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From the Pastor:

"Let there be light!" As we sang "Shine, Jesus, Shine" during worship recently, this phrase really shone out for me. These are the words God spoke as creation began:

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness.

(Gen 1:1-4 NRS)

Without light we wouldn't exist, for it was the first thing God created. Light is essential for our lives and for the lives of most living things. Light (or the lack of it) affects us physically, emotionally and spiritually. How many times have you stumbled in the darkness because you couldn't see what was in front of you? Why do children ask for a night light to be left on? Have you ever told someone to "lighten up" because he was getting too morose? Why does light therapy help those with depression?

During the season of Epiphany, we celebrate the gift of light as it has come into our lives through Jesus Christ, the Word become flesh. John's Gospel begins with a beautiful hymn about this light:

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. (Joh 1:1-5 NRS)

It is because of Jesus that we need never fear darkness of any kind. His love, forgiveness and hope shine to lighten every corner of our lives. When we are troubled, fearful, sad, lonely, in pain, or dealing with conflict in relationships—in all the dark times of our lives— Jesus is with us shining his light to give us courage

and strength. If it seems that the Lord is hidden by the darkness that seems to surround us, we merely need to remember to flip the switch of faith by reaching out in prayer. "Shine, Jesus, Shine!" may be words you can pray in these times, and "Let there be light!"

Because of our faith in Jesus, the light of the world (John 8:12), we are called to be his light for all we meet (Matt. 5:14-16), so that they may also give glory to God. How does Jesus' light shine through you each day? In what ways could you give glory to God in and through your everyday life? How can we as a community of faith in Jesus better shine His light within our community this year? There is so much darkness in our world. Let there be light!

How Long Should You Pray?

There is nothing that dictates how much time you should spend praying, but there is lots of evidence to support the theory of more being better. The Apostle Paul felt that prayer should be unceasing. In the Book of Thessalonians, he exhorted the followers of Christ to "Pray constantly, and for all things give thanks to God, because this is what God expects you to do..." (1 Thessalonians 5:17-18). John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist Church, devoted two hours of his day to prayer. Martin Luther did him one better and prayed for 3 hours a day.

More, however, isn't necessarily better. In fact, focusing on God for short periods of time is defi-

nitely Superior to praying for hours while your mind is elsewhere. Given the choice, it's better to work with less rather than more, and do it right. Emphasize quality over quantity.

If you're new to prayer, keep it short and simple. Start with a few minutes a day. If you feel like extending your prayer time, by all means do so. But don't feel like you have to spend hours in prayer, or that you're letting God down if you can only manage five minutes a day. You won't have any gold stars if you go longer, or get demerits for brevity. On the other hand, the more time you spend talking to God, the more you'll get out of it. Let God's spirit lead you both into and out of your prayer time, and the amount of time you spend in prayer will be right and perfect.

Lenten Emphasis

Luther's Small Catechism for All Ages

The year 2017 marks the international observance of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. In honor of that anniversary, this year's midweek Lenten series is built around Luther's Small Catechism. The Small Catechism was designed as a teaching tool of the faith, not just within the church but in the home. Luther intended for the home to be the place where faith was first shared and taught. To that end he created the Small Catechism—a simple explanation of the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the sacraments. He included basic prayers for morning and evening, and suggested ways to worship, praise, and revere God during each part of our day.

Beginning on March 8th, we will be gathering in the Social Room for an evening of food, fun, crafts, learning, and worship. We'll start with a soup and bread supper at 5:30, followed by a time of table conversation and theme-based craft-making. The evening will close with worship.

The first week of this series sets the stage with the handing down of the Ten Commandments in Exodus.

The following weeks look at each major section of the Small Catechism in turn:

March 15: The Creed,
March 22: The Lord's Prayer,
March 29: Baptism
April 5: Holy Communion.

Each participant will receive his/her own copy of Luther's *Small Catechism*, and each evening there will be take-home items to enhance your experience at home.

Studying the Small Catechism offers a way of growing closer to God by thinking on God's word and the basics of our faith.


ABOUT THE LUTHERANS

Luther's Small Catechism

Of all the things Martin Luther wrote, he is probably best known for two things: the hymn "A mighty fortress is our God" and the Small Catechism. Interestingly, Luther himself was ambivalent about the lasting value of most of his writings, with two exceptions—and one of them was this little pamphlet, the Small Catechism. And this from someone whose writings changed the whole landscape of the Western religious world.

Most of us know the Small Catechism well. Many spent hours memorizing it as teens. But how did it come to be, and what is it that makes it so helpful?

In 2017 we are observing the 500th anniversary of the Reformation's start, when Luther posted the Ninety-Five Theses. If that was the act of a passionate young man, a decade later he was facing the needs of the church he was reforming. If it was no longer enough just to go through the




motions, following the lead of a Latin-rite priest, then what was at the heart of what people needed to know—and how were they to learn that? To meet that need, Luther the pastor and teacher created two catechisms—the Large (primarily intended for pastors) and the Small (for use in the home).

A catechism is a document that lays out the basic ideas of religion in a simple question-and-answer format. For the Small Catechism, Luther chose to open up some of the basics of Christian faith: the Ten Commandments, the Apostles' Creed, the Lord's Prayer, the sacraments of Holy Baptism

and Holy Communion, and the Office of the Keys and Confession. It's worth noticing that he based this teaching document on what already existed rather than starting from scratch and inventing a whole new system. Luther was committed to the church catholic.


His genius is shown in the way he opened up these statements of faith. The famous question in each case was, in German, "Was ist das?" In English, most of us know this as "What does this mean?" but a literal translation would be "What is that?" And then




he proceeded to tell, in beautifully simple language, what each commandment, each part of the creed, each petition of the Lord's Prayer, tells us about God and about us as God's children. These explanations set out a God who is not the stern judge of Luther's own childhood, but a loving parent who offers us unconditional grace and only then invites us to live accordingly.

