SANCTUARY DENOMINATION

From The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, Presiding Bishop

At the ELCA Churchwide Assembly this past June, a resolution was adopted that, among other things, declared the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) a sanctuary denomination. Many are asking, "What does this mean?"

Our call to love our neighbor is central to our faith. In our baptismal covenant we promise to strive for peace and justice in all the world. One of the ways we live out this vow is through our commitment to welcoming the stranger. With this declaration, we publicly state that walking alongside refugees and immigrants is a matter of faith.

We have prepared talking points to provide a better understanding and further clarification on what sanctuary means for you and your congregations. We acknowledge this will look different in different contexts across the ELCA.

We also hope this resource will help guide conversations with each other and our community about what our faith says about immigration.

"Welcome one another, therefore, just as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God" (Romans 15:7).

Being A Sanctuary Denomination (Cont'd from page 3)

What does becoming a sanctuary denomination mean for the ELCA?

- In its simplest form, becoming a sanctuary denomination means that the ELCA is publicly declaring that walking alongside immigrants and refugees is a matter of faith. The ELCA Churchwide Assembly, the highest legislative authority of the ELCA, declared that when we preach on Sunday that Jesus told us to welcome, we will use our hands and voices on Monday to make sure it happens.
- Being a sanctuary denomination does not call for any person, congregation or synod to engage in any illegal actions.
- We have a broken system regarding immigration, refugees and asylumseekers. To declare ourselves a sanctuary church body is to say that we seek to provide concrete resources to assist the most vulnerable who are feeling the sharp edges of this broken system.
- Being a sanctuary denomination is about loving our neighbors. While we may
 have different ideas about how to fix this broken system and may have different
 ways of loving our neighbors, our call to love our neighbor is central to our faith.
- Being a sanctuary denomination will look different in different contexts. It
 may mean providing space for people to live; providing financial and legal
 support to those who are working through the immigration system; or
 supporting other congregations and service providers. We cannot mandate or
 direct our congregations and ministries to respond in specific ways. Each must
 work out what this means for them in their context.
- While we don't yet know the full scope of the work that this declaration will open for the church, we do know that our faith communities are already doing sanctuary work. Sanctuary for a congregation may mean hosting English as a second Language (ESL) classes; marching as people of faith against the detention of children and families; providing housing for a community member facing deportation; or, in some of our congregations, having thoughtful conversations about what our faith says about immigration. All of these are a step closer to sanctuary in our faith communities and sanctuary in our world for people who must leave their homes.

- Except for our members whose ancestors were here before European settlement or others who were forced to come to the U.S. against their will, the ELCA is an immigrant church. Our decadeslong work with immigrants and refugees is how we practice our faith in the world. Lutherans started Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service, one of the nine refugee resettlement agencies in the U.S.
- At our last churchwide assembly, we also committed to walking alongside Central American children and families fleeing their communities by passing the <u>AMMPARO</u> strategy (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities).
- Through the AMMPARO strategy, we are also working through our global partners in Central America to alleviate the conditions that cause people to migrate. We support organizations and faith communities that work with deported migrants in Central America and advocate for the humane treatment of immigrants in Mexico. In the U.S., we have a network of 151 welcoming and sanctuary congregations that are committed to working on migration issues and a welcome for immigrant communities. The church also has five sanctuary synods (our regional structures), all of which do work with immigrants, refugees and asylum-seekers.
- In baptism, we are brought into a covenantal relationship with Jesus Christ that commits us to strive for justice and peace in all the earth. Following the example of Martin Luther, we believe that advocacy is a crucial expression of baptismal identity. As a church, we have advocated for stopping the detention of children and families for decades. We have spoken out against family separation, sought a pathway to citizenship for community members who have lived in the U.S. for many years, and have taken steps to address the root causes of migration in a way that honors the humanity in people who must flee.
- Being a sanctuary denomination means that we, as church together, want to be public and vocal about this work. At the same time, we will have conversations about what sanctuary means with many of our members and discern future action and direction. Welcoming people is not a political issue for us, it is a matter of faith.

