From The Pastor's Keyboard:

Welcome to November, the last month of the Church Year. As we worship our way through the weeks before Advent begins, we encounter some of the most troubling prophetic words of the year as well as some of the most comforting. The following is an overview of what the Old Testament Prophets have to say to us this month.

Micah rails against false prophets who were leading God's people astray, who pander to the wealthy but corrupt leaders of the nation, and who refuse to speak to the reality of God's judgment upon Israel. These prophets are more interested in keeping the people and their leaders happy while reaping financial benefits from their lies. "The sun shall go down upon the prophets, and the day shall be black over them", MIcah states. In his warning to the recalcitrant leaders of Israel he prophesies the destruction of Jerusalem with these words, "Therefore because of you, Zion shall be plowed as a field; Jerusalem shall become a heap of ruins, and the mountain of the house a wooded height." In the midst of a culture of the leaders' and prophets' spread of fake news to the people, Micah stands for truth and justice. Prophets like Micah were just as unpopular in his day as a swarm of pesky mosquitoes is today.

We, also, will hear from Amos this month. This prophet is known for his tirades against the rich and decadent who are ignoring the poor and needy in their midst. His subject in the appointed reading is God's condemnation of lavish religious feasts and festivals enjoyed by the people of Israel. He is the prophet of social activists when he sings out God's words, "But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream." *Cont'd on page.* 2

Zephaniah, a seldom heard prophet, will speak on the third Sunday of the month. His prophecy centers on the "Day of the Lord." With a voice of gloom and doom, Zephaniah tells the people of Israel that God "will bring such distress upon people that they shall walk like the blind; because they have sinned against the Lord..." With descriptions of bloody vengeance wreaked upon both the complacent and the wealthy, he prophesies the wrath of the Lord as "in the fire of his passion the whole earth shall be consumed; for a full and terrible end he will make of all the inhabitants of the earth."

Finally, after all this judgment and end times angst, we encounter the beautiful, comforting words of the Prophet Ezekiel. Best known for his

vision of the valley of dry bones, Ezekiel provides hope for all who have endured trying times yet have remained faithful to the Lord and his ways. Using images from the Twenty-third Psalm, the prophet proclaims the loving care of the shepherding God who seeks out the lost and brings them home to food and water in the rich pastures of Israel. "I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord God," Ezekiel proclaims. Through Ezekiel, the promise of a messiah in the line of David is announced, who "shall feed them and be their shepherd."

From gloom and doom to promise and hope, those pesky prophets of old certainly have it all covered.






This 2006 Disney release runs for 2 hours and stars Paul Walker and Bruce Greenwood. It is rated P-G for mild language.

Calling ALL retirees over 70 and ½ years of age!!!!

Are you aware that Congress recently passed a law allowing you to donate all or part of your RMD (required minimum distribution) from your IRA's tax free to charities of your choice (Zion)? Your RMD payments must go directly from your IRA to Zion.

The RMD amount will not be included in your AGI (adjusted gross income) for income tax purposes and you will not be

permitted to use your donation as an itemized deduction on your tax return. This giving procedure may benefit you in the following ways: a lower AGI may lower your income taxes, may lower your taxes on your Social Security income and may avoid a Medicare high income surcharge.

Most importantly, you should talk to your accountant and/or tax preparer to see if this method of charitable giving will be beneficial to you. I hope you take the time to investigate this method and use it if it suits you.



This is a service project of the Women of Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church of Landisville. Many other Hempfield churches provide donations of gifts and help.

Each bag will contain a toothbrush and toothpaste, as well as a warm hat and possibly a scarf, both of which are handmade. We are collecting donations of age appropriate <u>new</u> gifts to include in the bags. There are about 150 children between the ages of <u>newborn</u> to <u>12 years</u> old.







▶ Barnstorming Clipper Stadium, Part 2 Submitted by Dave Albin

So I had been knocked out of the anthem slot for the August 17th Barnstormers game at Clipper Stadium. However, our group was offered better seating in one of the indoor box lounges, and I got other compensations as well. That night, I would be one of the five people throwing out the "first pitch", I would be a guest announcer for the home half of the fourth inning, and I would lead the crowd in "Take Me out to the Ball Game" with Cylo, the team mascot during the seventh inning stretch. I wasn't as excited as I would have been were I to have sung the anthem, but it was a gracious offer nonetheless.

