

From The Pastor's Keyboard

On October 31, 2017, Protestant Christians all over the world will be commemorating the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. According to historical accounts, on October 31, 1517, in Wittenberg, Germany, a German monk named Martin Luther changed the Christian Church, and therefore the world, by posting his "95 Theses" or "Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences." This document was a direct attack on the practices of the Roman Catholic Church at that time with special focus on the selling of indulgences.

Martin Luther's aim in the public display of his series of 95 talking points was to spur debate that would lead to the reformation of the Catholic Church and its leadership. Instead, his revolutionary act provided the spark that became the Protestant Reformation and changed the western Christian church irrevocably. The Roman Catholic Church became just one of many organized expressions of the Christian faith. As of 1982, there were an estimated number of 8, 196 Protestant denominations (David A. Barrett, 1982).

As is true of any revolution that changes the status quo, there were both positive and negative results of what Luther put in motion. Nonetheless, Martin Luther's role in the Protestant Reformation was integral to the formation of Protestant denominations, and most especially, the Lutheran Church.

To honor this significant anniversary for the Protestant (and therefore Lutheran) faith, events and other related activities have been ongoing in Europe and the U.S. since 2015. Zion has joined in on this commemoration with special Sunday programs on the development of the Lutheran liturgy in the summer of 2016, a special Reformation Service in October of 2016,

Continue Your Offerings Through The Summer

We wait all year for those "lazy, hazy, crazy days of summer" (as the old song goes), and then we fill them with vacations at the beach, camping trips in the woods and flying to far-off places. It's no wonder that church attendance dips in the summer.

But while you are relaxing, your church continues to be busy – with regular worship, social activities, caring for sick and the homebound members, planning weddings, baptisms and funerals, and ministering to the hungry and homeless in your community. And your pastor and church staff still need to be paid, as does the electric company.

So, here's the problem: The bills continue to roll in even when you're away, and many congregants have not planned to keep their offerings current when they are on vacation. That's why so many congregations face a cash crunch in the summer months.

But here are some ideas for how to help your congregation maintain its finances in the summer months.

Pay it forward: Your congregation would love to receive your summer offerings – or part of them – in advance. If you know you're going to be away, plan ahead by offering more in the weeks in advance of your time away from church.

Make it up: Alternatively, when you get back from your time away, give a little more in the weeks that follow in order to make up for the lost weeks.

Use your envelopes: Are you a check-writing person? Then simply fill in advance your offering envelopes with your weekly gift. If you have a check in every envelope, then on any given Sunday you need only to bring that day's envelope and whatever earlier Sunday envelopes are there.

Use banking bill pay: Lots of people find online banking services a convenient way to pay their monthly car loan, mortgage, light bill and other routine expenses. Why not your church offering, too? Many online banking services will cut a check and send it to the church for you.

Enroll in electronic giving: If your congregation subscribes to an electron-

ic giving service, such as Vanco, you can help by enrolling. Your offerings will go right to the church in the amount and according to the timeframe you specify. If your church does not subscribe to electronic giving, ask your leaders to explore some options.


Adjust your weekly offering: To calculate a weekly offering amount, most people take their annual donation amount and divide it by 52, since there are 52 Sundays in a year. The problem comes when they miss a Sunday and have to play "catch up." To get around this, instead, estimate the minimum number of those 52 Sundays a year you are likely to be in church and divide your annual amount accordingly.


Of course, these methods are beneficial not only for the summer months, but also for the whole year through. Those who embrace giving as a spiritual discipline often find that their lives of faith are enriched and their sense of joy and fulfillment is deepened. Choosing a regular-giving strategy can help you to discover the joys of generosity.

Mission Trip To West Virginia Submitted by Randy Miller

On June 23, 2016 terrible storms and serious flooding swept through sections of West Virginia. While flooding is not uncommon in the deep narrow valleys of West Virginia, June 23rd was exceptional. Given the intensity of the storm, coupled with factors like downed trees forming dams at bridges, houses that had never seen flooding or where past flooding has been minor, saw muddy waters enter their walls. Such was the case at the home in Camden on Gauley. While it was not uncommon for water from the Gauley River to come up to the curb in front of their house (which by the way was nearly three feet high), they never expected to get the eight feet of water that resulted from the flooding. It destroyed everything on their first floor.

Enter Zion's Mission Team. From May 14 through 19, 2017, Zion's Mission Team comprised of Bill Piper, Dave Wise, Jesse Landis, Joanne Grim (yes, we did eat very well), Dolly Overly, Pastors Bob and JMe Lowden, Randy Miller, Marcia Eisenhour (from Trinity UCC church in East Pete), and Karen and Mark Steinmiller (friends of Randy from Pittsburgh) went to Webster Springs WV. Our assignment was that very house in Camden on Gauley, about ½ hour from our base camp. Eleven months after the flood, the family was still living under temporary and difficult conditions. Oh yes, previous teams (and the father

of the family, who is quite handy) installed a new kitchen. However, we arrived to find bedrooms with new drywall, but holes in the ceilings, untaped seams and unfinished joints. The family was sleeping on wall to wall mattresses on the floor of the only room that had been finished. Bathrooms? Well, there was a half bath on the first floor of the adjacent home (same owners). But unless there was something on the second floor of the adjacent house, I am not sure where the family bathed. Conditions were tough, but the family seemed to take it in stride. To quote the father of the family: "I have helped many others in the past rebuild after floods, but I never thought I would be needing help".

