God speaks to us in Scriptures read and preached.

FIRST READING

Jeremiah 20:1-13

A: A reading from Jeremiah.

O LORD, you have enticed me, and I was enticed; you have overpowered me, and you have prevailed. I have become a laughingstock all day long; everyone mocks me. For whenever I speak, I must cry out, I must shout, "Violence and destruction!" For the word of the LORD has become for me a reproach and derision all day long. If I say, "I will not mention him, or speak any more in his name," then within me there is something like a burning fire shut up in my bones; I am weary with holding it in, and I cannot. For I hear many whispering: "Terror is all around! Denounce him! Let us denounce him!" All my close friends are watching for me to stumble. "Perhaps he can be enticed, and we can prevail against him, and take our revenge on him." But the LORD is with me like a dread warrior; therefore my persecutors will stumble, and they will not prevail. They will be greatly shamed, for they will not succeed. Their eternal dishonor will never be forgotten. O LORD of hosts, you test the righteous, you see the heart and the mind; let me see your retribution upon them, for to you I have committed my cause. Sing to the LORD; praise the LORD! For he has delivered the life of the needy from the hands of evildoers.

SECOND READING

A: A reading from Romans.

Should we continue in sin in order that grace may abound? By no means! How can we who died to sin go on living in it? Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

known. What I say to you in the dark, tell in the light; and what you hear whispered, proclaim from the housetops. Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather fear him who can destroy both soul and body in hell. Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. And even the hairs of your head are all counted. So do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows. "Everyone therefore who acknowledges me before others, I also will acknowledge before my Father in heaven; but whoever denies me before others, I also will deny before my Father in heaven. "Do not think that I have come to bring peace to the earth; I have not come to bring peace, but a sword. For I have come to set a man against his father, and a daughter against her mother, and a daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law; and one's foes will be members of one's own household. Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me; and whoever does not take up the cross and follow me is not worthy of me. Those who find their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it."

SERMON

P:

Grace and peace to you from God our Father and our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

In 1991 Josephine Hart wrote of gripping book entitled *Damage*. It's about the dangers of obsession and the depth of its consequences. The main character in the book, a doctor, seemed to have everything: wealth, a beautiful family, classy cars, a prestigious political career ... anything you could imagine. But he never felt fulfilled. Ultimately, he became so obsessed by his desires for more, that his life was totally damaged.

This powerful story is a parable on the human condition. There are people who live shabby and dreary lives, but often those who appear to have everything may come up empty-handed or worse ... they may destroy their lives in the pursuit of fulfillment.

This is the heart of what Jesus was talking about in today's Gospel story. Jesus continues to prepare his disciples for mission. He encourages them to see the advantage they have in reviewing life as it really is.

Jesus pointed out to the disciples that they weren't to be intimidated by what was going on in the world. He told then they were to be like their teacher. Jesus also pointed out that just like he had been called Beelzebub ... the devil ... so would the disciples.

Truth is, that message was also meant for us, because if we really look at today's world, it often looks as though the world does do the work of the devil ... hatred, terrorism, racism, drugs, murders, and unruly protests. Children are abused and die. Families fall to pieces. Homeless people crowd the corners. While we groan and rub our hands in hopelessness, we watch television shows that portray more and more violence. *We live in a period of chaos, fear, and unrest.* We still haven't learned, after all the bitter human experiences that have occurred throughout history, how to live in peace. The death of George Floyd and the following protests attests to the chaos, fear, and unrest, that exists today.

If we believe we are safe from war, a vicious virus, racial disputes, the loss of humanity, and all sort of ugly things happening in the world, we don't understand the meaning of life.

Jesus observed that there is no reason to fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul. The prevalence of violence and conflict shows that much of the world is in the hands of those who kill the body, and we may fear that the destruction will also harm the soul.

Humanity comes up bankrupt in the search for answers to the major problems of life. We hear people decry the absence of values. They lament that our children are not taught values anymore. But how can we teach them when things are so out of balance? We have a horrendous military budget but can't scrape enough money together to support adequate school systems. Our states encourage us to dream about becoming millionaires overnight with lotteries and legalized gambling, and at the same time we support welfare systems that continue to lock the poor in poverty.

