

INTRODUCTION



† THE WORD †

Ecclesiastes 1:2, 12-14; 2:18-23

The teacher of wisdom who wrote Ecclesiastes sees that working for mere accumulation of wealth turns life into an empty game, a "vanity of vanities." Nevertheless, he asserts in the next verse, it is good to find enjoyment in one's work because such enjoyment is a gift from God.

A: ²Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher, vanity of vanities! All is vanity.

¹²I, the Teacher, when king over Israel in Jerusalem, ¹³applied my mind to seek and to search out by wisdom all that is done under heaven; it is an unhappy business that God has given to human beings to be busy with. ¹⁴I saw all the deeds that are done under the sun; and see, all is vanity and a chasing after wind.

^{2:18}I hated all my toil in which I had toiled under the sun, seeing that I must leave it to those who come after me ¹⁹—and who knows whether they will be wise or foolish? Yet they will be master of all for which I toiled and used my wisdom under the sun. This also is vanity. ²⁰So I turned and gave my heart up to despair concerning all the toil of my labors under the sun, ²¹because sometimes one who has toiled with wisdom and knowledge and skill must leave all to be enjoyed by another who did not toil for it. This also is vanity and a great evil. ²²What do mortals get from all the toil and strain with which they toil under the sun? ²³For all their days are full of pain, and their work is a vexation; even at night their minds do not rest. This also is vanity.

⁷One can never redeem another, or give to God the ransom for another's life; ⁸for the ransom of a life is so great that there would never be enough to pay it,

⁹in order to live forever and ever and never see the grave.

¹⁰For we see that the wise die also; like the dull and stupid they perish and leave their wealth to those who come after them.

¹¹Their graves shall be their homes forever, their dwelling places from generation to generation, though they had named lands after themselves.

¹²Even though honored, they cannot live forever; they are like the beasts that perish.

Colossians 3:1-11

Life in Christ includes a radical reorientation of our values. Just as the newly baptized shed their old clothes and put on new garments, so Christians are called to let go of greed and take hold of a life shaped by God's love in Christ.

A: ¹So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. ²Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, ³for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. ⁴When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory.

⁵Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly: fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed (which is idolatry). ⁶On account of these the wrath of God is coming on those who are disobedient. ⁷These are the ways you also once followed, when you were living that life. ⁸But now you must get rid of all such things—anger, wrath, malice, slander, and abusive language from your mouth. ⁹Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have stripped off the old self with its practices ¹⁰and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator. ¹¹In that renewal there is no longer Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free; but Christ is all and in all!

In God's reign, the "rich will be sent away empty." Jesus uses a parable to warn against identifying the worth of one's life with the value of one's possessions rather than one's relationship with God.

Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." ¹⁶Then he told them a parable: "The land of a rich man produced abundantly. ¹⁷And he thought to himself, 'What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?' ¹⁸Then he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and

there I will store all my grain and my goods. ¹⁹And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry.' ²⁰But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' ²¹So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God."

Additional prayers may be lifted up by the congregation and/or pastor.







AN UPDATE FROM MARY HETRICK

The Community Meal is currently on a hiatus in July and August. We had very busy winter and spring months with attendance consistently rising to 110-120 meals per week.

Many thanks to all the sponsoring organizations and the volunteers here at

Zion who help to provide this ministry to our local community on a weekly basis.

The question has been asked, "When will we return to a sit-down meal as we had before the pandemic?" This is not an easy question and there is a lot to consider in making this decision. One of the things that was done to help us determine what to do was survey the participants in the drive-thru line. Results indicated that about half said they would want to have it go back to a sit-down meal and half said they would not attend if it went back to that format.

What other factors need to be considered?

- Attendance at the meal may drop back to 50-60 per week from the 100+ that it has been.
- There would be the opportunity for socialization again for those who enjoyed this in the past.
- It would require more volunteer hours from Zion to set up for the meal.
- A sexton would need to be at the church to operate the chair lift.
- And, of course, the rise in COVID infections once again can't be ignored.

Based on these factors and much consideration and conversation, it has been decided that the drive-thru meal format will continue -- resuming on Thursday, September 8 -- at least until November.

In the meantime, I continue to look for sponsoring groups from the community who might be interested in sponsoring a meal. At this point, there are five open dates for the remainder of the year. If you are aware of any community organizations that might help, please have them contact me (psuocn92@comcast.net). I will be sending out emails as usual for volunteers to help with meals when it is Zion's turn to sponsor a meal. **THANK YOU!**
