

In the midst of our weekly activities and responsibilities, the One who makes everything possible, even our very lives, often gets overlooked or forgotten. When asked about church attendance or invited to participate in church activities, I've heard these excuses: "Sunday is the only day I have to be with my family." "We have to get up early every other morning, so Sunday is the only day we can sleep in." "There are so many other activities and sports competitions each day and even on Saturdays, that I need Sundays to catch up on what I couldn't do (i.e., homework, chores, etc.) during the week." "Worship services are just too early on Sunday morning for me to attend."

What do you think God hears when we use these excuses for being absent on the one day of the week that God has commanded be set aside for us to worship Him? Does God hear, "I love you and give thanks for all you do," or "I don't have time for you"?

How does God feel when we will not even take one hour each week to hear and learn from His Word, and to receive the gifts of life, forgiveness and salvation promised in a simple meal of bread and wine? What does God, the Heavenly Parent, think when parents who made promises at their child's baptism do not fulfill those promises on behalf of their child by bringing him to worship, teaching him the Christian Faith and life, and helping him to grow in relationship with the one who has welcomed him as a "child of God"?

Okay, enough with the guilt trip! Have you considered how different your life might be if you and your family took time to join your brothers and sisters in Christ on Sundays to worship God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit? Have you ever asked regular church-goers how their time on Sunday mornings with God and friends helps them to deal with the stresses, fears, and responsibilities of their lives during the rest of their week? Do you know that just an hour or two on Sunday will provide an attitude adjustment better than any "happy hour"? Are you aware that families who regularly attend church together tend to be healthier in their relationships, and the odds that their children will grow up to live happy lives increase? Church attendance and participation provide many benefits for both individuals and families. Research shows this and, better yet, God stands behind the value of active participation in weekly worship for our lives.

Want to know more? The benefits of regular church attendance and active participation in church-related activities have been shown by a number of studies including research by Duke University, Indiana University, The University of Michigan, The Center for Disease Control, Barna Research Group, Gallup, Pew, and the National Institute for Healthcare Research. Check out these study results online or on Zion's website.

# From The Council President

As summer draws to a close, I am writing with a brief update about progress on action items that were generated through the work of the Zion Strategic Planning Committee (ZSPC) and that were approved at the March congregational meeting. The goal behind these action items is to strengthen the life of the congregation and the ministry work that we engage in together. In the midst of grappling with recommendations, decision-making, and implementation of concrete action steps, it can be easy to lose sight of the big picture, which is to spread God's good news and to love all. This is what our ministry is about. Since the last newsletter update:

- The ZSPC worked on developing a proposal for streamlining the organization of Zion's ministry teams, in an effort toward establishing stronger evangelism and stewardship ministries. They held meetings during the spring and developed a proposal that was presented to the council earlier this summer. The next step will be wider discussion of this proposal, both within ministry teams and also in the wider congregation.
- The Property Committee was tasked with looking into key improvements to church facilities. They determined that addressing heating and cooling system issues was a necessity, and took the steps to meet with experts and solicit bids for work to repair and improve the system. Their proposal, which has previously been presented to the council, will be presented at a congregational meeting on Sunday, September 10.
- Zion has recently been presented with the opportunity to engage with the Lower Susquehanna Synod around an intentional ministry renewal effort. We are in conversation with the synod and see opportunity to use this experience to help advance the work that the ZSPC and many others in the congregation are engaged in. Updates will be provided as soon as more information is available.

Please continue to be in prayer, as we discern the path to follow and take steps to strengthen our ministry efforts.

## **RALLY TO SERVE SUNDAY 2017**





# PA Legislators steal a page from Zion's playbook

Over the last several years the PA Legislators and the Governor have not been able to agree on a state budget by July 1<sup>st</sup>, the beginning of the new fiscal year. As a result some state departments shut down operations because they cannot spend money without an approved budget. Usually after a few days or months a new budget is finally approved and the state begins to function as normal until the next year when the same scenario plays out again.