Throughout the week, God guided us to perform tasks that were outside of our comfort zones. Repairing holes in drywall; mudding; sanding; hanging drywall; pouring and troweling concrete (way to go Dave!); things that we had perhaps done before but at which we were certainly not proficient. We worked through the noise of compressors; the ever presence of plaster dust falling on our heads, faces and bodies; lifting 10 foot panels of drywall (and 80 pound bags of concrete) that I don't think were meant to be lifted. We worked together as a team. We had fun. We got tired. And we made a difference.

By Friday, out team looked back on what we had accomplished and felt pretty good. Two bedrooms were completely finished with the exception of flooring and molding (temporarily lay carpet and the girls could move back in). A third bedroom and a hallway were fully repaired and primed. A second hallway, the laundry room and the bathroom – well, there was still some mudding and sanding to be done but they looked so much better than when we arrived. The same was true of the living room. It really only needs a finished coat of paint. Yes, we left a house that could be comfortably lived in. Plus we left some rooms that with God's help can be finished by the next Mission Team to complete the house.


On Friday, on the way home, we stopped finished in WV within the next by to say goodbye to the family. We met the that Zion can be there to help. mother for the first time, along with her 2

daughters. They were so happy and appreciative. To quote Jesse, "Yesterday, to see the mom (I forget her name) and the two cute red-headed girls who we helped, is why I go on mission trips. They were truly thankful. To know what we did for them, is gratification for me." Dave followed up with "We didn't volunteer to be rewarded, but the experience was nevertheless both rewarding and gratifying. Through the inspiration and strength of the Holy Spirit we performed God's work with our hands and backs, and made a difference in the lives of those that suffered great hardship." I couldn't have summed it up better myself.

Let me end by saying that hopefully there will never be a need for another Mission Trip. But if a need arises (or the work isn't finished in WV within the next year), I hope that Zion can be there to help.

Joanne Grim Honored by Hempfield/Lancaster Rotary Club

On Tuesday, May 23, 2017, Joanne Grim was presented the Paul Harris "Service Above Self" Award for her volunteerism during a special meeting of the Hempfield/ Lancaster Rotary Club. This award has been presented to outstanding people in recognition of their service to the community, nation, and world for 100 years. One notable award recipient is Jonas Salk, the notable physician who developed the polio vaccine. The eradication of polio has been a focus of the Rotary Club International for many years.

Darrell Gerke of Zion, one of the Rotary members who nominated Joanne for the award, highlighted to the club members about her work to organize and lead the Community Meal at Zion for the past 10 years. The Hempfield Lancaster Rotary Club provides and serves meals four times a year for the Community Meal. He also emphasized her involvement in Zion's participation with the Lancaster City community meals at Christ Lutheran Church and in multiple mission trips to Mississippi and Louisiana in response to the devastation of Hurricane Katrina with groups from the congregation.

Other guests at this special presentation were Joanne's daughter and son-in-law, Sue and Bill Stathopulos, two of Joanne's cousins, and Pastor JMe. Pastor JMe spoke of Joanne's leadership in the Yarn and Blanket Ministries of Zion and her work in the community in support of the United Way Day of Caring and the A. Herr Park Playground Build. In addition, she pointed out that the original date for Joanne's recognition was scheduled for May 16, but because she participated in a mission trip to West Virginia with members of Zion, the date had to be changed to a week later. Joanne is certainly a very special model of what it means to put service above self!


In April, the pantry served 160 families which included 221 children, 345 adults, and 76 seniors for a total of 642 people served.

During the month of April Zion members donated 119 pounds of food..... Thank you for your weekly food donations and your continued financial contributions to the pantry. Monetary contributions allow the pantry to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank in Harrisburg at greatly reduced prices per pound which include meats, eggs, dairy products and other food items not donated through food collections. Financial contributions also allow the pantry managers to "shop for" food items on sale at local food stores and to purchase supplies for the pantry.

During the month of April....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,057 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated 1,753 pounds of fresh produce and 108 pounds of bakery items; Weis Markets in Columbia donated 867 pounds of bread and bakery items; Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 214 pounds of bread and bakery items: S. Clyde Weaver donated 195 pounds of bread and bakery items; Forry's 26 pounds of produce: Giant of Kissel Hill. Lititz donated 300 pounds of bakery items; Giant of Mount Joy donated 1.220 pounds of bakery items. The pantry purchased 2,197 pounds of food items through local grocery stores; 6,206 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank; and received 1,694 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program in Lancaster. Again in April, shoppers at Stauffer's Rohrerstown purchased \$5.00 bags of food items which were donated to the pantry. In addition to the above donations and purchases, 6,497 pounds of food staple items were donated from the community.

Sixty six volunteers gave 697 hours during the month of April. The pantry is a complete volunteer effort, operating with a full non-paid staff. Our

clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give to serving with a true servant's heart



Rotary Lancaster/Hempfield held their annual "Shop for a Cause" at Park City on Saturday, April 29. Again this year, Rotary sponsored HAFP. The pantry received 267 pounds of food donations and \$583.00 from this activity. Park City shoppers received "credit points" by registering their store receipts at the Rotary station. The credit points could then be used to "vote" for their chosen non-profit participant in the mall. Shoppers were also eligible for door prizes by visiting ten of the non-profit booth displays throughout the mall. THANK YOU ROTARY!