All team leaders and Council were given the results of the Time and Talent Survey (thanks to Al and Diane Ramer). If you made your wishes known, you should hear from a representative on that particular ministry team.

We discussed the "Healthy Congregation" seminar provided by the synod. Look for the article with the update on some of what was discussed (Provided by Pastor Biles and written by Brenda Stover for the newsletter).

It was decided to send letters to inactive members to establish whether they want to be removed from the rolls.

Please look for bulletin information regarding how we, as a congregation, can be a more "inviting" congregation. We hope you all will "take the challenge."

Thanks to all who made our June picnic a smashing success. Hopefully, we can have another one next summer!

• Fearless Generosity (Submitted by Darrell Gerke, Stewardship Chairman)

The month of September brings us the Labor Day holiday and the beginning of the Fall season. In the church it signals the beginning of the new Sunday School year with back to normal church attendance. It is also the time for Stewardship Pledging Campaigns. Zion has had successful campaigns during 2017 and 2018 thanks to the creative talents of Jim Bear. 60 giving units (families) pledged \$232,304.00 in 2017 and 52 giving units pledged \$183,060.00 in 2018.

I understand that many members feel that pledging is a private decision between God and themselves and I want to honor that wish. This year members who pledge for giving in 2020 can submit a written form which will ONLY be seen by the Finance Committee for tabulation purposes only. The results of the pledges will be shown by a graph on a thermometer strictly for information purposes.

You will be receiving a letter in early September explaining the pledging process and a form to use to indicate the amount you wish to give to Zion for 2020. The letter will also explain how you can enroll in the Simply Giving program through Thrivent. This is a great way to keep your giving on track for the whole year and eliminate the need to write a check every week. You can always change the amount if your financial condition changes.

For those members over 70 ½ years of age, you can request a withdrawal from your IRAs directly to Zion tax free. This may be an excellent means of meeting your Required Minimum Distribution requirement with the Federal Government.

The pledging period will run from September 8 to October 27 to help the Church Council with the 2020 budget.

Healthy Congregations Initiative

Recently, your Church Council and Team Leaders were involved in the ELCA's Healthy Congregation Initiative. We want to share some of what we learned.

Healthy Congregations: Conflict & Anxiety In The Church "Where anger dwells in a church, the Holy Spirit cannot work." – St. Ignatius of Antioch

Conflict is inevitable in any relationship. The ideal of a perfect, happy, harmonious church is an illusion. The problem is not that conflict occurs, but <u>how we deal with it</u>. How do we work through conflicts in a church so that the body of Christ becomes stronger, rather than weaker?

Conflict occurs at various levels of intensity. As the conflict increases, the intensity of anxiety fueling the conflict increases. The higher the level of conflict, the more damaging it is to the organization, and the less people care about the effects of the conflict on the congregation. Listed below are the common levels of conflict with their associated behaviors.

LEVEL OF INTENSITY	BEHAVIOR
Problems to solve *Lowest level	This is the least intensive form of conflict. People work with a high level of cooperation, even playfulness. The outcome is satisfying to all. It is 'win-win' thinking; everyone feels they have gained something.
Disagreements	At this level, distinct positions emerge. People have different opinions about what to do to solve the issues before them. There is still a high level of motivation, trust, and teamwork to solve problems, and most of the time most people are pleased with the outcome. This is still at the level of 'win-win' thinking.
Contests *Critical level	This is the highest level that conflict can go without damaging the organization. At this level, people take sides on issues. They seek out allies for their cause. Making sure 'my side wins' becomes as important as resolving the issue. Those who lost may harbor bitterness, but have enough commitment to the organization to stay with it. They view it as a ball game; we lost today, but we will play again tomorrow and maybe win next time. Leaders often have work to do after such contests to comfort those who feel they have lost.

