INTRODUCTION TO TODAY'S SERVICE

P: Alleluia, Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

In the name of Christ, welcome to worship on the Fifth Sunday of Easter. Today we hear Jesus talking with his disciples. Let his words instill hope and trust into your lives as we continue to live in a world that has been changed almost overnight, been disrupted, and now challenges us in ways we never expected. Let us, together as a united body, accept Jesus' words of hope and pray unceasingly as we gradually move forward to wholeness.

Today is also Mother's 'Day. So Happy Mother's Day to all you mothers out there. But I need to be honest with you. Mother's Day is a tough day to stand in front of a congregation (well, you know what I mean) and express all sorts of lovely, endearing words. And I say that because, in truth, there are those who have had less than positive relationships with their mothers, and Mother's Day triggers feelings of hurt and sadness.

So, considering that, let me share two Mother's Day greetings that should be neutral enough and not trigger feelings of sadness or hurt. Both are on 2020 Mother's Day gift mugs.

Greeting 1: (From Child to Mother) Dear Mom, Thanks for putting up with a bratty, spoiled, ungrateful, messy child like my sibling. Love, Your Favorite ♥

Greeting 2: (From Mother to Child) When a Mom says, "What?"

God speaks to us in Scriptures read, sung, and preached.

FIRST READING Acts 7:55-60

A: A reading from Acts 7.

Filled with the Holy Spirit, [Stephen] gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. "Look," he said, "I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God!" But they covered their ears, and with a loud shout all rushed together against him. Then they dragged him out of the city and began to stone him; and the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul. While they were stoning Stephen, he prayed, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." Then he knelt down and cried out in a loud voice, "Lord, do not hold this sin against them." When he had said this, he died.

A: The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

SECOND READING

1 Peter 2:2-10

A: A reading from 1 Peter.

Like newborn infants, long for the pure, spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow into salvation— if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is good.

Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in scripture: "See, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious; and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame." To you then who believe, he is precious; but for those who do not believe, "The stone that the builders rejected has become the very head of the corner," and "A stone that makes them stumble, and a rock that makes them fall." They stumble because they disobey the word, as they were destined to do. But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim

the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

A: The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL READING John 14:1-14

P: The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the 14th chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

[Jesus said to the disciples:] "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also.

And you know the way to the place where I am going." Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him."

Philip said to him, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied." Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves.

Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it.

P: This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

P: So, let me ask you: Which of God's commandments, and I'm not just restricting that to the Ten commandments, would you say is the most difficult for you to obey? How about "Do not lie"? After all, when you're in a tight spot and you can twist the truth just a little, it seems harmless doesn't it? ... or how about "Do not to covet" since we live in such a materialistic society. If somebody you know gets richer or achieves a status you want, it's hard not to be jealous. Isn't that right? Or how about "Do not give false testimony" or "Do not misuse the name of the Lord your God"?

The fact is there are so many difficult commandments, and I think one of the hardest commandments to obey is the one we hear in today's Gospel story: "Do not let your heart be troubled" (or worried, or anxious, or fearful ... whichever word you want to use). The truth is, there's so much to be troubled about, particularly in today's world: COVID-19 with more than 3.6 million cases worldwide and the cause of more than 250,000 deaths, economic insecurity, falling stock markets, political corruption, crime, and violence. (If you weren't feeling troubled before I started this sermon, you may be by now.) On top of national and international troubles, there are many "what if?" scenarios. What if you get cancer; if you're in an accident; your spouse leaves you; one of your children dies; or you lose your job? All this and more can bring on heart trouble.

Your worry, fear, and anxiety may be intensely personal. You may be a single mother wondering how to be a good parent and provider. You may be a parent or a grandparent agonizing over the rebellious behavior of your children or grandchildren. Maybe you're barely making ends meet and feeling overwhelmed with your financial obligations. Or maybe you're dealing with chronic health problems and need to weigh various treatment options.

If your heart *is* troubled and you're feeling confused, concerned, and overwhelmed, you're in good company. You see, Jesus' disciples felt the same way. At the ripe young age of 33, their Lord was leaving them, and their hearts were heavy and deeply troubled. Fortunately, Jesus had some heart-to-heart words for them. He said to them and to us: "*Believing leads to seeing*."

