From the Director of CYFM:

Ministry Challenge of Value Versus Effort; Can We Create and Sustain a 'New Kind of Ministry'?

Have you ever passed up a penny on the sidewalk? Maybe if it's a "heads" you'll pick it up for luck. If a friend of mine sees a penny on the sidewalk lying "tails" up, he has a habit of stooping and turning it over so that the next person who comes alone will be thrilled to find a "heads." He's not superstitious that way but he knows some people are and that's just the kind of guy he is.

But even for my friend a penny is not worth the effort to pick it up, not worth the pocket space for storage. A penny just doesn't pass the "value vs. effort" test for most of us.

Churches have to think about the spiritual value of any program or outreach effort to decide if the value of relationship building or the value of service to the community justifies the resources expended to make it happen. Sometimes you can fudge a little on the side of effort even if the resulting value gained from the experience isn't clear or may be realized later. But any armchair economist can tell you that if energy expended is not generally less than or at least equal to the value gained, the program or the volunteers involved will eventually come to a grinding halt. You leave the penny on the ground. It's just common sense.

As Zion's CYFM director, I see the value of doing 'good,' effective ministry with and for young people. Reaching outside of a comfort zone, doing ministry outside of our church walls, or just trying something 'new' can not only make us feel

uncomfortable, but actually cause us to be 'too comfortable' in 'the way we've always done things.' This comfort took years to attain, took many dollars out of many checking accounts over many, many years to reach a certain level of being comfortable with what 'we did' and what we 'talk about doing.' Kids'Club is a ministry that started out as an idea. It blossomed into a real and tangible program as soon as it (the idea) was encouraged and supported by others. It took off like a rocket. However, without goals and objectives to guide it to a level of sustainability, it ran out of fuel and gently parachuted back to earth. Notice that I did not use the verb 'crashed.' Kids'Club ministry is a program that many congregations do not have. This makes Zion unique.

Can we take this ministry to the next level? Can we offer a top notch, self-sustaining ministry to children in the Landisville/Salunga area? Can we truly meet the needs of families who struggle with hunger, poverty and homelessness on a daily basis? Can we effectively reach the unchurched or under churched children and their families for Christ? What is the 'value' vs. 'effort' outcome for this and other ministries of our congregation going to be? Kids'Club is more than a monthly meeting for kids to eat, play and hang out. This program is more than asking a few people each month to give a little bit of their time to babysit

children. Kids'Club is a ministry of this congregation. It fosters building new relationships with all walks of people through story, music, conversation and meal. It allows 75 minutes a month of respite for children and their families from a world filled with uncertainties. Can we 'refuel' this rocket and propel it to new heights? Can we form a strong outreach team of Christian youth and adults to wisely use their talents and gifts to 'go out into the world' making Disciples of Christ? It takes a village to raise a child. It takes a congregation to open their arms wide and receive those who are searching for love, compassion, hope and grace. Perhaps that church on the corner of Brandt Blvd is a beacon for those searching, wondering and wandering. Or, are we still searching, wondering and wandering about, waiting for the next 'big thing' to happen?





Stewardship 101 Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love

By the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from on high will break upon us, to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace.

-Luke 1:78,79

Advent is the time of waiting, but what are we usually waiting for? For presents? Parties? Santa Claus? Winter vacation from school? Travel to Grandma's house? Dinner with family? The after-Christmas sales?

The answer is yes, and no.

It's "yes" because that's what our culture tells us Advent and Christmas is really all about.

It's "no" because we are Christians first, and consumers second. We wait for Jesus.

The answer is yes and no because we are always pulled in these two directions. We are simultaneously Americans and Christians, just as we are simultaneously sinner and saint.

How sad that the energy and frenzy of consumerism has all but swallowed Advent, an ancient season that used to be celebrated with quietness and prayer as Christmas approached. The idea wasn't merely to wait for the birth of Jesus, but to prepare our hearts and minds through prayer and spiritual discipline.

How distressing that Christians have allowed our culture to refocus Advent into a season

primarily of buying and selling. We have taken our Lord's holiday and turned it into a marketplace. But scripture and spiritual disciplines help refocus us on what's really important.

