miles amidst a busy schedule of teaching and a bustling household. One year later, in May 2018, she received the fateful news from one of the foremost neurologists at the University of Pennsylvania. Donna and I were with her and listened as a machine picked up the scrambled crackling of neurons firing out of sync, sure signs of ALS. We all cried together. As the news spread throughout our family, her friends, the community and the church, the outpouring of love and support was unimaginable.

As a Christian, the questions that loom over our thinking on this tragedy are these: "Why did this happen? How can a loving GOD even allow this to happen?" In the back of our minds they haunt us.

My answer to the first is, I don't know why this happened. GOD created a world of beauty and order. And yet mankind has brought disorder to the world. Our bodies are not perfect. Each of us has genetics that predispose us to certain illnesses. There are things in our natural environment that can sicken us. And then there is just dumb luck, the law of averages randomly playing out. I have no idea which one or number of these things impacted our daughter's health. But I do know that GOD, who wants our happiness and peace, did not cause this.


Such questions lead us into examining our beliefs. How do we pray? Is it for miracles? What if a miracle doesn't happen? There are some that might think disease is brought about because of some awful sin we have committed. Others might suggest that miracles won't happen if we don't pray hard enough, without defining "hard enough." I pray for a miracle. (*Cont'd on pg. 15*)

My hope for our daughter is in GOD. I do NOT expect GOD to cause a remission of this disease in an instant, although I never doubt that he can do this. But why a miracle for her her and not the thousands of others with ALS. The miracle for which I pray is that the medical researchers soon will unlock the secrets of the disease and discover its cure. We pray also for strength and patience for Jen and her family until that day arrives. And I pray that whatever the outcome might be, Jen's life will be a testimony to GOD and Jesus Christ.

Jen has told us that GOD is in control of her life. She has already been blessed by the outpouring of love from those who know her. If her life can touch so many in this way, GOD is even now bringing about His Kingdom. One day, we will all stand pure and perfect in the light of our Savior and Redeemer. Against that, ALS cannot prevail.


