WORSHIP OPPORTUNITIES AT ZION

IN-PERSON: All are invited to join us for worship at 9:00 a.m. each Sunday morning. On September 5, worship will be held outdoors on the Cooper House lawn. Rally Day is scheduled for September 12.

ONLINE: Worship services are live-streamed on the church YouTube channel: <u>http://bit.ly/Zion_Live</u>. If you are unable or prefer not to watch during the live-stream, the recording is available to view any time after the service concludes. Services held outdoors will not be live-streamed.

FOR THOSE WORSHIPPING IN-PERSON

- Mask wearing is recommended for all who attend or participate in any indoor gathering, including worship, at the church. This recommendation is for those who are vaccinated as well as for those who are not. If you are not vaccinated, we are asking you to please wear a mask to keep your fellow congregants as safe as possible. Church should be a loving, caring environment, and we would like to keep it that way.





The Heart of the Matter

When clay becomes a pot, it must first have a center. As a potter spins, pushes, and pulls the clay into its final form, it can easily lose its center and become misshapen. Having lost its center, it fails to fully be what it is being created to be—a pot, a pitcher, a plate, a thing of beauty, a vessel for others.

Faith and religious practice have lost their center in today's readings. Quoting Isaiah, Jesus calls into question "This people" that "honors me with their lips" but whose "hearts are far from me" (Mark 7:6). Some in the religious community have begun focusing on surface matters (the washing of hands, what one eats, the traditions of the elders) and have forgotten the core. What really matters is how one's faith is expressed in mercy, in words and actions that build up rather than tear down the neighbor.

In the second reading James wonders about those who look at themselves in a mirror and upon walking away forget who they are (James 1:23-24). For James, they are simply hearers of the word and not doers. Their lives do not reflect the love and mercy that has claimed them.

And so it is with us. We do not live as the people God has claimed us to be. Our lives lose their center. Our faith practices focus on surface things rather than the core. We fail to be what God has created and is creating us to be—vessels poured out for others. We look at ourselves in the mirror and upon walking away forget who and whose we are.

At the heart of the Christian assembly is Jesus—in word, in song, in prayer, in the neighbor, in water, bread, and wine. Jesus, who embodies forgiveness and mercy, is the heart. Again and again, life becomes misshapen. Again and again, the potter reshapes the clay. The splash of a watery cross, the taste of bread and wine: these things center life in Christ. God's mercy washes over us. God's mercy is implanted in us. God creates life anew; deformed hearts are reformed for works of mercy and love.



Images in the Readings

In antiquity the **heart** was described as the intangibility of human identity, the locus of personality, the location of thought, and the generator of emotion. In biblical poetics, even God has a heart. The metaphoric interpretation is clear when the Bible speaks of an uncircumcised heart. Still today the heart functions as a primary synecdoche (a part that implies the whole) of the human being. Often connected with positive emotions such as pity and love, the heart is also a container of evil. Many churches in the nineteenth century worked to mitigate the traditional emphasis on evil from within.

James's image of the law as a **mirror** has been important for many Christian theologians. Daily we look at this mirror and there see our inadequacies.

James stresses the religious obligation to care for "**orphans and widows**." Repeatedly in the Bible, this phrase suggests everyone who fell outside the normal patriarchal social net: especially orphans and widows lived without the protection and sustenance of a male. Early Christians debated whether widowed women might remarry, and the New Testament records special food supplies sent to widows. Because typically a marriage involved a husband much older than the wife, many women must have been widows for decades.


COMFORTER MINISTRY
