





1 Kings 19:15-16, 19-21

In the story preceding today's reading, the prophet Elijah flees for his life to the security of God's mountain. There God reveals to Elijah that there are still other faithful people in Israel and commissions him to anoint new leaders, including his own successor, Elisha.

A: ¹⁵Then the LORD said to [Elijah,] "Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus; when you arrive, you shall anoint Hazael as king over Aram. ¹⁶Also you shall anoint Jehu son of Nimshi as king over Israel; and you shall anoint Elisha son of Shaphat of Abel-meholah as prophet in your place.

¹⁹So he set out from there, and found Elisha son of Shaphat, who was plowing. There were twelve yoke of oxen ahead of him, and he was with the twelfth. Elijah passed by him and threw his mantle over him. ²⁰He left the oxen, ran after Elijah, and said, "Let me kiss my father and my mother, and then I will follow you." Then Elijah said to him, "Go back again; for what have I done to you?" ²¹He returned from following him, took the yoke of oxen, and slaughtered them; using the equipment from the oxen, he boiled their flesh, and gave it to the people, and they ate. Then he set out and followed Elijah, and became his servant.

For Paul, the freedom Christ gives is not permission to do whatever we want. It is the invitation to be what we could not be otherwise. The power and guidance of Christ's Holy Spirit produce a different kind of life, one marked by the fruit of this Holy Spirit.

A: ¹For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

¹³For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. ¹⁴For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." ¹⁵If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.

¹⁶Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh. ¹⁷For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. ¹⁸But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law. ¹⁹Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, ²⁰idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, ²¹envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

²²By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, ²³gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. ²⁴And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. ²⁵If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit. ²⁶Let us not become conceited, competing against one another, envying one another.

Asking Everything

What does it mean to be a disciple? Today's texts answer this question in various ways.

Elisha was given the burdensome mantle of Elijah. Up until this point he'd simply been a student of the great prophet. Then, without much warning, Elijah passed the leadership responsibility onto him and transitioned dramatically from this life into the next. Because it was an immense responsibility, Elisha asked his master for a double portion of his spirit and was given it. God generously provided for Elisha so that he could faithfully continue Elijah's work.

Paul spells out the mission before us. Last week, he pointed out the power we've been given through our baptism. Now he explains that with the Spirit of God within, our lives should be different. He contrasts the work of the flesh with the fruit of the Spirit. We are called to use our freedom in Christ for good, so that God can transform our lives and empower us for ministry.

In the gospel, Jesus faces more resistance from those he's called. People conjure up all sorts of excuses why they can't start right away, but Jesus will have none of it. He's calling and he wants a straight answer now. You're in or you're out. He makes it clear that answering his call and living the life of discipleship requires no less than *everything*.

These passages are difficult. They show how much God is demanding of those who wish to follow. Those called are asked to give everything. No wonder there is resistance. Yet, they also remind us that the Spirit will support our work and, in turn, give us everything to enable us to answer the call.



Images in the Readings

All three readings assume that the hearer knows that oxen are **yoked** together to **plow** fields. Elisha is called away from plowing his fields, and he burns up the yokes; Paul refers to our being yoked to a law that cannot save; and Jesus likens the life of proclaiming the kingdom to plowing a field. Our task is to bring vibrancy to these images, which are so distant from most of our worshipers.

In Genesis, God does send **fire** down from heaven to destroy wicked cities. Luke calls believers to refrain from such retribution and instead to move on to another village. The fire that Luke describes is the illumination on the forehead of each believer's head at Pentecost.

Many Christian artists depicted the Tree of Life filled with the **fruits of the Spirit**: on the branches each little fruit was labeled "love," "joy," "peace," etc. In 1845, Nathaniel Currier also drew "The Tree of Death," on which were fruits corresponding to Paul's list of vices.

There are many different types of hair texture, so no picks or fine-toothed combs; remove packaging One metal nail clippers (attached file optional), remove packaging

business-size envelope; no plastic bags

THE GROWING PROJECT AT THE WITTEL FARM



The Wittel Farm is a community ministry of the Lutheran Camping Corporation (LCC) dedicated to growing and sharing fresh vegetables to end hunger in Lancaster County. This ministry partnership between LCC, the <u>Lower Susquehanna Synod</u>, and <u>Hunger-Free Lancaster County</u>, reclaims a portion of the acreage gifted to the LCC for its original use: farming. FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

In May, 2022.....a total of 494 persons were served which included 139 children, 248 adults, and 107 seniors. Clients may visit the pantry once a week, either Monday or Wednesday. Many clients visit the pantry every week. The grand total of persons served in May was 1,309! During this Covid time, we continue to serve clients with a prepacked box of food items (staples, fresh produce, meat, eggs, cheese and bread/pastry items) placed directly in their car trunk. Clients do not enter the building for their food items. The pantry clients are very appreciative for the food assistance they receive to feed their families as they struggle to make ends meet! Nine new families were registered for the pantry in May.

The pantry would not be able to provide this program to the Hempfield residents without the outreach mission of Zion and the use of Zion's property. This mission is a witness of God's hands, feet, heart, and love in action! In a gesture of appreciation, the Pantry contributes \$1,000.00 per quarter to Zion for assistance with utility costs!

"Thank you" to our Zion members who continue to contribute food items and financially to the pantry. The pantry received 3,582 pounds of free food items through CAP (Community Action Program); 6,218 pounds of food items through community contributions; 2,151 pounds of bread and pastry items from combined stores Weavers East Petersburg, Weis Columbia, Weis Stony Battery, and Stauffers Mount Joy; and 670 pounds of meat products from Weis Stony Battery.

During May, forty-nine volunteers donated 472 hours to the pantry! The pantry operates with a full NON-Paid staff!