We pay outlandish salaries to sport heroes and then pay them more to advertise products that youngsters want so badly so they feel accepted. We've allowed the family to disintegrate and yet wonder why children grow up feeling insecure and unloved. We created a unique sexual revolution, hoping everyone could be free, only to discover that we're slaves to the subject as witnessed by the millions of people who have romanticized deviant behavior reflected in the movie and bestselling novel, "Fifty Shades of Gray." So, what's the answer to all these problems? The law? Values? Does anyone really know?

Jesus encouraged his disciples to take on the world of false power and delusions of grandeur. He said, "Have no fear." He encouraged the disciples to share whatever Jesus had taught them. Jesus was going to make good on what he taught his disciples. We know that Jesus meant that he was willing to offer himself up as a sacrifice for the sins of the world.

Jesus was willing to die at the hands of unbelieving, distrustful, sinful people who thought they had to save their own lives by their own goodness. Jesus was willing to take this debate all the way to its conclusion. The people could force the issues by ridding themselves of a person who talked about God as someone who was so available as to be in the flesh. Jesus affirmed that it was so. God was present among them in this person of Jesus, and he was ready to die to prove it.

And prove it he did. Not only was Jesus so gracious as to offer himself up for crucifixion upon the cross, but he also rose again to prove that life is really and truly to be found in him, so that death itself couldn't deprive him of the eternal life that God offers and gives through him.

In essence Jesus was saying that God offers life to a death-infested humanity. In saying what he did in such a challenging way, Jesus wasn't unmindful of the power of his enemies. He knew that if they could take his life, they were also capable of making martyrs of the disciples. Yet Jesus continued to insist that the cause was worth dying for. The world was God's and worth dying for. The powers in the world were destroying it. We know that well enough today. Yet, Jesus teaches, "Do not fear those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather, fear those who can destroy both soul and body in hell.

Even if the evil powers are bent on destroying the world and all that is good in it, you don't have to fear them. If they elect to destroy you over protests against their evil and because you evangelize for good, don't fear them. Remember your allegiance is to the God who created and redeemed you.

Donald Hands, a clergyman who is also trained in psychiatry, has proposed a definition of an integrated life. He explains that the integrated life is one that makes

sense out of our total experiences of mind, body, and spirit through the relationship to the incarnation of our Lord Jesus Christ.

People who try to control behavior only by repression are sure to have things backfire. Those who seek to control by suppression are apt to create all kinds of misery. People who believe their behavior is best served by gratification are asking for trouble. Sublimation, another form of behavior control, is likely to have all kinds of unwelcome eruptions.

As our lives are integrated by faith through Jesus Christ, we can deal with our thoughts, feelings, and impulses in relationship to ourselves, to others, and to God. Although I have oversimplified Dr. Hand's theory, this process of integration by faith in Christ helps us discover that we don't have to create our self-defense, self-esteem, self-worth, or righteousness. It comes as a gift of God in Christ. We don't have to be obsessed with self-concern, because we discover that the one who is the most concerned for us in none other than God. God isn't too busy to take the time to count the hairs on our head.

Christ's observations about the Father's intimate concern for our lives is strengthened by his promise. We are the vessels of God's love and grace for redeeming a mad, crazy, hate-filled world. Jesus assures us that if we engage with him in the redeeming work in the world, he will acknowledge us before the Father in heaven. When we share the good news of God's grace in Christ, we're true to our discipleship.

On the other hand, to fail to share the good news is to allow the world to suffer the damage it brings upon itself and to endure the possibility of damaging ourselves eternally. We don't even need to consider that possibility. It's far better for us to accept all the love, encouragement, and assurance of our Lord; to become bold evangelists in witnessing to a distraught world; and to remember that our allegiance is to be to the God who created and redeemed us.

And to that I say, "Through the grace of God, let it be so." Amen.
