Dear Sisters and Brothers,

"Because of God's Great Mercy" is the title of our stewardship emphasis this year. The scriptural basis of this focus on our stewardship of all that God has entrusted into our care is I Peter 2:9, "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness and into his marvelous light."

We begin by proclaiming all that God has done for us, hence the title "Because of God's Great Mercy." God has made us God's own people. We will also consider how generous giving is an important part of every Christian's life, and how our combined generosity can make even greater things possible through our congregation.

We will think together about how our giving to Zion is an important part of our Christian faith, and how Zion uses our offerings to do God's work within the congregation's walls, in our community, and around the world.

"Because of God's Great Mercy" will ask you to do two things. First, you will be asked to increase your giving to Zion by at least ½ of 1% of your household income. Second, you will be asked to consider using an automatic funds transfer program that Zion already has in place for your giving, Simply Giving.

"Because of God's Great Mercy" will use mail, e-mail, and time in worship to share information with you. Please make a special effort to watch for material during this important time in our congregation's life.





This is a service project by the Women of Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church of Landisville. Many area Hempfield churches provide donations of gift items and help in filling the bags.

Each bag will contain a toothbrush and a tube of toothpaste donated by local dentists, as well as a warm hat and possibly a scarf, both of which are handmade or crocheted.

We are collecting donations of other gifts to include in the bags for about 200 children. The gifts should be new and appropriate for infants to age 12.

More About John Long

John Long was the only member of Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church in Landisville who died in World War II.

John is referred to as "Johnny" in the book "Finding the Way" written by his step-son Andrew H. Farmer

John, born August 17, 1919, was the next to youngest of the Long children. Johnny excelled in all of his classes in East Hempfield Township schools. While attending high school, Johnny was motivated scholastically by Mary Elizabeth Baker, later married to Samuel Dum. It was John's goal to get a higher grade than Beth.

Johnny graduated from high school in 1937. He enrolled in Dickinson College and graduated in 1941 with a Bachelor of Philosophy degree, with majors in history, psychology and German. In late 1939 he met his future wife Mary Louise Hollinger.

Johnny was drafted into the army in July 1941 and passed exams that qualified him to transfer to the Army Air Corps. He began his military career as a Private, but later took and passed exams to qualify for the aviation cadet program.

Johnny eventually achieved the rank of Captain and was a navigator in a B-25 on August 9, 1945 when his crew crashed and died while attacking one of the last Japanese air craft carriers, Kaiyo, in the Beppu Bay, Japan.

The American Army Air Corp dropped atom bombs on Hiroshima on August 6, 1945, and the second on August 9 on Nagasaki. The news media covered the bombings and the Japanese surrender on September 2, 1945 with practically no coverage on Johnny and his crew dying the same day as the bomb was dropped on Nagasaki.

A memorial service at Zion was held for Johnny on September 9, 1945 led by Pastor Harold Dietz. Johnny was eventually returned to this country in 1949 and is buried in the Landisville Mennonite Cemetery.

Andrew Farmer has donated several copies of Finding the Way to Zion to give us an opportunity to learn more about our former member John Long and his service and sacrifice to his country.

In August, the pantry served 176 families which included 226 children, 377 adults, and 880 seniors for a total of 691 people served.

During the month of August Zion members volunteers willingly donated 136 pounds of food. During the month of August....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,608 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated 2,388 pounds of fresh produce and 188 pounds of bakery items; Weis Markets in Columbia

donated 896 pounds of bread and bakery items; Weis Market Stony **Battery Road donated 491** pounds of bread and bakery items; S. Clyde Weaver donated

246 pounds of bread and bakery items; Forry's 309 pounds of produce; Giant of Kissel Hill, Lititz contributed 290 pounds of bakery items; Giant of Mount Joy donated 1,439 pounds of bakery items. The pantry purchased 390 pounds of food items through local grocery stores; 6,484 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank; and received 2,256 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program in Lancaster.

Eighty seven volunteers gave 800 hours during the month of August.

In addition, the local boy scouts and girls scouts, Hempfield School District students and staff, Hemfield Woman's Club, Rotary Club, postal employees, Union National Bank Salunga, Village Grande Community, Willow Valley Retirement Community, many I ndividuals and businesses all join the "fight against hunger" in the Hempfield area.

Zion can be very proud to provide the space for this outreach mission to our families in the Hempfield School District who need help in providing food for their families. YOU are welcome to visit the community pantry located here at Zion on our "open" days (Monday and Wednesday from 9:00 AM to 1:00 P) to witness God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action!

The main items needed (requested) for the pantry currently are canned fruit, canned corn, canned tomatoes and jelly. Thank you.





Pathways Center for Grief & Loss Grief Support Series

Grief support groups are held on Thursday evenings starting with a light supper at 6 PM. From 6:30-7:30 PM children and teens meet in age-specific groups while the parents/guardians gather separately to learn how to support grieving children.

These sessions are for anyone who has lost a loved one as a result of illness or from a sudden, unexpected death.

All groups are facilitated by master's level grief counselors and trained volunteers. We focus on helping children identify and express their feelings as they share experiences about the death of their loved one. Groups enhance family communication and expand the personal skills needed to cope with, and adjust to, the intense feelings and challenges that accompany loss and grief.

Prior to enrolling in a series, families attend an assessment to ensure that the support groups will be helpful.
