From the Pastor: "The Small Catechism For Today" "What does this mean?" This question begins each section of Martin Luther's explanations in the Small Catechism. Being concerned that the common people of his time were ignorant of the central tenants of the Christian Faith, he wrote his little instruction book as a means to help parents teach their children the Ten Commandments, the Apostles' Creed, and the Lord's Prayer. He, also, included sections on the Sacraments of Holy Baptism and Holy Communion, the Office of the Keys (Confession), and prayers for families and individuals to use during their meals and daily prayer times.

Five hundred years have passed since The Small Catechism was penned by Martin Luther. During all these years, generations of Lutheran Christians have been instructed in the Faith using this resource. Many were required to memorize the Small Catechism in order to be confirmed by their local congregation as members of the Church. Perhaps some who are reading this article still remember Martin Luther's explanations. Sadly, my memory is not very good, but I will never forget the acclamation at the end of each article of the Creed: "This is most certainly true!"

In a culture where "alternate facts" (or truths) seem to prevail, it is difficult sometimes to differentiate between truth and lies. I find comfort in the fact that, after almost two millennia, the truth that undergirds my faith, indeed

my life, is contained in the Holy Scriptures and in the Commandments, Creed and Lord's Prayer. It's true that, being of the Lutheran branch of Christianity, I have a particular understanding of what it means to be Christian. However, the truth of God's loving grace, forgiveness and salvation shown to the world through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus (God in the flesh) is central to all those who claim Jesus as their Savior and Lord.

Is it necessary to study and learn the Small Catechism of Martin Luther in order to be "Lutheran"? Knowing the contents of the catechism is not necessary for salvation; however, the Small Catechism provides a concise description of how Lutheran Christians understand the central tenants of the Christian Faith. The explanations contained in this little instruction book are helpful to anyone who is wondering what we believe and how these beliefs affect how we live in relationship with God and with one another.

When parents bring a child to be baptized, they promise to teach their child the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments. The Small Catechism is a great resource to help them fulfill this promise. When an adult desires to be baptized or comes from another Christian background to join Zion, time is taken to share with him/her the basics of our faith using the Bible and the Small Catechism. If a person begins questioning what he believes, the Small Catechism may help provide answers. Even if a person is a life-long Lutheran, a review of the Small Catechism will affirm her faith and bring renewed understanding of what it means to say, "I believe."

During Lent, a traditional time for instruction in the Christian Faith, we will be focusing on the teachings found in Luther's Small Catechism. On Sunday mornings, portions of the Catechism will be used as an alternative confession of faith. At our Wednesday evening cross-generational events, there will be activities for all ages to learn, review, and renew what it means to be a Christian using the Small Catechism. 



We all face times in our lives when we feel overwhelmed by worry, uncertainty, loss or loneliness.

Here are 10 suggestions for how to cope with life's ups and downs:

1. Take time to reflect and pray

Prayer and meditation can provide opportunities for reflection, peace and connection with God and the world around you.

2. Be grateful

Having a heart and mind of gratitude changes how we look at life. It can help us see the good, even in the midst of life's challenges.

3. Laugh

Laughter can remind you there is no situation so serious that God can't lighten it with his love and grace.

4. Let things go

Letting go of the anger, grief and hurt weighing you down will help you discover peace with God, yourself and others.

5. Talk with others

Having someone with whom you can "think out loud" provides support, encouragement and new perspectives.

6. Exercise

Staying active can release feel-good chemicals, boost your self-esteem and give you another reason to go outdoors or to stay connected. Even low-impact activities like golf or Tai Chi are great ways to keep your body moving.

7. Get plenty of sleep

Let your body and mind recharge with a good night's rest. Establish a regular sleep routine and try to stick to it every night.

8. Try something new

Fearless Generosity

Most Christians today only associate the idea of stewardship with sermons they have heard about church budgets and building programs because that's the only time stewardship is talked about or even mentioned. As Stewardship Chairman I want to define stewardship and make it a very important part of your Christian daily life all year long. Giving money to church for budgets and building programs, which is from God and not ours in the first place, is good but is only a small part of stewardship.

The fundamental principle of biblical stewardship is that God owns everything; we are simply managers or administrators acting on his behalf. Bill Peel from The High Calling wrote an essay entitled "Leadership Is Stewardship" where he suggests that we need to understand the four principles of biblical stewardship.

1. The principle of ownership.

The psalmist in the 24th psalm begins; The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it.

This is where the fundamental principle of stewardship comes from. Stewardship is the commitment of one's self and possessions to God's service, recognizing that we do not have the right of control over our property or ourselves.

2. The principle of responsibility.

God owns everything; we're responsible for how we treat it and what we do with it.
While we complain about our rights here on earth, the Bible constantly asks, What

about your responsibilities? Owners have rights; stewards have responsibilities. We are called as God's stewards to manage well that which belongs to God according to his desires and purposes.

