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## ***DAILY DEVOTIONALS FROM PASTOR SELL*** ***June 6-10***

### **Monday, June 6**

I had been told that Joanne Grim had a beautiful rhododendron bush in her yard but I did not see it in bloom until last week. I was stunned. It was over two stories tall and at least thirty feet in diameter. It was totally covered in pink flowers. Gorgeous and magnificent do not begin to describe the sight. It was truly glorious.

The Bible frequently talks about God's glory. Moses glowed after being in the partial glory of the Lord. Isaiah 40 talks about "the glory of the Lord will be revealed, and all people will see it together." Joanne's bush gave me just a tiny glimpse of the meaning of glory.

### **Tuesday, June 7**

Driving past Harvey's BBQ in Mount Joy on the way to Zion the smell of slow cooking meat filled the car. It was unusual because Mount Joy frequently smells of chocolate. Oh, it smelled so good. It was 9am and I had had breakfast, but now I craved smoked brisket. Smells can be so enticing – bread fresh from the oven; flowers in bloom; spices and herbs blooming in a warm pan. A smell can grab us and change our mindset for a few minutes.

I wondered if people would be more excited about communion if the smell of fresh baking bread and grapes drifted through the church just before the that portion of the liturgy. The Athanasian Creed was written to define the trinity, but it is very long and complicated. Although it is one of the three important creeds of the church, it is only recommended for use once a year on Holy Trinity Sunday.

The Trinity is a way of outlining the broad scope of the work of God. God the creator and father. Jesus the Son and redeemer. The Spirit of power and empowerment.