Down on the field for the first pitch ceremonies, I spotted Cylo and had an idea. What if we could do a routine together that evening for the seventh inning stretch? I carry an empty bucket, telling the crowd that it's for Cylo, "because it's the only way that Cylo can carry a tune". Cylo gets his revenge on me by taking the bucket to an end of the dugout while I'm leading the singing, switching the bucket for another one filled with water, and - surprise! - dousing me with it on the last note of the song. Great idea, right? Cylo thought so, and while we were going over the details, I almost missed my cue to join the others at the pitcher's mound. I went fourth and I told the elderly lady that would follow me that I would "make her look good". Mission accomplished: I think she actually threw the ball farther than I did!

I got to mingle with my fellow "Zioners" for a few innings before they came and got me for the announcer's duties. My job: say the name and position of each player as he stepped to the plate - nothing more. Nothing more? If you think that I had a live

microphone in front of me and stuck to a minimally worded script, you don't know me very well. I didn't say much: "All right, Barnstormers fans, let's make some noise!" Then it was script-only from that point onwards... and three straight batters and three straight outs later, I was done. But I'd had a chance to talk with the announcers before and during my time at the microphone, and they told me that I was one of the best announcers they'd had all season.

Back to the group as "Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church of Landisville" got left off of the group names listed on the giant scoreboard between innings (out of time, alphabetical list). But the greatest disappointment of the night was when I was told that Cylo and I wouldn't be doing the water bucket bit: "We couldn't get the equipment." (Two buckets! Water! What's the problem?) But I did lead the crowd in the "Ball Game" song, and it went... okay, I guess. But oh, what might have been...

Lastly, I was promised that if the Barnstormers made the playoffs (that didn't happen), or if there was a cancellation, I would be the first person they'd call to come in and sing the National Anthem. And on Wednesday night, September 13th, two hours before game time, that's exactly what happened. In my next and final article, I'll give you the details. Until then, remember: If God is your relief pitcher, get off the mound and go to the bullpen!



Food Pantry Submitted by Diane Gerlach

In September, the pantry served 147 families which included 213 children, 352 adults, and 71 seniors for a total of 636 people served.

During the month of September, Zion members donated 68 pounds of food..... Thank you for your weekly food donations and your con-churches, businesses, social and tinued financial contributions to the pantry. Monetary contributions allow the pantry to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank Special contributions and food in Harrisburg at greatly reduced prices per pound which include meats, eggs, dairy products and other food items not donated through food collections. Financial contributions also allow the pantry managers to "shop for" food items on sale at local food stores and to purchase supplies for the pantry.

During the month of SeptemberDarrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,194 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated 1,173 pounds of fresh produce and 194 pounds of bakery items: Weis Markets in Columbia donated 1,086 pounds of bread and bakery items; Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 681 pounds of bread and bakery items; S. Clyde Weaver donated 159 pounds of bread and bakery items; Giant of Kissel Hill, Lititz donated 179 pounds of bakery items; Giant of Mount Joy donated 306 pounds of bakery items. The pantry purchased 215 pounds of food items through local grocery stores; 6,058

pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank. The pantry received 2,143 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program. In addition to the above donations and purchases, 6,968 pounds came from the community which includes donations from the civic organizations and private individuals.

donations were received from: Stauffers of Rohrerstown 729 pounds; Hempfield Rec added 112 pounds of food items. Our "summer farmers" contribute fresh produce from their gardens weekly.... Penn State local fields provided 309 pounds of produce to the pantry; Elmer Stoltzfus donated 1,672 pounds of fresh produce from his farm.

Fifty seven volunteers gave 542 hours during the month of September. The pantry is a complete volunteer effort, operating with a full non-paid staff. Many volunteers work "behind the scenes" on days other than "open" days of Monday and Wednesday. There are "pickups" of staples, fresh produce, and bakery items made throughout the week at the various businesses. In addition, there is an office staff documenting the donations received and completing the reports required for the Central Penn Food Bank, as well as registering new clients each week. We could

not provide this important community service without our volunteers!



Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give to serving with a true servant's heart and a smile! The pantry is an ecumenical project with eighteen churches in the Hempfield area supporting the pantry with food, finances and volunteers. In addition, the local boy scouts and girls scouts, Hempfield School District students and staff, Hempfield Woman's Club, Rotary Club, postal employees, Union National Bank Salunga, Village Grande Community, Willow Valley Retirement Community, Hempfield REC contribute to the pantry regularly... many individuals and businesses also join the "fight against hunger" with special food drives and financial contributions. Hempfield Area Food Pantry is a total community effort.

AND, the pantry would not be able to provide this program to the Hempfield residents without the outreach mission of Zion with the use of God's property. This mission is a witness of God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action!