LEVEL OF INTENSITY	BEHAVIOR
Battles	When conflict has risen to this level, it becomes destructive. The focus is not on solving problems, but getting our way. Solving the problem is defined as victory for our side. The need for our side to win becomes more important than the health of the organization. Those who lost often leave the organization. This is
	'win-lose' thinking.
Wars	This is the highest level of conflict. At this level, what is im-
*Highest level	portant is not only that 'our side' wins, but the opposition – 'the
	enemy' – is punished, even destroyed. At this level, people will
	'destroy the village in order to save it.' This desire can continue
	even after one side has left the organization, as people pursue
	revenge and further punishment of the opposition. This is 'lose-
	lose' thinking because everyone suffers.

How do we deal with conflict at Zion? Are we open to work towards resolutions of differences in healthy ways that allow the Holy Spirit to continue to work in us?

A follow-up conversation will extend this notion of being a healthy congregation by focusing on the negative effects of emotional triangles and how they function as a barrier to healthy congregations.

Food Pantry (Submitted by Diane Gerlach)

In June, the pantry served 172 families of which 215 nesses, social and civic were children; 367 adults; 114 seniors for a total of 696 organizations and private persons served. In July, the pantry served 160 families of which 202 were children; 328 adults; and 107 seniors for a total of 637 persons served. Clients may visit the In July, the pantry received...... Giant Mount Joy pantry once a week, either Monday or Wednesday...an average of 75-100 families visit the pantry each week.

100 pounds of food items to the pantry in June and 318 pounds in July....thanks especially for the fresh produce from our Zion Summer farmers!!! "Thank you" to the Zion members who continue to contribute financially to the pantry. Monetary contributions help the pantry to purchase food items not regularly donated as meats, eggs in addition to the purchase of "high demand" items as cereal, rice, peanut butter, jelly, canned vegetables, soups, and fruits. Financial contributions also allow the pantry to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank once a month at greatly reduced prices and also purchases fresh produce and eggs at local stores/markets.

Currently, requested food items are:

Canned peas, canned corn, canned green beans, canned spinach, canned tomatoes, cream of chicken soup, cream of celery soup, chicken broth, beef broth, boxed rigatoni, boxed ziti, crunchy peanut butter, and cereal.

During the month of June.... Giant Mount Joy donated 314 pounds of bread and bakery items; Weis Market in Columbia donated 700 pounds of bread and bakery items: Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 405 bakery items and 554 pounds meat products; S. Clyde Weaver donated 140 pounds of bakery items; Stauffers of Rohrerstown donated 275 pounds of bread and bakery items. The pantry purchased 7,565 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank. The pantry received 2,316 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program. Additional contributions of food items and fresh produce came from the community which includes donations from the churches, busi-



donated 233 pounds of bread and baker items and 40 pounds of other food items; Weis Columbia donated 954 pounds of bread and bakery items; Weis Stony Bat-"Thank you" to our Zion members who contributed tery donated 272 pounds of bread and bakery items and 625 pounds of meat items; Stauffers Rohrerstown donated 289 pounds of food items; and Weavers East Petersburg donated 127 pounds of bread and bakery In addition, the pantry purchased 6,607 items. pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank. The pantry received 4,708 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program. Additional contributions of food items and fresh produce came from the community which includes donations from the churches, businesses, social and civic organizations and private individuals.

> Sixty Seven volunteers gave 627 hours in June.....seventy three volunteers gave 795 hours during the month of July. The pantry is a complete volunteer effort, operating with a full non-paid staff. Many volunteers "work behind the scenes" on days other than "open" days of Monday and Wednesday. There are "pick-ups" of staples, fresh produce, and bakery items made throughout the week at the In addition, there is an office various businesses. staff documenting the donations received, clients served and completing other required reports for the Central Penn Food Bank. We could not provide this important community service without our volunteers! Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give with a true servant's heart and a smile!
