

Friends in Christ ...

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life."

It happens every year on Thanksgiving Day. You can * almost set a clock by it. My family and I will be sitting around the dining room table, stuffing our faces with once-a-year delicacies, when someone (with their * mouth full) says, "So, what do you want for Christmas?

I'll be starting my Christmas shopping tomorrow."

As soon as those words are blurted out, I get a knot in my stomach ... not because I don't want to get people gifts, but because the thought of running around like a crazy person (no editorial comments, please) wears me down before I even get started. But the truth is, gift buying and gift giving is a big part of Christmas. After all, Christmas is the time when we celebrate the greatest gift the world has ever known ...God's gift of Jesus Christ.

The three Magi began the tradition of gift giving to celebrate the arrival of Christ. They endured a long, difficult journey to bring their gifts to Jesus. Council Report (Submitted by Adele King)

At the September meeting, Council was presented with the proposed budget for 2020. The personnel team presented their suggestions for staff salaries, based on performance. Salaries and cost cutting measures were discussed. In addition, Pastor Caruna's contract was discussed, and as soon as the numbers are decided, it will be signed.

We also discussed what the steps are for moving forward with writing the church profile and forming a call committee for a new pastor. It was decided that a team would be formed to begin writing the church profile in January. Those who have been asked and agreed to serve on the profile writing team include: Doug Rhoads, Jeff Thompson, Al Ramer, Evan Benedict, Brenda Stover, Mary Hetrick, Lynda Sherwood and Corrie Stream.

In addition, as follow-up to conversations about how Zion can enhance security, Dave Dumeyer had met with local police to evaluate our current secure church policies and see what improvements could be made. Action steps were discussed. As part of this discussion, Brenda Stover pointed out how we need to look at the key issue policy and follow it as closely as we possibly can, given the large number of keys that are out. This will be something that is addressed more fully in the new year, as the Property Team is looking to rekey the locks.

Looking ahead to the Annual Congregational Meeting on November 17 following both services, possible Council nominations and Synod reps were discussed. Diane Ramer, Riley Klepper, and I have all agreed to run to serve again in 2020. Mark Coons has decided not to run for a second term, and, since the meeting, Cathy Benedict has agreed to run to fill his seat. We thank Mark for his valuable service to this Council! Brenda Stover and Lisa Nelson have agreed to be our representatives at the Synod Assembly in June. It was confirmed that 2 females could be reps, as opposed to one male and one female. We will also vote on the new purpose statement: *United in Christ, we are called to love and serve*. There will be an information session on Sunday, November 3 between the services at 9:15 AM in the Sanctuary.

As has been an item of discussion for some time, a vote was taken to form a Mutual Ministry Team at Zion. This team will serve as a sounding board for the pastor, staff, and members of the church. More information about this will be forthcoming.

Discussion was held regarding lighting in the Narthex. The Property Team will follow-up on this and see what can be done to improve this entrance area by seeing what alternative lighting options make sense.

Some changes will be put into place concerning Assistant Ministers. Stay tuned for more details about this and when training session(s) will be held.

Having had the Nursery Attendants and child care for about 6 months now, we discussed how that is going so far. We will reevaluate again in April.

Pastor Caruana updated the Council on the Fall Harvest Bash and the progress that is being made on making this exciting fellowship event come to life!

Anne presented information concerning 2 companies that we are considering in order to purchase or lease a new copier/printer for Cooper House. She and Pastor Caruana will decide which of them to go with and then Anne will follow-up with a few final questions before making the final decision.

Council Goals for 2020 were presented, and we decided to put them into proper format at the October meeting. These goals will then help guide Council and the ministry teams through what is done and how it will be accomplished in the coming year.

Since there were conflicts with the usual Council meeting date in October, the meeting will be held one week later than normal on October 28th. We, as a Council, will also have a special meeting on Wednesday, October 9th, to discuss budget only. This will prepare us in enough time to get letters out to the congregation concerning our budget proposals.

A Team Leaders meeting was held also on the 30th of September. They were briefed and updated on these above items and had time for discussion.

Nothing can be reported on the October meeting yet as we are meeting after the newsletter goes to print.

Continue to rise to the challenges, enjoy the Harvest Bash, and spend time evaluating your time and talent and how you can help!! We continue to move forward, and can use all the help we can get!!!

⇒ Invite someone to church this month.





Healthy Congregations

Healthy Congregations: Impact of Emotional Triangles on Conflict in the Church

Emotional triangles are a feature of every relationship system. Understanding their nature, formation and behavior is essential to understanding what is happening in a church.

Emotional triangles form as a result of tension between any two people. Two-person relationships are inherently unstable; when anxiety between persons develops, one or the other or both will pass the anxiety to a third person, in an attempt to release the tension or getting the third party to influence the behavior of the other person. Any unresolved tension with another person or situation can become the occasion for scapegoating or blaming another person for one's problems.