Right before Jesus went to the cross, he said to his disciples: "Do not let your hearts be troubled." In other words, "Stop being troubled; stop worrying; don't let fear overwhelm you." Of course, if you're like me, you're expecting Jesus to provide

the cure for this heart trouble. And you know what? He does! He says: "Believe in God, believe also in me." That's it ... believe ... no more, no less ... that's what we need to do! But Jesus knows that many who believe in him struggle to believe in him during day-to-day living. As a result, many of us suffer unnecessarily with a troubled heart. So Jesus says: You must believe I will never leave you; I will never stop praying for you; I have sympathy for you; believe in the comfort of the Holy Spirit that I give to each of you. When, not if, you have a troubled heart, all you need to do is believe that Jesus will sustain you. Believe that he has left us and has already prepared a dwelling place for each of us in heaven, and through his death, resurrection, and ascension the way to those dwelling places is quite clear ... even if we don't understand it yet.

The reality of our heavenly home can help guard us from having a troubled heart. No matter how badly things may be going in your life, Jesus has promised us a glorious eternity. When we plan vacations, do we just drive off with no prior planning? Probably not! We get brochures, we talk to friends, we examine maps, and pack our bags. This week when you think about your upcoming weekend, or your future, think about your heavenly home. Discipline your minds to ponder the wonder of heaven. Although this is difficult to do, it will help you with that troubled heart.

The guarantee of heaven is confirmed by Jesus' promise: If I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. In our fallen world, we can gain relief for our troubled hearts from the fact that Jesus is going to take us to be with him. Remember that promise. It may just be what you need to carry you through this tough and scary time we are currently living in. You see, Jesus expects us to trust him when adversity comes into our lives. He's made a promise to "be with us" no matter what, forever and ever.

What I love most about today's gospel story is that in the midst of a discussion of heart trouble and anxiety is hearing John and Jesus saying: As difficult as your troubles and trials are right now, please know that the church is going to accomplish God's purposes. If you're feeling discouraged and overwhelmed, observe the kingdom work of the church. The church is touching lives not only in this county, but in our country and throughout the world. When everything that could go wrong seems to be going wrong and your heart is hurting, please know that the gates of hell will not prevail against the church and God's kingdom will rise victorious. As difficult as your individual heart problems may be, they are momentary. God

assures you that as you take your eyes off your own troubles and focus on Christ's work in his church, you will be strengthened. Believing leads to seeing ... specifically seeing God work in and through you and his people.

What do you want God to accomplish in and through you and Zion for the sake of his kingdom? What are the "greater works" you want God to bring about? Do you have the vision to dream big dreams for him even during a crisis? Do you have faith to pursue God-sized goals? If so, God is yearning to answer your prayers because they are about his kingdom and his glory.

It's been said, "Confession is good for the soul, but bad for the reputation." True as that may be, I'm here to tell you that I understand to some degree what it's like to experience heart trouble. Let me just share with you on a very personal level what I often feel like when I'm not the pastor I want to be. There are times when I feel as though I don't love Christ like Christ loves me. This hurts me deeply ... my heart becomes troubled. As a pastor, there are times when I'm not the spiritual leader I feel I need to be for all of you ... that I'm losing opportunities to influence you in positive, God-like ways. There are times when the task of pastoring can be overwhelming. At times I feel like I'm failing in the goal of bringing people to Christ ... especially now when I physically can't be with you during sickness and times of stress and fear.

I share these things with you not to scare you, but for a special reason. I want you to know that I do understand some of the heart trouble many of you feel. What gets me through these difficult times, and I hope it's the same for you, is what God is doing in the world in and through his church even when we feel stuck in our homes because of a virus we don't understand.

May you and I take our heart troubles to the Savior of the world and pray that he will help us take our eyes off our concerns and focus on God's work and the work of his people.

Remember, believing in the promises Christ has proclaimed leads us to see more clearly and more deeply ... it strengthens us ... and fills our hearts with a sense of warmth and comfort ... making our hearts a home for Christ.

And to that I say, "Thanks be to God. Amen."

We give you thanks, O Lord that you called us to walk with you. Guide us in ways that we may reveal your truth and lead others to the fullness of life in you. Lead us in the ways of peace during this difficult time of uncertainty, anxiety, and fear that has enveloped your world.

We pray for those who are making difficult decisions as the world continues to feel the effects of the coronavirus ... government leaders, heath care leaders, and scientists who struggle to create medications to effectively combat the disease. Provide all these people with the wisdom to make sound decisions that bring hope and healing to a world in need.

We pray, O Lord, for all who need healing, hope, comfort, strength, protection, and renewed hearts. We especially pray for those who are suffering from the effects of COVID-19, those who place themselves at risk by caring for those in health care facilities, and for those who are grieving the loss of family and friends who have succumbed to the disease.

Lord, we remember, with saddened hearts, all who have died because of COVID-19. Lead them to the place that you have prepared for them and welcome them to the heavenly feast you set before all those who enter your heavenly kingdom.

O God, accept these prayers that we offer now in the name of Jesus, our Lord and Savior, who taught us to pray together saying ...

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed by thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass again us, and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.
