
FINAL TAIZE SERVICE OF THE SEASON





SUMMER JOYFUL NOISE COLLECTIONS

Since mid-June, a group of volunteers has been sorting through nearly 30 years worth of teaching materials, craft supplies, toys, books and equipment that was used in the nursery school. I would like to acknowledge several people who volunteered many hours of their time on this project. They are: Marie Adams, Cathy Benedict, Connie Alsedeck, Millie Gundel, and Scott Hetrick. Richard Heim also provided his wood-working expertise to repair and refinish a few items which can now be used in the church nursery.

We opened the nursery school room on four days to the public and were able to liquidate most of the usable items. The Food Bank purchased a book display and some of the books. They are now offering a book exchange to children who come with their parents to the Food Bank! A few representatives of local nursery schools and child care centers came and purchased items for their programs. Also, a big thank you goes to all the church members who purchased toys and other supplies. We were able to earn enough money to replenish the funds borrowed from the endowment fund during the past school year. The remaining items will be donated to various places. Thanks to everyone who supported the Nursery School over the years!

God's Work Our Hands: Sunday, September 11, 2016

For the past several years, ELCA congregations have participated in a day of service on the Sunday after Labor Day. Usually celebrated as "Rally Day" in many churches, the "God's Work, Our Hands" emphasis has become a wonderful way to bring members together for a common purpose after the Summer months.



This year, Zion will be a participating congregation in "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday. In commemoration of the 15th anniversary of the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks that killed thousands in New York City, Washington, D.C., and western Pennsylvania, we will be honoring first responders (police officers, fire fighters, emergency medical workers, etc.) and active military personnel of our congregation and community as well as remembering those who have lost their lives in terrorist attacks and other crisis situations. There will be a special worship emphasis on that Sunday. All age groups in the congregation will have the opportunity to participate in a variety of service projects during the day. And, of course, there will be a picnic for everyone to enjoy!

Sunday Nursery Attendants

Due to the lack of the necessary approved adults (i.e., volunteers who have completed the application, certification and training process required by our Child Protection Policy), we have not had a staffed Nursery room for over a year. As a congregation that desires to grow, the lack of childcare for small children on Sundays during worship is a detriment to our mission.

It is our goal to have our Nursery open and attended during the 10:30 service by the time we begin a new program year on September 18. Dianne Coons has agreed to serve as Nursery Coordinator. She has been familiarizing herself with the Safe Church procedures for providing a safe and secure place for parents to leave their small children during the worship service. She will be overseeing the scheduling and providing the orientation/training for Nursery Attendants. Now, she needs to know who desires to be involved with this ministry with the children of our congregation and of our guests.

Some of you have already completed all the paperwork and training in order to be approved adults/mandatory reporters. For this, we thank you. Even if you have not, yet, completed the required application, certifications (clearances) and training, our Child Protection Team and Ministry Staff will assist you to accomplish this as quickly as possible so that you may be involved in any of our ministries with children and youth.

Lay Visitors and Lay Communion Ministers

Do you like to visit with people, listen to their stories, and bring a message of Christian hope and care? Are you being led to take part in a very special ministry to those who have not received Holy Communion regularly due to being homebound? There is an increasing number of members who, due to health concerns or the aging processes, are unable to attend church. Zion is a community whose purpose is "to complete the work assigned to us by our Lord Jesus;" therefore, one of those "assignments" is to care for the infirm and aged as Jesus did. If you are interested in serving as a Lay Visitor or Lay Communion Minister, contact Pastor JMe. There will be training to prepare you for these ministries.

Food Pantry Submitted by Diane Gerlach

In June, the pantry served 184 families which included 240 children, 374 adults, and 90 seniors for a total of 704 people served. In May we registered 11 new families.

During the month of June Zion members donated 234 pounds of food. Thank you for your weekly food donations and your continued financial contributions to the pantry. Your financial contributions are used to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank and "on sale" items at various grocery stores in the area.

During the month of June....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,249 pounds of fresh produce to the pantry; Target in Lititz donated 1,842 pounds of fresh produce and 141 pounds of bakery items; Weis Markets in Columbia donated 1,042 pounds of bread and bakery items: Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 404 pounds of bread and bakery items. S. Clyde Weaver donated 291 pounds of bread and bakery items; Forry's 139 pounds of produce; Giant of Kissel Hill, Lititz contributed 442 pounds of bakery items; Giant of Mount Joy donated 202 pounds of bakery items. The pantry purchased 828 pounds of food items through local grocery stores; 3,256 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank; and received 2,220 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program in Lancaster.



Sixty three volunteers gave 693 hours during the month of June.

In July, the pantry served 554 families which included 196 children, 327 adults, and 80 seniors for a total of 603

people served. In July all families must be reregistered, 145 families were re-registered and 10 new families were added.

During the month of July Zion members donated 72 pounds of food. Thank you for your weekly food donations and especially the fresh produce from our "summer farmers!" Your financial contributions are appreciated and are used to purchase food items at the Central Penn Food Bank and "on sale" items at various grocery stores in the area.

During the month of July....Darrenkamps of Mount Joy donated 1,692 pounds of fresh produce to the pan-

try: Target in Lititz donated 1,780 pounds of fresh produce and 171 pounds of bakery items; Weis Markets in Columbia donated 996



pounds of bread and bakery items; Weis Market Stony Battery Road donated 249 pounds of bread and bakery items. S. Clyde Weaver donated 302 pounds of bread and bakery items; Forry's 98 pounds of produce; Giant of Kissel Hill, Lititz contributed 367 pounds of bakery items; Giant of Mount Joy donated 296 pounds of bakery items. The pantry purchased 720 pounds of food items through local grocery stores; 6,563 pounds of food from the Central Penn Food Bank; and received 2,053 pounds of free food items from Community Action Program in Lancaster.


Fifty nine volunteers gave 692 hours during the month of July. Special thanks to Diane Ramer and Jennifer Pipkin for their assistance with the reregistration of client families during the month of July. Our clients are very appreciative of the time the volunteers willingly give to serving them with a true servant's heart and a smile! We could not provide this important community service without our volunteers! The pantry continues to operate with a full non-paid staff.

Zion can be very proud to provide the space for this outreach mission to our families in the Hempfield School District who need help in providing food for their families. YOU are welcome to visit the community pantry located here at Zion on our "open" days (Monday and Wednesday from 9:00 AM to 1:00 P) to witness God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action!

During the summer months, when children are not in school, the need for extra food items escalates as many of the children of clients receive free and reduced lunches at school. The pantry acknowledges this and provided "extra" food items for the children's breakfast and lunch times through the Abigail Longenecker Grant.

The "main" items needed (requested) for the pantry currently are cereal, canned soup and spaghetti. Cereal is ALWAYS a requested food item. Thank you!

What is Always Being Made New and why do we need this campaign?



The campaign goal represents a 64 percent increase in designated funding for these critical ministries.

As Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton reminds us, "It's not often that such an opportunity to make a real and lasting difference comes along—to start or renew a congregation, to identify and prepare leaders in our church and among our global companion churches, to feed people and equip them to break out of the cycle of hunger and poverty. That's what we can do together through this campaign. And we get to do this in Jesus' name. Thanks be to God!"

Voting members at our 2014 Lower Susquehanna Synod Assembly, held June 5-7 at Messiah College, adopted a Synod Council Resolution on the 25th Anniversary Campaign for the ELCA in the Lower Susquehanna Synod.