EXAMPLES:

- ⇒ A church member has a problem with the pastor (or any other staff member). The person works on other people to influence the pastor, herself remaining anonymous in the process. (Passive-aggressive behavior)
- ⇒ A family experiences the death of the father. Unresolved issues with the father exist. The pastor makes a small mistake in the funeral service. All the anger of the family is transferred on to the pastor, wo is criticized for everything he does.
- ⇒ A woman who has been a strong supporter of the pastor continually criticizes him at a council meeting, no matter what he says or does. He goes to visit her and discovers that she is anxious about her husband's upcoming heart surgery, and upset about her daughter's pregnancy to a married man.
- ⇒ In the Bible, when God confronts Adam, he avoids the issue by blaming Eve (and God). Eve in turn blames the snake. Both are evading responsibility by triangulating behavior.

How do they function?

Triangles function to preserve themselves, opposing efforts to change them. Triangles transfer stress to the most vulnerable or responsible member. In a church, this is often the pastor.

As stress in a system increases, triangles will begin to multiply and interlock. The whole system becomes stuck.

Triangles negatively reinforce 'treadmills', the same issue over and over or in a different form.

They do not promote clarity, because they distort perceptions and <u>foster secrecy</u>. They inhibit decisiveness and transmit stress because people do not take responsibility for themselves or their actions.

People who resort to triangling behavior cannot function this way on their own. They <u>need</u> <u>people who will support their behavior</u>, much like a host cell accepts a virus in the disease process. (Cont'd on pg. 9)

What's the solution?

The only solution is detriangling, to make the two in conflict responsible for their own relationship, or the other person responsible for his problem, while staying connected. The worst position is the togetherness position, where the third person feels responsible for keeping the system together or 'saving' the other person.

Members who have a complaint, issue or suggestion for a specific person, should <u>speak</u> to them <u>directly</u> and discuss their concerns. Complaining to other members without speaking to the person with whom you have a concern, is not supportive of a healthy relationship or a healthy congregation.

Members need to recognize when they're being asked to be 'host cells' for other peoples' virus -like activity. The appropriate response is to 'de-triangle', to refuse to be co-opted for the person doing the triangling. Remind them to speak directly to the person with whom they have a concern.

As a way to connect and reconnect with members and friends from your church family, we are now offering monthly opportunities to come together!


These activities and gatherings will be varied, and open to anyone who is looking for something "extra" that is engaging yet also light-hearted and low-key!




The Tuesday morning Bible Study is continuing into the winter months! All are invited to come from 9-10:30. in the Parlor.



For the purposes of Bible study, I personally recommend the following three Bibles because of the accuracy of the word-for-word translation as well as their authoritative notes, maps, and tables:







clients may visit the pantry once a week, either Monday and Wednesday. There are pick-ups of staples, fresh or Wednesday...an average of 75-100 families visit the produce, and bakery items made throughout the pantry each week.

"Thank you" to our Zion members who contributed 162 pounds of food items including fresh produce from our "summer "Thank you" to the Zion members who continue to contribute financially to the pantry. Monetary contributions help the pantry to purchase food items not regularly donated as meats, eggs in addition to the purchase of "high demand" items as cereal. rice, peanut butter, jelly, canned vegetables, soups, and fruits. Financial contributions also allow the pantry to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank once a month at greatly reduced prices and also purchases fresh produce and eggs at local stores/markets.

Currently, requested food items include: canned spinach, canned carrots, canned corn, canned cream corn, canned tomatoes, canned peaches (lite and sugar free), canned pears, canned pineapple, canned mandarin oranges, 18 oz. jelly, boxed pastas, cereal, and especially canned green bean.

During the month of September...Giant (Mount Joy) donated 1,155 pounds of bread and bakery items Weis Market Columbia donated 596 pounds of bread and bakery items; Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 244 bakery items and 277 pounds meat products; S. Clyde Weaver donated 100 pounds of bakery items; Stauffers of Rohrerstown donated 62 pounds of bread The pantry purchased 8,628 and bakery items. pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank. The pantry received 2,239 pounds of free food items from the Community Action Program. contributions of food items and fresh produce came from the community which includes donations from the churches, businesses, social and civic organizations and private individuals. Sixty one volunteers gave 574 hours in September.....A reminder that the pantry is a complete volunteer effort, operating with a full non-paid staff. Many volunteers "work behind the

In September, a total of 675 persons were served scenes" on days other than open days of Monday week at the various businesses. In addition, there is an office staff documenting the donations received, clients served and completing other required reports for the Central Penn Food Bank. We could not provide this important community service without our volunteers! Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give with a true servant's heart and a smile!


