It is a day to worship together, giving thanks for the many gifts with which our native land has been blessed ... freedom, wealth, strength, happiness, clean water, food, and trustworthy Americans and allies.

FACTS ABOUT THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

Drafted by Thomas Jefferson between June 11 and June 28, 1776, the Declaration of Independence is the nation's most cherished symbol of liberty. Jefferson expressed the convictions in the minds and hearts of the American people. The political philosophy of the Declaration was not new; its ideals of individual liberty had already been expressed by John Locke and the Continental philosophers. What Jefferson did was to summarize this philosophy in "self-evident truths" and set forth a list of grievances again the King in order to justify before the world the breaking of ties between the colonies and the mother country.

Note: While Independence Day does not fall within the Church Year calendar as a festival to be observed, it is nonetheless appropriate that something be done within the liturgy of this holiday weekend to give thanks for the freedoms we share in this great land, including the freedom to worship. FIRST READING

+ THE PEOPLE OF GOD HEAR GOD'S WORD +

A: A reading from Deuteronomy.

[Moses said:] Now this is the commandment—the statutes and the ordinances—that the Lord your God charged me to teach you to observe in the land that you are about to cross into and occupy, so that you and your children and your children's children, may fear the Lord your God all the days of your life, and keep all his decrees and his commandments that I am commanding you, so that your days may be long. Hear therefore, O Israel, and observe them diligently, so that it may go well with you, and so that you may multiply greatly in a land flowing with milk and honey, as The Lord, the God of your ancestors, has promised you.

Deuteronomy 6:1-12

Hear, O Israel: The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. Keep these words that I am commanding you today in your heart. Recite them to your children and talk about them when you are at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you rise. Bind them as a sign on your hand, fix them as an emblem on your forehead, and write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates. When the Lord your God has brought you into the land that he swore to your ancestors, to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob, to give you—a land with fine, large cities that you did not build, houses filled with all sorts of goods that you did not fill, hewn cisterns that you did not hew, vineyards and olive groves that you did not plant—and when you have eaten your fill, take care that you do not forget the

Lord, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery.

A: The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

SECOND READING

1 Peter 2:1-10

A: A reading from 1 Peter.

[Peter spoke saying:] Rid yourselves, therefore, of all malice, and all guile, insincerity, envy, and all slander. Like newborn infants, long for the pure, spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow into salvation— if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is good.

Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in scripture: "See, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious; and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame." To you then who believe, he is precious; but for those who do not believe, "The stone that the builders rejected has become the very head of the corner," and "A stone that makes them stumble, and a rock that makes them fall." They stumble because they disobey the word, as they were destined to do. But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

The rain fell, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on rock. And everyone who hears these words of mine and does not act on them will be like a foolish man who built his house on sand. The rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell—and great was its fall!" Now when Jesus had finished saying these things, the crowds were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as their scribes.

SERMON

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

P: If I were to give today's sermon a title, which most Lutheran pastor's don't do, I would call it, "God Bless Our Native Land." And you know what else? I could amaze you and deliver a three-word sermon in response to that title. And that response would be, "He has! Amen."

Now, as you have probably guessed, you're not going to get that quickie three-word sermon. Oh, it would be a fitting sermon, be as we celebrate our independence and the birth of our nation, it is important for us to look back and see that God has answered that prayer. God

has blessed this nation richly. Even as we're embroiled in the COVID-19 pandemic and even when economic times are not the best, God has blessed this native land and is blessing our nation. Although we don't always think so, we are wealthier than most, stronger than most, and happier than most. We have freedom. We strive for equality. We have more clean water than most, and our grocery store shelves, although not at full capacity right now, are beginning to look more normal.

One great blessing that our Lord has given our nation is a firm foundation. In documents like the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and the Bill of Rights, our forefathers, with wisdom and foresight, took a vision ... a dream really, and mapped out a way for it to actually work.

If you've ever watched the movie or seen the play 1776, which is a humorous musical rendition of the historical events and characters that framed the Declaration of Independence, you know the struggle it was to do what no people had ever done before – to break from their mother country and form a new nation.

What's interesting, as you watch the tale unfold, is that these people are far from perfect. There are passions ... emotions ... rivalries ... egos ... jealousies ... hatreds, and even brawls ... not unlike today. Greed raises its ugly head more than once. So does hopelessness, drunkenness, regionalism, racism, and slavery. Martin Luther would have been quick to point out that the members of the Second Continental Congress, just like all of us, were sinners ... and saints. But despite their human frailties, they had vision, wisdom, courage (after all, they were committing capital treason!), and the wherewithal to get things done. Their discussions, even their arguments, were important ones. They had to get this right. And out of the cauldron of that Philadelphia summer something beautiful was born. The American Eagle was hatched!

James Michener's masterful, and blessedly short, historical novel entitled *The Legacy*, similarly recounts the history of the framing of the Constitution. Again, the cast of characters is broad. We see them

with their warts exposed. But their accomplishment is astounding – the framework for a system of government that's both strong and pliable, with checks and balances that ensure justice, foster democracy, and prevent tyranny. More than two hundred forty years after its inception, the Constitution still stands as the basic blueprint for democracy world-wide.

What an absolute blessing God has given our nation by providing such a firm foundation.

Of course, God would know a thing or two about providing firm foundations! He has given his children, the Church, the firm foundation of his Word!

Today's reading from Deuteronomy highlights the binding power of God's Word for the ancient children of Israel. It was the Word of God, the laws and the ordinances, that bound the Israelites together, and separated them from other nations. Moses insists these laws and ordinances, these words of God, are so important that people should recite them to their children and talk about them when they are at home and when they rise. These words are to be bound as a sign on their hand, fixed as an emblem on their forehead, and written on the doorposts of their homes. God's word was and is the firm foundation for God's nation.

St. Peter applies the same wisdom to the Church. We're building upon the foundation of God's word ... the Living Word, Jesus Christ. Peter, the man who was renamed the Rock by Christ, says this "living stone is the cornerstone on which we're to build ourselves: "Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ ... and remember ... whoever believes in him will not be put to shame.

So what's the result of all this? The result is that what's built is something new: "... you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty

acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you weren't a people, but now you're God's people; once you hadn't received mercy, but now you have received mercy. Built on the foundation of Christ, we are a new race, a new priesthood, a new nation. God's Word is the firm foundation for God's Church.

And Jesus makes it even more personal. His words are to be the foundation for our own lives. Built on that rock, we will survive any storm life can throw at us. In fact, we'll survive any storm death can throw at us. Our Lord, in his death and resurrection, has ensured that! Christ's Word is the firm foundation for you and for me ... every single day.

Of course, to build on God's Word, you need to know it. So, dig into Scripture. Study it. Enjoy it. As it sinks into your mind, your life will sink roots into it, and none of life's storms will destroy you.

It might also be a good idea to grab a copy of the Constitution, the Declaration of Independence, and the Bill of Rights. Read through them. Learn from them. Enjoy them. Let their words sink in and take root.

And then, thank God for blessing his people and this native land with something truly special: a firm foundation on which each and every one of us can all stand.

And to that I say, "Thanks be to God."

Amen!
