
I think Jesus means it because in Mark 8 he says, "Those who lose their life for my sake will save it."


Time is flying in our "covenant of renewal" process. We are praying for revival. I've tried to model "generous orthodoxy," meaning distinctly Lutheran with a radical willingness to partner with others in what God is up to in the world.

The Gospel of Mark ends on a cliffhanger, according to its original ending in 16:8. Jesus is risen. The women are supposed to tell the disciples and Peter to meet Jesus back in Galilee in their ordinary lives. But the women don't tell anyone because they are afraid. The original cliffhanger was an invitation for us to finish the story by following Jesus.

In 2024, to have hope for the world, our nation, and our church, it looks like we will need to practice active, participatory hope. That means being "greatest" and "first" and "losing our lives in order to save them."


- 1) Preach the Word.

pray for each other,


and bless each other.



In 2023, several members of Zion felt called to launch a stewardship team, and I hope that I have supported them.

My contribution was to teach what "steward," coming from the word "sty-warden," means:

We are people called to joyfully care for what belongs to Another.



In 2023, I sensed the eruption of soon-toarrive events of escalating retaliation; therefore, I emphasized the "forgiveness" theme in Matthew's Gospel.

We also held an evening Bible study on **Desmond and Mpho Tutu's book on forgiveness**.

I was pleased with the lay launched and produced "forgiveness" banners in the sanctuary and poster bulletin board in the narthex!



In 2023, with Holy Spirit and Redeemer, we explored the crucifixion in a Lenten series:

- *the First Century Context
- *different understanding of "how the cross saves us"
- *through the lens of Job from the Hebrew Bible and scapegoating
- *through the lens of peacemaking.



In 2024, let us expect epiphanies and look for God at work in the world.

We name God at work in our daily life.

We partner with what God is already doing.

We give thanks for those through whom God's healing is at work.

We share our "epiphany moments" with each other.

As we reflect on our past year, and all the work our teams have done, let us also reflect on our own stewardship. We all have something to give. In this report you will find points on which the Council has been working. Please review each Ministry Team report for updates on each individual team. The Council works in conjunction with these teams, so their reports are where you will find all of the details.

Non-Voting members 2023: Randy Miller (Financial Secretary), Phil Houseal (Assistant Financial Secretary), John Hay (Treasurer), Lisa Nelson (Assistant Treasurer), Brenda Stover (Secretary), and Anne Rankin (Parish Administrator/Communications).

- **January** Identified the needs of the Food Pantry and how we can best support them. Addressed the use of the nursery, now identified as a family space for those who need this space for their children during services.
- **February** Met with Pastor Beth Schlegel who assisted Zion with updating our constitution and bylaws at the Council yearly planning retreat.
- March Continued work on constitution updates. Updated team descriptions. Affirmed that the Food Pantry is a part of our ongoing ministry and identified the need for a formal agreement with them.
- **April** Continued work on returning space for families to go to during the service to tend to the needs of their children. Located equipment for children to attend special events (highchairs and boosters). Established a small task force to update the wedding policy. Continued work on the constitution and bylaws. Reviewed the sound system and streaming concerns. Approved funds for the pastor's continued education.
- May Final council vote on completed constitution and bylaws. Reviewed updates on the family space room. Continued work on Food Pantry (formal understanding) documents. Networked for church and Cooper House update approval. Donated furniture to Off the Streets and other locations to make dedicated room for the Food Pantry. Began performance reviews.
- **June** Updated Sexton job descriptions and confirmed outside landscaping company.
- **July** Council did not meet.

- **August** Congregational Meeting for vote on constitution and bylaws. Approved and sent to the Lower Susquehanna Synod.
- **September** Completed annual staff reviews. Salary proposals were given to the treasurer. Council member openings reviewed. Proposed 2024 budget reviewed and meetings set for congregation.
- October Food Pantry formal agreement finalized and sent to the Pantry for signature. Planned for Council retreat/planning session to establish goals for 2024. Identified key areas for revitalization. Worked on areas of stewardship (how are we using our gifts?)
- **November** Congregational Meeting November 19, 2023. Budget approved and council elected for 2024. Prepared for Advent.
- **December** Wedding policy update completed. Council voted on President and Vice President for 2024. Confirmed date of January 7 for installation of Council members. Confirmed date of February 10 for Council retreat/planning day.

As we move into 2024, our goals will be finalized at our Council Planning Retreat in February. We will continue to work with Pastor Tim on our revitalization of Zion, and how we can best assist him with the Covenant of Renewal. Our focus will remain on stewardship, and how we can open doors for you, the congregation, to share your gifts. We will also focus on our ministries: How do we highlight what we are working on and how do we share these ministries with others?