The above passage from Luke 1 captures the essence of Advent. Read it again. But read it slowly, as you would savor a fine chocolate with complex sweetness and luxurious texture. Go ahead. What new meanings do you discern?

You need only watch the news to know that we are, indeed, a people who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death. We need the light of the dawn from on high to break upon us. We need to be guided in the way of peace.

The four weeks of Advent help bring us into the proper spirit for "the dawn from on high" that will "give light to those who sit in darkness. Advent worship is rich in symbolism.

- The paraments (cloths) that adorn the altar are deep blue, the color of the sky before dawn, when it is no longer night but not quite morning.
- With its five candles, the Advent wreath provides a visual representation of the gathering dawn. We light one candle the first week of Advent, two the second week, three the third, and four the fourth. At Christmas we light all five because the dawn of Christ has come.

Each candle and each week of Advent has a theme. Each expresses the gifts of God we have in the miracle of Christmas: Hope, Peace, Joy. Love.

Now that's worth waiting for!

Advent Worship Series "From Heaven Above"

As the 500th anniversary of the Reformation approaches, let Martin Luther's beloved hymn "From Heaven Above" speak to you in our special Advent worship series.

Each service in the 4-part series focuses on the divine gifts that come down to us through the birth of Jesus.

The 4 Sundays of Advent will focus on these gifts:

Nov. 27: *The Gift of Hop*e, based on Matthew 12:15-21, looks at how the people of Israel waited in hope for the promised Messiah, and how we now wait in hope for his return on the Last Day.

Dec. 4: *The Gift of Love,* based on John 3:13-17, looks at how the steadfast love of God is revealed in the gift of his Son and how we, as the redeemed people of God, have the privilege of sharing his love with others.

Dec. 11: *The Gift of Peace*, based on John 14:25-27, reminds us that we have peace with God through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, and that we are now ambassadors of that peace to all the world.

Dec. 18: *The Gift of Life*, based on John 1:1-5, invigorates us with the message that we have been given a life of faith here on earth in Christ's name and eternal life in heaven with him through his precious birth among us.

On **Christmas Eve, December 24**th, our worship services will focus on *The Gift of Joy* as we hear the story of Jesus' birth from Luke 2: 1-20. Together, we will contemplate on the message of the angel to the shepherds, "I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people", and learn how we can be witnesses of good news bringing joy in a world of darkness and pain.

Bring a Bell to Worship on Christmas Eve & Christmas Day

Join in the celebration of Jesus' birthday by bringing a bell to ring when we sing "Joy to the World" on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. If you have multiple bells, please bring a couple extra to share with other worshippers. Together, we will make a joyful noise in praise of the One who came from heaven above to bring life, forgiveness and salvation to the world!



Zion's Partnerships

Do you know?

There are three local, ecumenical organizations in which Zion holds partnership status: The Lancaster County Council of Churches, The Parish Resource Center, and The Samaritan Counseling Center. All three of these ministry organizations are part of the cooperative ministry and sharing of resources that help us be more effective in our congregational ministry. As a "partner congregation" in these organizations, we provide an annual financial contribution to each based on the size of Zion's active membership.

Why are these connections in our community so important? Here's a brief synopsis of what each of these organizations provides to enrich and extend our congregation's mission and ministries.

The Lancaster County Council of Churches

- + Cooperative outreach to the Lancaster community and beyond supported by partner congregations and businesses in the Lancaster County area
- + Coordinates daily community meals for persons/ families in need that are held in various churches in Lancaster City. These meals are provided by various congregations and organizations and served by volunteers from those groups. (We provided and served a meal downtown at Christ Lutheran Church many years.)
- + Food Hub extends our Food Pantry ministry beyond the Hempfield area by providing fresh and healthy food to over 100 families on a daily basis.
- + Clothing Bank distributes clothing to thousands of men, women and children each year, who come in and make their own selections. Some of the donations to the Community Aid box at our Cooper Ave. go to the LCCC Clothing Bank.
- + Provides "Wheels to Work" for city folk without access to transportation.
- + Provides the Winter Shelter in cooperation with the YWCA, an emergency cold weather shelter for

women and children that is staffed, in part, by volunteers from partner churches and other organization. +Organizes the annual CROP Hunger Walk. A portion of the donations raised by those who walk return to assist hunger ministries in the Lancaster area.