How profound was Luther's achievement in writing the Small Catechism? A mark of it can be seen in the simple fact that nearly five hundred years after its first publication in 1529, and after being translated into hundreds of languages, it is still one of the most effective tools for learning and teaching what the Christian faith is all about.

Property Courtyard Project Submitted by Darrell Gerke

Background information

The ZYM room in the basement of the Social Room became unusable several years ago due to the mold in the damp environment. The Property Committee hired a contractor to remove the mold and installed two dehumidifiers to try to keep the basement dry.

It was discovered that one of the down spouts in the Parlor Courtyard was plugged with debris which was removed and during the summer of 2016 the basement remained dry and mold free.

The Property Committee listened to three proposals from contractors who specialize in basement water problems. The cost estimates ranged from \$15,000.00 to \$25,000.00. All three proposals only planned to remove water after it continued to get into the basement. None of the companies planned to try to prevent water from coming into the basement in the first place.

The Property Committee decided the cost was too great and continued to use the dehumidifiers to try to keep the basement dry.

Using my past experience at our own home of sloping the earth away from the basement walls which produced a dry basement, I formulated a plan to collect the rain water in the courtyard and route it out to the street using the present down spout drainage system. I presented my ideas to the Property Committee in October and on Oct. 17, 2016 I presented a formal plan to the Church Council. The Council approved an expenditure not to exceed \$1,600.00 for the project.

Goal of project: Capture rainwater in courtyard with a pond liner membrane and catch basin system to route the water to the existing down spout drainage system to prevent moisture from leaching down to the Social Room basement wall and causing mold and a moldy smell in the ZYM room.

Objectives: 1) Remove an old, unused fuel tank buried in the courtyard.

2) Slope the soil in the courtyard to a centrally located catch-basin to be tied into the present down spout system.

3) Cover the black pond liner with Tan and White river stone to improve the courtyard appearance.

Results of Objectives and Goal

Objective 1): The oil tank first appeared to be a small 275 gallon vertical tank. Upon attempting to remove the tank on Nov. 14, 2016 with an excavator, it soon became clear that the tank is a round 550 gallon tank which is too large to remove with the small excavator. A large crane at a very large expense would be needed to remove the large tank.

Plan B- The proper way to decommission a tank in-place is to open the top of the tank, drain any unused fuel and fill with stone. This was completed on Dec. 10, 2016 with 5 cubic yards of 2A stone.

Objective 2): On Dec. 15, 2016 the catch basin was installed and piping connected to the present down spout drainage system. On Dec. 31, 2016 2 cubic yards of 2A stone was used to slope the court-yard to the catch basin, the landscaping fabric was laid over the stone and then the pond liner was installed.

Objective 3): On Jan. 8 and 14, 2017 4 cubic yards of Tan and White river stone was used to cover the black pond liner. The entire project was completed on Jan. 14, 2017.

I would like to thank the following eleven members of Zion for working at one or more of the group work sessions: Christian, Evan and Todd Benedict, Ed Blough, Mark Coons, Steve Haun, Scott Hetrick, Jere Grube, Jesse Landis, Randy Miller, and Rodger Myers. They worked a total of 105 hours which helped to complete the project on time.

Jere Grube brought his garden tiller to church which was used to loosen the soil and then grade the soil in the courtyard; a crucial step to the overall project. Thank you, Jere!

A big, big thank you goes to Rodger Myers for his help in trucking all the stone with his truck that is equipped with a dump shoot which made it easy to load wheelbarrows to get the stone through the Parlor into the courtyard. Rodger also donated all the 2A stone which was used to fill the fuel oil tank and to slope the surface of the courtyard for proper drainage. Rodger's donations helped to complete the project on-time and under budget. (Two phrases that are good to describe any building project).

The actual cash outlay for this project was \$1,271.13 and adding in the donated items at a value of \$410.00 makes the true total value of this project \$1,681.13.

Goal

Courtyard rain water will now be collected and drained to the street at Brandt Blvd. It will take a full year to see if the new drainage system fulfills the goal of preventing a wet Social Room basement.

At a distance the courtyard now looks like a beach at the ocean so maybe the Property Committee should put in a few beach lounge chairs and play recorded sounds of the waves washing up on the beach so members can catch some rays and feel like they are on vacation at the shore.

ZION COMMUNITY MEAL



Kenda Creasy Dean to Speak at PRC Event

How do churches minister to Millennials. a generation who embrace Christianity, but are apathetic, even wary, of the organized church?

Rev. Dr. Kenda Creasy Dean, Professor of Youth, Church and Culture at Princeton Theological Seminary, will speak to this question during "An Evening with Kenda Creasy Dean," hosted by the Parish Resource Center on Thursday, February 23, 2017 at 7 p.m.

Millennials' faith is "not durable enough to survive long after they graduate from high school. One more thing: we're responsible," Dean says.

What should churches do?

Dean urges churches to stick to their message, their faith community, and their mission, rather than watering down their beliefs with the hopes of attracting more young people. That is simply "a dogood, feel-good spirituality," as she calls it.

Dean argues in her book, Almost Christian, that young, committed Christians share several traits, all of which churches can learn from and respond to

when creating youth ministries program: a personal relationship with God, a dynamic congregation and/or youth group, a sense of call, and hope.

How do churches help to create and foster these good environments and opportunities?

How do they create the authentic atmosphere young people crave?

Dean will speak with hope about how to address these questions and more during "An Evening with Kenda Creasy Dean."