I look forward to continuing as Council President for 2024, and to working with our amazing teams and Pastor Tim in our continued revitalization of Zion. Thank you for the opportunity to serve you in this capacity.

MINISTRY REPORTS: OUTREACH

SOCIAL OUTREACH TEAM

Meetings were held during the months of January, February, March, April, June, July, September and November. The December meeting was held after submission of this report. Meetings were held at Hot Z Pizza, Park City Diner and Randy's house.

The following projects were led by the Outreach Team during 2023:

- In January, snack baskets and \$2,000 in gift cards were delivered to the guidance counselors and social workers at the Hempfield School District. They were very much appreciated. When Pastor Tim met with them late last year, it was indicated that at any given time there are as many as 47 displaced families in the Hempfield School District.
- Pastor Tim and Randy Miller met with the project coordinators at Bethany Christian Services to become more familiar with Safe Families for Children. It was pointed out that their goal is to intercede when families become displaced or if a family crisis results in no one being available to care for a child. They aim to place children in the Children's and Youth Program in Lancaster County to prevent them from "entering the system."
- We ran a food project in Lent called the Spring Bring. As part of this project, which was headed by Adele King, each member who brought in food for the Food Pantry put their name on a cut-out hand. Hands were then taped to the walls of the narthex and hallway leading to the pantry. The project was very successful.
- Randy Miller represented Zion on a mission trip to Houston TX to help repair a home that was badly damaged by the freezing temperatures and power outage during the winter of 2022.
- Randy Miller set up a Thrivent Action Team to help with the Care Package Program, which was headed by Millie Gundel. Thrivent gifted the team \$250 to help with the cost of supplies for the care packages. More than 90 care packages were put together and delivered to Lutheran World Relief (LWR) for distribution to the needy. Jim Paternoster was kind enough to deliver the packages to LWR at a church in Ephrata.
- Zion fielded a team for the Crop Walk. We set an aggressive goal of \$1,000 to help feed the hungry in Lancaster and around the world. With the help of some residents of Traditions of America (the development where Randy lives), we raised \$1,165, exceeding our goal. Of this total, \$905 was contributed by members of Zion.
- Kim Paternoster organized the Angel Tree for December 2023. The project also included a Coats for Children drive. The program was a big success again this year.
- In November, Jim Grube, Darrell Gerke and Randy Miller spent a day in Columbia working on a new home being built by Habitat for Humanity.
- Details of the Community Meal are being submitted in a separate report.

- After serving as chairperson of the Outreach Team for the past ten years, Randy decided it was time for him to step down and to only serve on the committee. Until there is a chairperson, we will continue to meet on a monthly basis without a chairperson.
- Contributions continued to be made to local charities through our Joyful Noise collection and distributions from the Anna Mary Herr fund. See next page for details.

COMMUNITY MEAL

REVIEW OF 2023

- It was a year of changes for the Community Meal. During the winter and spring months, the Community Meal continued to offer free takeout meals on a weekly basis. From January thru June, a total of 2494 meals were served by eight different sponsoring organizations. Zion provided six of these weekly meals. The Community Meal was on hiatus from mid-June through August.
- In September, the Community Meal returned as a served meal in the Social Room with no takeout meals as was done before the pandemic in 2020. The meals were offered twice a month on the second and fourth Thursdays. A total of six meals were served by five different. sponsors. Attendance averaged 27 guests per meal for a total of 166 meals served. No meals were served during the weeks of Thanksgiving and Christmas.
- Zion provided the food for six meals and the takeout supplies needed for the first half of the year. For the served meals, Zion provided the kitchen facilities for sponsoring groups, all serving supplies and beverages.
- Many volunteers from Zion and sponsoring organizations provided countless hours to provide this ministry to our local community.
- A team of four to six Zion members have been volunteering to provide table setup, hosting, and cleanup for each served meal.
- The kitchen passed inspection by the PA Department of Agriculture in July.

GOALS FOR 2024

- To continue to develop a team of Zion volunteers to provide setup, hosting, and cleanup for the meals.
- To encourage new sponsors for meals.