The Parish Resource Center

- +Serves as a hub for church leaders and members to exchange ideas, learn new skills, and seek guidance, support, and encouragement.
- + Provides a lending library of resources for congregation ministries such as the DVDs of biblical study programs used in our "Bible Scholars" Class on Sunday mornings, Christian Education programming, and books of patterns and ideas for church banners.
- +Holds leadership and ministry seminars for clergy and congregation leaders.

The Samaritan Counseling Center

- +Provides clergy and congregational care and support through mentoring groups, educational programs and seminars for church leaders.
- +Offers discounts on counseling sessions for members of partner congregations, including pre-marital, relationship, and individual counseling.
- +Offers consultation services for both congregational and business health and growth.
- +Through the Safe Church program, provides training and support for congregations striving to meet and maintain the necessary requirements for child safety. Zion took part in this process during 2014-2015.
- + Provides voluntary mental health screening and assessment for students or area schools.

♦ Food Pantry Submitted by Diane Gerlach

In October, the pantry served 167 families which included 227 children, 374 adults, and 86 seniors for a total of 687 people served.

During the month of October Zion members donated 176 pounds of food. In addition, 69 pounds of frozen food items donated from John Hinkle. Thank you for your weekly food donations and your continued financial contributions to the pantry. Monetary contributions allow the pantry to pur-



chase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank in Harrisburg at greatly reduced prices per pound which include meats, eggs, dairy products and other food items not donated through food collections. Financial contributions also allow the pantry to purchase food items on sale at local food stores and to purchase supplies for the pantry. The pantry purchased chickens and turkeys to give to our families for the Thanksgiving holiday.

During the month of October....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,587 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated 2,174 pounds of fresh produce and 121 pounds of bakery items; Weis Markets in Columbia donated 875 pounds of bread and bakery items; Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 260 pounds of bread and bakery items; S. Clyde Weaver donated 289 pounds of bread and bakery items; Forry's 102 pounds of produce; Giant of Kissel Hill, Lititz contributed 212 pounds of bakery items; Giant of Mount Joy donated 376 pounds of bakery items. The pantry purchased 234 pounds of food items through local grocery stores; 5,731 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank; and received 1,656 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program in Lancaster. Sixty eight volunteers gave 645 hours during the month of October.

Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give to serving them with a true serv-

ant's heart and a smile! We could not provide this important community service without our volunteers! The pantry continues to operate with a full non-paid staff. Eighteen churches in the Hempfield area support the pantry with food, finances and volunteers. In addition, the local boy scouts and girls scouts, Hempfield School District students and staff, Hemfield Woman's Club, Rotary Club, postal employees, Union National Bank

Salunga, Village Grande Community, Willow Valley Retirement Community, many individuals and businesses all join the "fight against hunger" in the Hempfield area. **During this holiday season, many businesses, boy scouts, Hempfield High School Student Council, and individuals contribute food items to the pantry.**

Zion can be very proud to provide the space for this outreach mission to our families in the Hempfield School District who need help in providing food for their families. YOU are welcome to visit the community pantry located here at Zion on our "open" days (Monday and Wednesday from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM) to witness God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action! Thank you!

Pathways Center for Grief & Loss Grief Support Series

Grief support groups are held on Thursday evenings starting with a light supper at 6 PM. From 6:30-7:30 PM children and teens meet in age-specific groups while the parents/guardians gather separately to learn how to support grieving children.

These sessions are for anyone who has lost a loved one as a result of illness or from a sudden, unexpected death.

All groups are facilitated by master's level grief counselors and trained volunteers. We focus on helping children identify and express their feelings as they share experiences about the death of their loved one. Groups enhance family communication and expand the personal skills needed to cope with, and adjust to, the intense feelings and challenges that accompany loss and grief.

Prior to enrolling in a series, families attend an assessment to ensure that the support groups will be helpful.