We ask ourselves why this fiasco occurs yearly. We elect and expect our state senators and representatives to work together with the Governor to move PA forward in a progressive manner. Approving a budget should be done in a timely manner before the new fiscal year starts.

This year the PA legislators and the Governor stole a page from Zion's playbook for the 2017-2018 fiscal year budget. They came up with a new method of approving a state spending budget without a funding budget. At least all state departments this year could continue operations without delay because they

were assured of funding for the next year. No one knows how the spending will be funded but it must be solved soon. This is the same thing Zion does every year. We approve a budget without any assurance that offerings will cover the budgeted expenses.

All budgets, regardless whether for households, small businesses, large corporations or states consist of desired spending and corresponding revenue/ income. Spending cannot exceed income in order to remain solvent. Zion is no exception to this rule but we seem to try to violate this rule only because we continue to take money from the endowment fund to cover the income shortfall.

This year the Stewardship Committee will initiate a campaign on Rally Sunday, September 10<sup>th</sup> to try to determine the amount of pledge money Zion can expect for 2018 so the Church Council can use this information to formulate a reasonable spending budget. This campaign will end by the end of October. This campaign is designed to be an interesting and exciting way for ALL members to become involved in the future of Zion.

The Stewardship Committee asks for your prayers and cooperation for this endeavor to allow Zion to fulfill our mission of service to all people here at Zion, in our community, in our nation and throughout the world. 6

# Rotation Workshops returning to Zion!

New **'Kids' Club Sunday'** will feature rotation workshops for K-6<sup>th</sup> grade children.

# Why the change?

Like many other Sunday Schools, Zion's was suffering from these common problems:

- teacher & kid apathy
- boring rooms and methods
- lackluster, uninviting learning environments
  - parent indifference
- purchased resources and lessons going largely unused and students not knowing their Bible stories, let alone wanting to come back.

So, in June I sat down to brainstorm our way out of this perceived and often real dilemma of how to 'fix' all of the above?

Working with a team of volunteers, we identified the areas that needed improvement, and came up with a creative plan to revise and reorganize our space, teachers, lessons, and style of teaching: classrooms turned into creative "workshops" that the kids rotate through, but the teachers stay put in.

◆ The idea of rotating kids, teaching creatively, and remaking rooms is not new, and maybe that's why it works! Our Workshop Rotation Model drew upon a lot of ideas and programs we had first-hand experience with over the years, such as, VBS and learning centers. What is new is that we will make that model the rule for the entire year, (cont'd on pg. 10)

and not just for special occasions. This same model of teaching was adapted for the monthly Kids' Club Wednesday ministry last December.

## The Workshop Rotation Model in brief:

- Reorganize each of the classrooms into creative "workshops," including: Art, Drama, Games, Story, Video, and more, depending on the particular theme
- 2. Rotate each grade level or group (there will be two learning levels K-3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>-6<sup>th</sup>) into a new workshop each week.
- 3. All the workshops teach the same Bible story for a 3 to 5 week "rotation."
- 4. Teachers *stay put* in the workshop teaching the same lesson each week to a new group.
  - 5. The story gets explored and learned in-depth through a variety of creative teaching mediums.

The kids look forward to a different learning experience, teacher, and room each week.

The teachers don't have to plan a new lesson each week. Instead, they plan once

every three or five weeks, modifying their basic lesson each week for a slightly different age group, and getting better and more creative as the weeks pass. who will be using various resources, all built upon a solid Lutheran theological foundation.

By doing so, we also liberated the class-room environment and the teachers. The creative workshop spaces will be created by the teacher for the kids who will rotate out of each space on a weekly basis. The goal is to reach today's children "where they are" and realizing that they already spend 40 hours a week in a class-room environment. Zion will creatively reach them with the gospel, Biblical lessons and characters through creative, thematic and relational means.