MINISTRY REPORTS: WORSHIP AND MUSIC & FAITH FORMATION

WORSHIP AND MUSIC TEAM

We began this year with the creation of our goals:

- To meet the ministerial needs of the Congregation
- To continue to stream our services in order for all to view, keeping abreast of problems
- To continue to explore ways to keep congregants actively involved in worship on Sundays as well as other days
- Lead the congregation in singing one another's songs, both contemporary and traditional

A few examples of how we are attempting to reach those goals are:

- Although we continue to have problems with streaming, first with the program being interrupted, and continually with the sound quality, we are constantly attempting to correct problems as they arise.
- Pastor Seitz-Brown attempts to allow for discussion during his sermons as well as attempting to get people to interact and say various points he is trying to make. He has definitely encouraged congregants to be aware of God Sightings, and introduced Faith Five as a tool to keep the Lord in our everyday lives.
- John Landis has brought back the praise band, and encouraged us all to appreciate the desired music of others. The choir has been brought back to beyond full strength and has been making a wonderful contribution to our services!!

Some of the things we accomplished:

- We served the community meal on February 16 as a drive-through event. Off the Streets gave a presentation in February. Since then, several people have joined their action team and many contribute to their cause. We decided to put children's books in the pews as we had many unused books in the Sunday School rooms.
- Our Lenten theme was Aspects of the Crucifixion. Small group studies were handled off-site on Wednesdays, joining with Holy Spirit and Redeemer Lutheran, using various speakers. We posted an advertisement in the Merchandiser with a picture of Holy Spirit and directions to the church. Lunch at Centerville Diner followed the services.
- The altar was uncovered during Lent and pita bread was served for communion. The average attendance was 25-30. We distributed ashes on foreheads or hands as to each person's wish. We decided to order palms for Palm Sunday and there was a play depicting the Passion of our Lord during worship. The Maundy Thursday stripping of the altar was coordinated by Donna Dumeyer. Diane Gerlach coordinated the Easter processional. Flowers for Easter were discussed and we decided to order them from Floral Design. We also announced we would once again hold outdoor services from June to September.

- John Landis established a Zion Musik Task Force so that possible groups could be identified, that each concert would have someone to greet the performers and that the church would be set up before and locked up after the concerts. The task force was established with David Albin, John Marrs, Joanne Marrs, and David Wauls. A concert was held by a group called Outside the Loft. John had a concert in November, and Leiderkranz was held in December, along with the Hempfield Chamber Choir. Refreshments were served by Worship and Music for two of the concerts.
- We established a day for choir appreciation, with a special blessing, and cake and punch in the
 narthex. Congregation members were encouraged to send greetings to the choir, and Adele made
 a poster board expressing those greetings. Also in May, an Ascension Day service was held in
 the Columbarium courtyard. A Memorial Day service was commemorated with a video and
 prayer prior to the service.
- It was decided not to order more communion kits and to go with fresh baked bread picked up by the Ramers. Altar guild will no longer be responsible for placing tissues in the pews. Coordinators for greeters and acolytes are no longer needed at this time. It was requested that we go back to communion around the altar. We decided to wait until October and to use it on the first Sunday of the month. Scott and his usher team have taken care of seeing that it runs smoothly going forward.
- The sound system is an ongoing problem. Many different things were discussed over the course of the year, and yet it is still not satisfactory. It was noted that the pastor needs a new microphone and that we should establish the usage of devices for those people with hearing impairments. Streaming quality is a concern as well.
- Graduate recognition was held on June 18. Outdoor services were well-attended and ushers helped John with the setup and the cleanup.
- Rally Day was held in September where Faith Five was introduced. With Scott and Mary Hetrick hosting and Millie Gundel "supervising," personal care kits were assembled and boxed for Lutheran World Relief
- In October, we had Pastor Jorgensen come to preach on Reformation Sunday. A luncheon was held, with the help of the Paternosters, after the service.
- On All Saints Sunday, people brought in pictures of people who influenced their lives. Veteran's Day was celebrated honoring our own veterans through music and pictures.
- Thanks to the efforts of Kim Paternoster, the Angel Tree returned during Advent. Thanks to the Gerkes and Hauns for providing and putting up the trees. The decoration team, led by Kim Paternoster, did a great job making the church look beautiful for the season!
- Altar guild continues to run smoothly thanks to the efforts of Donna Dumeyer and her teams. A new schedule for 2024 was provided.

A special thanks to the team for their hard work and dedication. Diane Gerlach helps to arrange and coordinate as needed, although she has decided to step down from attending these meetings. Scott Hetrick will continue to look for people who may want to usher, and to set the usher schedule. Jenn Pipkin continues to arrange the lay assistants and helps with the wine distribution. Dave Albin sets up the screen each week and is a valuable part of the music ministry. Donna Dumeyer changes the linens on

the altar and keeps the teams on task. She also served as secretary and kept our minutes updated. Unfortunately, Donna has decided to step down from this committee. Donna and Diane's contributions to this team will surely be missed.