3. The principle of accountability.

A steward is one who manages the possessions of another. We are all stewards of the resources, abilities and opportunities that God has entrusted to our care, and one day each of us will be called to give an account for how we managed what the Master has given us. This is the maxim taught by the Parable of the Talents.

4. The principle of reward.

The Bible shows us in the parables of the Kingdom that faithful stewards who do the master's will with the master's resources can expect to be rewarded incompletely in this life, but fully in the next. We all should long to hear the master say what he exclaims in Matthew 25:21: We done, good and faithful servant! Come and share your master's happiness.

As Christians in the 21st century, we need to embrace this larger biblical view of stewardship, which goes beyond church budgets or building projects, though important; it connects everything we do with what God is doing in the world. We need to be faithful stewards of all God has given us within the opportunities presented through his providence to glorify him, serve the common good and further his Kingdom.

West Virginia Mission Trip Planned!

Last fall, I announced that I was hoping to put together a mission trip to help rebuild homes that were ravaged by flooding earlier in 2016. Zion has held six mission trips to rebuild homes after Hurricane Katrina, and our youth group held a mission to assist with rebuilding homes damaged by Hurricane Sandy. Helping others who are in need is the cornerstone of our Christian faith. In that, these mission trips are a very worthy cause – a cause that I hope to keep alive at our church.

I have been in touch with Sherri Schafer at Community Lutheran Partners. I explained what we would be looking for as it relates to accommodations (housing and meals being provided, just like Mississippi and New Jersey), and that we are interested in the week of May 15 – 19. I also e-mailed a skills sheet to her, estimating what skills we could offer based on those members who have expressed an interest. She expects that she can accommodate us that week!

As I had said in church on February 12^{th} , you don't have to have a skill. You don't have to be strong. All you need is the desire to help others who are less fortunate than we are. Sherri indicated that there is a good chance that we will be going to Webster Springs, located in Webster County. [However, that is subject to change.] She said that there has been so much devastation that the need for help will likely exist for the next 3-5 years.

We have invited Trinity UCC (East Petersburg) to join us on this trip. Between the two churches, I would like to see 20 to 25 of us going down there. We can make a difference. Food Pantry Submitted by Diane Gerlach

In January, the pantry served 158 families which included 206 children, 348 adults, and 83 seniors for a total of 637 people served.

During the month of January Zion members donated 105 pounds of food.....80 of those pounds donated on Super Bowl Sunday! In addition, \$106.84 was contributed through the Super Bowl "contest". Thank you for your weekly food donations and your



continued financial contributions to the pantry. Monetary contributions allow the pantry to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank in Harrisburg at greatly reduced prices per pound which include meats, eggs, dairy products and other food items not donated through food collections. Financial contributions also allow the pantry managers to "shop for" food items on sale at local food stores and to purchase supplies for the pantry.

During the month of January....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,476 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated 2,124 pounds of fresh produce and 121 pounds of bakery items; Weis Markets in Columbia donated 1,325 pounds of bread and bakery items; Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 250 pounds of bread and bakery items; S. Clyde Weaver donated 282 pounds of bread and bakery items; Forry's 310 pounds of produce; Giant of Kissel Hill, Lititz contributed 310 pounds of bakery items; Giant of Mount Joy donated 870 pounds of bakery items. The pantry purchased 234 pounds of food items through local grocery stores; 5,340 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank; and received 1,931 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program in Lancaster. In addition to the above donations and purchases, 7,823 pounds of food staple items were donated from the community. Fifty nine volunteers gave 627 hours during the month of January.



Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give to serving them with a true servant's heart and a smile! We could not provide this important community service without our volunteers! The pantry continues to operate with a full non-paid staff. Eighteen churches in the Hempfield area

support the pantry with food, finances and volunteers. In addition, the local boy scouts and girls scouts, Hempfield School District students and staff, Hemfield Woman's Club, Rotary Club, postal employees, Union National Bank Salunga, Village Grande Community, Willow Valley Retirement Community, many individuals and businesses all join the "fight against hunger" in the Hempfield area.

Zion can be very proud to provide the space for this outreach mission to our families in the Hempfield School District who need help in providing food for their families. YOU are welcome to visit the community pantry located here at Zion on our "open" days (Monday and Wednesday from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM) to witness God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action! Thank you!

Krista Tippett To Speak in Lancaster

Beloved for her NPR show and podcast, "On Being," Krista Tippett, New York Times bestselling author and Peabody-award winning broadcaster, will speak on Saturday, March 4 at 7 p.m. at an event hosted by the Parish Resource Center. The event will be held at Lancaster Mennonite School's Fine Arts Center.

Each ticket includes a free copy of Tippett's latest book, *Becoming Wise*.

"I'm a person who listens for a living. I listen for wisdom, and beauty, and for voices not shouting to be heard," Tippett said. During the evening, she will speak about what she's learned in what has become a conversation across time and generations, across disciplines and denominations.