You are invited (and encouraged to bring your child (ren) to the newly revised learning spaces on Rally Day (Sept. 10<sup>th</sup>).

## Synod Assembly Highlights Submitted by Dave Dumeyer

of the Church is reformed approximately every 500 years. By 500 AD. the Church has moved from the shadow of persecution to official acceptance in the fading Roman Empire. In the late 1000s, the Crusades brought kings and commoners together to fight against the Church's enemies. By the 1500s. the Protestant Reformation was in full swing against a corrupt Church. And in the 2000's, we're questioning the Church's relevance in a culture dominated by technology and marked by agnosticism and religious diversity. In this environment, it is likely that congregations— Lutherans congregations—will die or merge leaving fewer and fewer to serve people struggling to cope with life. What to do about this?

The Lower Susquehanna synod has embarked on a three-pronged program to guide us into this new adventure of making Christ and His church relevant. You've no doubt heard of the three Rs—reading, 'riting, and 'rithmetic. This new program is called the R3 for its efforts to Reform; Renew; and Revision. Those are three powerful verbs.

It is likely that we will need to "reform" as a synod, due to the loss of congregation's and members. We must be open to that possibility if we are to continue Christ's ministry. The day when Lutheran immigrants were arriving in America and

At the same time, there are congregations that are or can be vital once again. The job here is to "renew" those congregations by strengthening their leadership and their ministries. Using training programs and resources at the new United Lutheran Seminary (a combination of Gettysburg and Mount Airy-Philadelphia seminaries), pastors, staff and lay leaders can become more inspired and prepared for the changes that will likely occur. Zion has selected from the R3 Cafe Menu the Spiritual Renewal Certificate Program, a two-year program of the Vibrant Faith University. When completed, Zion's congregational leaders will be equipped "with the knowledge, skills, resources, and support structure to bring to life R3" in this congregation. You will be hearing more about this in the coming months.

Finally, congregations must "revision" how we see the Church. Perhaps it will be "thinking outside the box (the church)". Where will we reach the lost and needy in this community? This will require a new stewardship—one that is not necessarily financial, but one which chal-

lenges each of us to make a spiritual commitment to Christ.

Much of this was the focus of the first day of Synod Assembly, June 2, 2017. As the keynote speaker, Pastor Dave Daubert, guided the Assembly members through the challenges and opportunities, our understanding of the R3 program gradually took shape. His dynamic presentation kept members entertained and enthused about the possibilities available to us as Lutherans. We expect that Pastor Daubert will visit Zion during our two-year Renewal Program. We at Zion must be receptive to doing things differently than we are used to doing. A greater commitment to Christ in all of our ministry areas will be needed. More, not less, is expected of us.

Messiah College's campus offered wonderful venues for break-out sessions. Donna and I attended the session on "The Art of Living Generously". It was well-attended and gave great hope for how congregations can grow in spirit and membership. The food was well-prepared and mealtimes offered a chance to re-connect with friends and discuss the issues of the day's sessions. None of us from Zion stayed overnight, but accommodations are available when you pre-register.

# Congregational Meeting, Synod Report (Cont'd)

The following recommendation has been submitted to Council by the Property Team: and will be voted on at the Congregational Meeting on September 10 following the 10 AM service.

After a long process we have decided the best course of action would be to keep the present system that services the sanctuary and rear wing of the property. In keeping with this system, however, we will need to replace a faulty circulation pump at a cost of \$1,750.00.



The boiler system servicing the Social Roon and front wing of the property is in need of extensive and expensive repairs at a cost of \$17,935.00.

For this reason and the inefficiency and maintenance costs of the present system, Property recommends the retirement of said system and replacing it with a hot air and AC system. The new system will come at a cost of \$51,020.00. Fortunately, the Food Pantry has made a very generous donation of \$10,000.00 to help defray the cost.