Kudos to John for another great year of music!! How he has turned our choir into something so special is amazing!! He still asks that if you have special songs you want to hear, place suggestions in the box provided in the narthex.

Pastor Tim provides our spiritual leadership, and is always open to suggestions as he makes us responsible to look for God in our daily lives. He asks that we share our highs and lows, read the Bible and talk about how it relates. He encourages prayer and giving blessings to each other!

CHALLENGES:

With one service, it is still difficult to meet the needs of every single person in the congregation. We enjoy many types of music here at Zion and some may feel that their particular type of music is not enjoyed as often as others. I continue to ask that if you would like to see things change to your liking, consider being a part of this committee to have your voice heard. Our sound system continues to challenge, and we will continue to work on the problem! *Please be patient and please participate in the life of the congregation!!!*

GOALS:

- 1. Improve the quality of music when streaming.
- 2. Continue to examine ways to have the congregation embrace various song choices.
- 3. Keep a mindful ear to the "talk" of the congregants, regarding services and activities.
- 4. Establish model for all committees, including Council and church staff to improve communication, in order to better function as one organized unit.

Any suggestions you might have to make our services more enjoyable or meaningful are welcome. Please consider what you can do to make the worship of our Lord in this congregation more uplifting. We ask for your prayers as our team continues into the new year.

- The Lancaster Liederkranz December 2: Singing to a standing room only crowd, this group is always eager to perform at Zion. This is a long-standing tradition at Zion we hope to continue.
- The Hempfield Chamber Singers December 17: Truly a highlight of the holiday season, the youth of our community have such talent and Mr. Ramos is a gifted director.

The following concerts are scheduled in the spring of 2024:

- The Hempfield Chamber Singers April 14: Special concert in preparation for their appearance at the Pennsylvania Music Educators State Conference in Erie later in the month.
- The Lancaster Liederkranz Spring Concert May 4 @ 4:00 p.m.
- Landisville Church Choir Festival May 23 @ 7:00pm: Plans are in place for our choir to host at least three other local choirs for an evening festival. Each choir will present two or three anthems of their choice as well as perform a combined anthem to conclude the festival. This anthem will be selected by Mr. Alejandro Ramos who will serve as our guest conductor.
- Rizzetta's Tones have been in contact and we hope to include them either this spring or next fall.
- Other suggestions are welcomed by the committee.

We also intend to solicit support for this program from benefactors who are interested in promoting the Concert Series.

This was an exciting year for the Sunday Scholars with new videos, an additional teacher, and new styles of teaching. This class uses visual media to stimulate discussion of the Bible.

Our newest teacher is Jeff Thompson, who has a passion for studying Jesus using the streaming series "The Chosen." He led the class through season three of the series, and developed a playbill of characters and their circumstances. "The Chosen" follows the ministry of Christ and uses dialogue primarily from the Bible text, supplemented by situational stories. We expect to show Season 4 of "The Chosen" in the spring, and we invite the congregation to come and share this exciting discussion.

Dave Albin provided several Box Office Bible Studies using clips from recent movies that exemplify Christian principles. One example was a study of the film "The Princess Bride." Dave also prepared discussion sessions for "St. John in Exile," starring Hollywood actor Dean Jones (of "Herbie" fame). Jones also provided a clip of an interview on how he came to be a born-again Christian.

Dave creatively built a study upon the topic of "3:16", the scriptural passage usually associated with the Gospel of John. He discussed several other books who had significant passages in their third chapter, 16th verse. Other supporting scriptural references affirmed the main idea of each chosen verse.

Dave Dumeyer used Ray Vander Laan's "That the World May Know" video series, focusing on Israel's flight from bondage in Egypt and their entering the Promised Land. He later presented Vander Laan's video "Israel's Mission." This latter video demonstrated tenets of Jewish culture and faith that impacted Jesus' ministry and how they have influenced us today as Christians.

This class offers provocative discussions and leads to an understanding of our role in the world today. COLUMBARIUM COURTYARD/ MEMORY GARDEN

Zion's Columbarium and Memory Garden was dedicated on Sunday, January 14, 2007 and has been a successful venture ever since.

