




¹ Then Jesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and P: charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. ² So he summoned him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.' ³ Then the manager said to himself, 'What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. ⁴ I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' 5 So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' ⁶He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' ⁷ Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' 8 And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. ⁹ And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.





receive our prayer.

God of love, inspire the congregation of Zion Lutheran Church to act with care and generosity, prioritizing the needs of our community. Guide us to share resources and support one another, in our outreach and daily lives, so all may flourish in an economy that lifts from the bottom up. God of grace, **receive our prayer.**

EUCHARISTIC PRAYER – GOD, THE HOST OF THE PARTY

P: Blessed are you, Holy God, our host and our joy. From the beginning you prepared a garden, a table of beauty and abundance, inviting creation to feast in your presence.

When your people were enslaved, you led them through the waters, and on the far shore you taught them to dance and sing in freedom. You brought Ruth the outsider into your family, turning sorrow into joy, and weaving her into the story of David and Jesus.

You are the shepherd who rejoices when the sheep is found, the woman who cannot rest until the coin is safe, the father who runs to embrace his children and insists on a feast for all. You are the master whose honor is multiplied when the steward gathers the village into generosity and celebration.

And in the fullness of time, you sent Jesus—the Lamb who gathers us for the feast that has no end, who told stories of parties, tables, and banquets to show us that your kingdom is joy shared with all.

On the night before he gave himself for us, our Lord Jesus took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

And so we proclaim the mystery of our faith:

C: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

P: Send now your Spirit upon this bread and this cup, that we who eat and drink may taste your joy, share your generosity, and live as guests and hosts at your great feast of love.

Through Christ, with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor is yours, almighty Father, now and forever.




PARTAKING IN THE BREAD AND CUP OF SALVATION

All baptized Christians are welcome to partake of the Holy Sacrament. Those who do not or choose not to partake of the sacrament may receive a blessing.



Please use this time for quiet reflection or sing the communion songs until all worshippers have communed and have returned to their seats.





POSTLUDE



The Parable of the Improvisational Steward

In the Mediterranean world of Jesus, honor and shame were the true currencies of life. Reputation, not money, defined status. To be honored was to belong; to be shamed was to be excluded. Wealth was valuable, but chiefly as a tool to build relationships and strengthen community ties.

This cultural backdrop brings Luke 16:1–13, the parable of the dishonest steward, to life. When the steward is accused of wasting his master's property, he faces not only unemployment but deep

dishonor. He admits to himself, "I'm not strong enough to dig, and I'm ashamed to beg." His situation is desperate. Yet, rather than surrender to shame, he improvises. He acts quickly, creatively, even playfully. Calling in the master's debtors, he reduces what they owe—fifty measures of oil here, twenty sheaves of wheat there.

The debtors rejoice. They assume the steward has persuaded the master to a surprising act of generosity. The village buzzes with excitement. Families now have unexpected relief from heavy burdens, and word spreads rapidly about the master's kindness. In such a setting, a celebration must have broken out, for gifts of generosity were honored publicly with feasts and songs of joy.

Now the master is trapped in a web of honor. To rescind the reductions would make him appear stingy and dishonorable. To let them stand secures his reputation as a noble and generous benefactor. Remarkably, the steward has not only secured his own welcome among the debtors but also increased the honor of his master.

The master praises the steward, not for dishonesty, but for improvising with shrewdness. He turned a crisis into a communal celebration. Jesus' point is clear: "Make friends for yourselves by means of unrighteous wealth." In God's economy, true honor comes not from hoarding but from generosity that improvises toward grace, strengthens community, and reflects divine abundance.

- 1. In what ways might discipleship call us to improvise faithfully in messy or ambiguous situations, rather than waiting for perfect certainty?
- 2. The steward's actions led to the debtors' joy, the master's honor, and his own welcome. How might we act in ways that create mutual flourishing, where everyone is lifted up?
- 3. In your community, who bears the weight of shame or exclusion? What creative steps could honor their dignity and bring them into celebration?
- 4. Jesus says to "make friends with unrighteous wealth." What would it look like to use money, influence, or privilege to build relationships that reflect God's generosity?
- 5. How might we see discipleship itself as joining God's ongoing party of grace—where the table keeps expanding, the music never stops, and the joy grows as more people are welcomed in?