Taking into consideration the money from the Food Pantry and the cost to repair the present system, there is a difference of \$23,085.00 to convert to hot air and air conditioning for which the congregation would be responsible.

Every assembly we have attended has also had a "bookstore", usually an open area where representatives can browse and purchase books on religious themes, Bible commentaries and studies, biographies and theological discussions. This year's bookstore was run by Hearts and Minds, a bookstore in Dallastown, PA, which had a great selection of reading materials.

In addition to worship services and Bible studies, the Assembly acted upon several items of business, such as the election of members to Synod boards,

commissions and agencies. We were also regaled with stories of the Church's impact on brothers and sisters throughout the world, both by representatives of the Konde Diocese and Churchwide staff. A list of major business items is included.

We would encourage interested members to consider serving as representatives to the Synod assembly. It is a moving experience and gives one a chance to help determine the course of our regional Church. We are entitled to one lay male and one lay female to represent us.

# Food Pantry Submitted by Diane Gerlach

In June, the pantry served 162 families which included 232 children, 355 adults, and 82 seniors for a total of 669 people served. In July, the pantry served 143 families which included 200 children, 326 adults, and 77 seniors for a total of 603 people served. During the summer months, when the children of client families are home and do not receive their meals at school.....the pantry provided "extra" food items to families with school age children.

During the month of June Zion members donated 219 pounds of food..... and in the month of July Zion members donated 123 pounds of food. Thank you for your weekly food donations and your continued financial contributions to the pantry. Monetary contributions allow the pantry to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank in Harrisburg at greatly reduced prices per pound which include meats, eggs, dairy products and other food items not donated through food collections. Financial contributions also allow the pantry managers to "shop for" food items on sale at local food stores and to purchase supplies for the pantry.

During the months of June and July....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated over 3,000 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated over 4,400 pounds of fresh produce and over 380 pounds of bakery items; Weis Markets in Columbia donated 1,800 pounds of bread and bakery

items: Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 1,200 pounds of bread and bakery items; S. Clyde Weaver donated 350 pounds of bread and bakery items; Giant of Kissel Hill, Lititz donated 654 pounds of bakery items; Giant of Mount Joy donated 1,269 pounds of bakery items. The pantry purchased 1,040 pounds of food items in June and 430 pounds in July through local grocery stores; 6,277 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank in June and 5,417 pounds in July. The pantry received 2,688 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program in June and 1,912 pounds in July. In addition to the above donations and purchases, 7,070 pounds of food staple items were donated in June and 9,175 pounds in July from the community which includes the donations from the churches and businesses in the Hempfield area.

Special contributions and food donations were received from: Wayside Presbyterian Church, Waystock event in June....700 pounds of food and \$1,875.00; Gardner's Mattress....188 pounds of food; Amelia's Grocery Outlet.... 275 (\$5.00) bags of food items valued at \$1.375.00. Our "summer farmers" contribute fresh produce from their gardens weekly....Church of the Apostles, Rohrerstown, donates fresh produce from their church garden.

Sixty six volunteers gave 655 hours during the month of June and 69 volunteers gave 882 hours

in July. The pantry is a complete volunteer effort, operating



with a full non-paid staff. Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give to serving with a true servant's heart and a smile! We could not provide this important community service without our volunteers! The pantry is an ecumenical project with eighteen churches in the Hempfield area

supporting the pantry with food, finances and volunteers. In addition. the local boy scouts and girls scouts, Hempfield School District students and staff, Hempfield Woman's Club,

Rotary Club, postal employees, Union National Bank Salunga, Village Grande Community, Willow Valley Retirement Community, Hempfield REC contribute to the pantry regularly... many individuals and businesses also join the "fight against hunger" with special food drives and financial contributions. Hempfield Area Food Pantry is a total community effort.

AND, the pantry would not be able to provide this program to the Hempfield residents without the outreach mission of Zion and the use of God's property. This mission is a witness of God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action!