Our Columbarium team is currently composed of the following people:

Bob Traup -- 1/1/19 - 12/31/25 Nevin Lontz - 1/1/23 - 12/31/2026 Pastor -- Term is based on the term of call

On January 1, 2013, Burnell Hostetter stepped down as chairman of the Columbarium Committee. At that time, it was decided to split the two areas of responsibility: financial and non-financial. This year, per Council decision and approval, the financial piece of Columbarium accounting was rolled over to the general fund. Bob will continue to assume the non-financial responsibility (i.e. maintaining the Columbarium niche records, correspondence, and inurnment service details).

In 2022, Council approved the Finance Team's recommendation to close the Columbarium Account. On February 28, 2022, the \$8,000 final repayment was put in the Endowment Fund. The leftover \$313.29 was deposited in Zion's General account. All future Columbarium income and expenses will go through Zion's General account. Below is the final Columbarium/Memory Garden Account report from 2023.

The rules and regulations and costs have remained the same since 2006 when the columbarium was installed. Use of the columbarium is open to Zion members and their immediate family. The total cost per niche is \$900; \$600 is for the cost and is refundable if the family should change their minds about this type or location of burial. The remaining \$300 fee is treated as a donation and is not refundable.

In 2023, there was one refund for a niche that is no longer wanted. That refund was donated back to Zion's general fund.

In 2023, there were zero niches purchased.

Going into 2024, there are eleven remaining niches.

The Zion Stewardship reVITALization Initiative that began in the spring of 2022 continued as the VITALization initiative in 2023. The overall objective is to have each member recognize that they are a VITAL member at Zion.

The focus as we moved into 2023 was on faithfully using talent, the second aspect of the three T's of stewardship - time, talent, and treasure.

A 'Let's Connect' questionnaire was created to give members the opportunity to share their biographical information, talents and interests. The completed forms were used to create a bulletin board and Pastor Tim selected several each week to allow the congregation to guess who he was describing. This phase of VITALization continued through the spring.


In August the transition was made to emphasize the treasure aspect of stewardship. A new bulletin board was created to emphasize that God is the provider of our time, talent, and treasure and each of us are to use these in God-pleasing ways. Fourteen organizations were identified to illustrate Zion's stewardship support beyond the congregation.

A temple talk was provided in mid-August to introduce the start of this aspect of stewardship. It was followed by a second temple talk at the end of August to let the congregation know the stewardship and finance teams were collaborating to create a monthly condensed budget report. Its purpose is to keep the congregation informed of the monthly income and expenses in an easy-to-understand format.

On October 15, a temple talk updated the congregation on the status of the church budget and issued a challenge to grow our individual giving with a goal of "offerings matching expenses." Currently funds from the endowment, special bequests, and cash reserves are used to achieve a balanced year-end budget.

The first condensed budget report for September was completed and given to the congregation on October 22. This report for the previous month is now provided at the end of each month along with a Sharing Our Treasures update.

Beginning in November, an image from the <u>Ask, Think, Tell</u> book, was included in the weekly newsletter and worship bulletin. Each contains a bumper sticker stewardship statement and scripture. A message from the stewardship team expands on the image theme. This image and message format will continue to be used through February 2024.

In addition to taking care of many mundane items such as repairs to leaking toilets, securing service contracts, and general upkeep of the physical property, the committee successfully completed five major projects this year.

- 1. Boy Scout Meeting Room and Closet Update: The Boy Scout leaders requested that the basement meeting/game room conditions be improved to make it more welcoming for the scouts and so that the scouts could have their own storage closet separate from Zion to store camping and other equipment. The Property Committee set up a plan to honor this request. In the meeting room we scraped off the effluence from the walls and recoated the walls with drylock. Then Dave Dumeyer and Steve Haun repainted the walls to match the existing color and painted the floor gray. We emptied the storage room in the basement, installed drywall, and painted the drywall in preparation for heavy-duty shelving brackets and shelving that the committee purchased and that the scouts applied to the walls. Dave and Steve also painted the floor gray to match the meeting room. The scout leaders are very happy with these updates.
- 2 and 3. The next project is actually a combination of two projects. The Council has asked the committee to prepare the nursery room for use by the two families (each with a young child) and any visitors with children that come to Zion. The committee has been trying for three years to fix the roof leak over the nursey room. We finally stopped the roof leak, were able to replace the damaged ceiling tiles, and thoroughly cleaned the nursery room in preparation for its use.
- 4. Brick moulding repair on Cooper Avenue door to the social room: The moulding on this door was rotting in several places so these spots were removed and replaced. New trim moulding was then installed and the entire jambs and trim were painted.
- 5. Air duct for the Narthex: Steve and Darrell installed a new HVAC duct from what was formerly the pastor's office to the narthex for more heat in the winter and cooling in the summer, making these areas more comfortable.
